

ANOTHER DISASTER

Has Overtaken Russian Arms in Manchuria.

DESPERATE FIGHTING IN WHICH JAPS GAINED A VICTORY.

St. Petersburg Dreads to Hear Full News of Defeat.

(Special to Daily Herald.)

St. Petersburg, Feb. 28.—1.15 p. m.—A fragmentary report of a fresh reverse sustained by Kuropatkin has been received here.

After the magnitude of Kuroki's success against the Russian left, the public is ready to believe the worst that disaster has again overtaken Russian arms, which at Mukden have been outflanked, Kuropatkin withdrawing from his strong position on the Shakhe river.

The reports are exaggerated beyond question, but officials of the war office are plainly discouraged at the fashion in which Kuropatkin was able to drive in and turn the Russian extreme left, his advance column actually crossing the Shakhe river. It is admitted that the fighting was desperate at several passes on Sunday and Monday, while the front involved the purpose of Field Marshall Oyama evidently to keep the centre and right engaged to prevent Kuropatkin from sending reinforcements. Should Kuroki cross the Hun river high road and Tie pass, (forty miles north of Mukden), he open, Kuropatkin's retreat will be threatened. Further news is awaited with great anxiety.

Anything like a decisive Japanese victory now would probably end the war.

GROWING BOLDER.

Russian Revolutionary Party Pursuing its Mission--Warning to Another Grand Duke.

(Special to Daily Herald.)

St. Petersburg, Feb. 28.—The utter impotency of the police to face the terrorist organizations is shown by the increasing boldness of the latter all over St. Petersburg.

Even on the steps of public buildings notices of Grand Duke Sergius' death are found. They read: "The sentence of death passed upon Sergius has been executed Feb. 17."

The Grand Duchess Marie Pavlovna wife of Grand Duke Vladimir, father of Grand Dukes Cyril and Boris, whose husband is high on the list of those condemned to death, is trying to shield his life with her own.

Since "Red Sunday" the Grand Duke has not only been showered with threats and warnings, but has received from abroad formal letters from groups informing him of his sentence and the manner in which it will be executed.

Today Grand Duke Vladimir received a letter from one group saying his sentence had been temporarily suspended.

SUGGESTED SECESSION.

Agitation for Rainy River and Thunder Bay Districts to Join Manitoba.

Port Arthur, Ont., Feb. 28.—An agitation has been begun here in favor of the secession of Rainy River and Thunder Bay districts from Ontario and joining Manitoba, as a result of the refusal of the federal government to allow Manitoba to extend her boundaries westward.

TEMPERANCE AND REFORM.

Conference with Dr. Chown at St. John—Demand for Import-ant Legislation.

St. John, Feb. 28.—N. B. and P. E. I. group of the temperance committee met in conference with Dr. Chown this morning, and decided to prepare

a circular letter to be addressed to all congregations, calling attention to the differences in connection with Sunday schools and Ephworth leagues, and official boards of congregations, also that communications be addressed to the local government respecting temperance legislation in the provincial legislature and to the Dominion government, urging the passing of a law to prevent gambling on race courses, also asking for the passing of a Dominion Lord's Day Act.

ST. JOHN COUNTY COURT.

No Criminal Cases--Judge Forbes' Recommendations.

St. John, Feb. 28.—The St. John county court opened this morning before Judge Forbes.

In addressing the grand jury His Honor referred to the fact that no criminal cases would come before them, which was very gratifying.

He urged that investigation be made into the regulations and conditions of public institutions, i. e., the jail, reformatory, alms house and hospital, also that provision be made for the protection of life and property in schools, churches and theatres, etc.

WANT IN CAPE BRETON.

No Flour in Some Towns and People Slaughtering Cattle for Food.

Sydney, N. S., Feb. 28.—The city has decided to borrow \$60,000 for the purpose of establishing a civic electric lighting plant.

The town and country districts are very short of provisions on account of the railway tie-up, and the people are on the verge of famine.

At Port Hood and Mabou, Inverness county, there has been no flour for two or three days and the people are slaughtering their cattle for a supply of food.

DIED IN ARIZONA.

Former St. John Resident's Body Taken to Windsor for Interment.

St. John, Feb. 28.—The body of Adjutant John Hunter, who died Feb. 19 at Tucson, Arizona, passed through here this morning, accompanied by his widow, to Windsor, N. S., for interment, to take place tomorrow.

He was eighteen years in the admiralty, and at one time was stationed at Carleton, St. John, and was 39 years old.

THE LATE MR. HENDERSON.

Former Fredericton Printer who Achieved Distinction in New York.

John Henderson, employed on the New York Herald for thirty-five years as compositor, foreman and night editor, whose death at his home in Toronto on Sunday was mentioned in Monday's Herald, belonged to the old school of newspaper men who began at the printer's case and acquired a practical knowledge of his profession, step by step. He was born at Miramichi, N. B. on March 4, 1839, and began work as a printer on the Chatham Gleaner when twelve years old. He worked as a printer in various Canadian cities including Fredericton, and went to New York and began work in the composing room of the Herald in 1860. He was soon promoted to the position of foreman, and for many years the reputation of Jack Henderson as a make-up man was known from Boston to San Francisco. In this position he worked nearly twenty years, when he was made night editor. The Herald was for several years deeply interested in the building up its foreign service. As night editor Mr. Henderson exhibited the same energy and aptitude he had shown as foreman in the composing room. He was night editor of the Herald until 1895, when failing health compelled him to retire from active work on a pension. Since then he has lived most of his time in Canada.

The P. E. Island legislature, which opened Friday afternoon, adjourned Saturday until April 4. The main object of the meeting was to deal with the situation in the second district of Kings, where Premier Peters and his opponent, H. D. McEwen, were declared by the returning officer to have the same number of votes. On motion of Hon. George Simpson, acting leader, a resolution was passed that the lieutenant-governor-in-council issue a writ for a new election. The writ will be issued immediately.
