

RUSSIA ACTIVE.

Pacific Squadron Will Sail
from Libau at End of
January.SITUATION DISCUSSED BY PRESS
OF ST. PETERSBURG.No Peace Until the Czar's Troops
Win Victories.HONORS CONFERRED UPON RUSSIAN
GENERALS BY EMPEROR
WILHELM.

(Special to Daily Herald.)

St. Petersburg, Jan. 10.—The Russ today confirms the Paris Telegram's report yesterday that the first division of the Pacific squadron will leave Libau at the end of January.

It will consist of the warships Admiral Senjavin, General Admiral Apraxens, Admiral Oushakpff, Nicholas I., and Cruisers Vladimir and Monomach, several torpedo boat destroyers and torpedo boats.

In a lengthy review of the situation Novre Vremya argued for the immediate reinforcement of the Vladivostok Island, Sikland and Kamchatka. The paper says:

"There is little probability of the Russians being caught unprepared at Vladivostok as at Port Arthur. The moral responsibility rests upon the government, and nothing in the way of defensive preparation should be overlooked. Sikland and Kamchatka are both harder to defend and both being rich in mineral and other resources are especially tempting."

Continuing Novae Vremya points out that the work of transporting reinforcements and supplies to Sikland and Kamchatka while the ice lasts should be done at once. Touching upon the general peace talk in the foreign press, the Novoe Vremya summarizes a list of Russian reverses during the war and asks if it is possible to consider the question of peace without substantial Russian victories.

London, Jan. 10.—A despatch from Port Louis to the Mail says:—Nothing has been heard of the Russian Baltic fleet. It is supposed to be sheltering in a harbor off Madagascar. Mysterious rumors here as to the approach of Japanese are being received in wireless messages.

AT PORT ARTHUR.

Tokio, Jan. 10.—The navy department says that the district covered by submarine mines takes in a radius of forty miles outside of Port Arthur. Reports have been received of the destruction and explosion of 395 of these mines to date.

Ten additional survivors of the third expedition of Japanese to block the entrance to Port Arthur have been found in the Russian hospitals. They have been transferred to the Japanese.

ON THE MOVE.

Port Said, Egypt, June 10.—The Division of Russian warships commanded by Rear-Admiral Retrosky left Suda Bay, Island of Crete on Sunday and was heading for this port.

Headquarters of the Japanese Army at Port Arthur, Jan. 6, via Yin Kow and Tien Tsin.—Five thousand men of the Russian garrison at Port Arthur were marched from the village of Yaptui on the shores of Pigeon Bay for 15 miles to the railway at Changtingtsu at 3 o'clock, and the other detachment followed soon after. Each detachment was accompanied by six loaded transport carts. The Russians during the night will be taken on special trains of open trucks to Dalny and there they will immediately embark for Japan on transports now waiting in that port.

The long procession of the remnants of the gallant Russian garrison was a pathetic spectacle. The first arrivals at Changtingtsu were four Drunken containing the staff of officers who had refused to give their parole. As the Japanese soldiers crowded about them with evident curiosity the faces of the Russian officers were an interesting study. All of them appeared to feel their humiliating position keenly and though some seemed resigned to their situation, others were resentful at being regarded with curiosity. The men looked to be well fed, but their

faces, like those of the officers, indicated the awful physical strain they had undergone.

The prisoners were treated with the greatest kindness and respect. The soldiers were given food, cigarettes, and beer, and the correspondent of the Associated Press saw Japanese soldiers voluntarily carrying the effects of the prisoners when they were overcome by fatigue.

JAPANESE CELEBRATE VICTORY.

New York, Jan. 9.—The fall of Port Arthur was celebrated here on Sunday at a mass meeting of Japanese residents of the city, held in Carnegie Hall. The affair was intended to be solely for the Japanese residents, 400 of whom attended, and the only invited guests were General Stewart L. Woodford, former Minister to Spain, and Alexander Tison, both of whom spoke.

Vancouver, Jan. 9.—The local Japanese colony celebrated the fall of Port Arthur on Saturday. Several Japanese orators delivered speeches.

APOPLEXY THE CAUSE.

Hockey Team Manager Died While
Watching a Game.

Russian Generals Honored.

Berlin, Jan. 10.—Emperor William has conferred on Generals Stoessel and Nogi the order of "Un Pour Le Merit" in recognition of the bravery of themselves and their troops at Port Arthur. His Majesty has asked the Russian and Japanese emperors to authorize Generals Stoessel and Nogi to accept the decoration.
