A CREDITABLE SHOWING.

The I.C.R. express to this city yesterday four delayed four hours by the storm and came in under double header and snowplow. The outgoing express, in charge of Conductor Yerza, went right through to Loggieville last night and was only an hour and a half behind schedule time. This afternoon's express was an hour late in reaching the city. The Fredericton and Loggieville division of the I. C. R. enjoys the rather unique distinction of being the only branch line in the Maritime Provinces that has had no serious interruption of traffic during the present winter. Assistant Superintendent Hoben and the other officials of the road are veterans in the snow fighting business, and they have good reason to be proud of the showing they have made this season.

MRS. MEDLEY'S FUNERAL.

The funeral of the late Mrs. Margaret Medley will be held from her late residence, Bishopscote, at 2.30 o'clock tomorrow afternoon. The remains will be carried to the Cathedral, where services will be conducted by Bishop Kingston, Dean Partridge, Sub Dean Street, Canon Roberts and other clergy of the diocese. All details have not been completed, but it is understood that the arrangements will be of the simplest character. The full choir of the Cathedral will furnish music. Interment will be made in the lot at the east end of the Cathedral, where repose the remains of the late Metropolitan.

THE SNOW BLOCKADE.

Mr. J. J. McCaffrey, who came up from St. John last night, says that the C. P. R. have had their chief difficulty with the snow blockade at Shantytown, two miles this side of Fairville. There is a cut at that point nearly a quarter of a mile long and the snow is piled on either side to a height of fully 30 feet. He says there are 457 freight cars stalled in sidings sidings between Fredericton Junction and Fairville, most of them loaded with goods for the winter port steamers. One long freight train he saw in a siding was nearly covered with snow. Mr. McCaffrey adds that he never saw so much snow in St. John.

APPOINTMENTS MADE.

Messrs. W. Harrison and Kenneth Chestnut to Lecture at U. N. B.

The vacancy on the academic staff, of the U. N. B., caused by the resignation of Professor Jack, will not be filled at present. The committee, composed of Dr. Inch and Chancellor Harrison, to whom the matter was referred, have engaged Mr. William Harrison, B. A. I., of the Board of Works office, and Mr. Kenneth Chestnut, of this city, to continue Prof. Jack's work for the remainder of the term. Mr. Harrison will lecture on bridge building and other phases of engineering work and Mr. Chestnut will assist Dr. Scott as lecturer on electrical engineering. Mr. John Clawson, who is now acting as lecturer in astronomy, will also assist in the engineering department.

The senate feels that an appointment to the vacant chair of engineering should not be made without some careful consideration, and they do not think it would be wise to undertake to fill the vacancy during the present term. The arrangements made by the committee, while only temporary, are not likely to impair the efficiency of the engineering department.

Messrs. Harrison and Chestnut entered upon their duties yesterday.

It is understood that Prof. Jack offered to supply a man willing to undertake the work only with the understanding that he was to receive a permanent appointment.
