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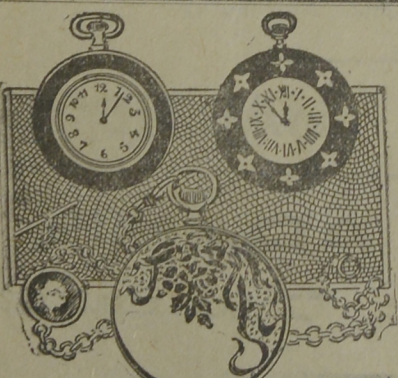

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MURDER AND PILLAGE.

Reign Supreme at Odessa and Warsaw.

POPULATION OF THE FORMER CITY ARE PANIC STRICKEN.

Warsaw, Nov. 2.—(Special)—It now appears that thirty persons were killed and over one hundred wounded during the conflicts last night.

Instead of the expected abolition of martial law today, the military governor had the walls covered with proclamations announcing that in consequence of yesterday's disturbances, crowds assembling on the streets would be dispersed by force of arms.

Odessa, Nov. 2.—Anarchy is ramp-

ant. Killing and plundering by bands of hundreds of "Loyalists" continue today.

Last night was made hideous by bodies of "Loyalists" with whom the police are fraternizing, marching the principal streets, bearing national flags, and portraits of the emperor, singing national hymns, smashing everything in their way and looting shops and houses.

Hospital wagons passed constantly carrying off the killed, wounded or mutilated. The population is panic stricken.

THE END OF IT ALL.

West Hastings Bogus Ballot Box Cases Will Now Retire from the Limelight.

Belleville, Ont., Nov. 2.—(Special)—The last of the famous bogus ballot-box cases was disposed at the assizes here, when police magistrate, Sam Harryette of Bancroft, was found not guilty of conspiracy in connection with bogus boxes.

E. F. B. Johnston, counsel for defense, practically accused John Bremner of trying to shift the blame which rightly belonged to him to Harryette, and built up a strong case against Bremner.

The judge summed up clearly, and quite impartially. The jury was out 35 minutes, and returned a verdict of not guilty.

The criminal libel case, the King vs. Carman, which arose from strictures made by the Daily Ontario, Carman's paper, on E. Gus. Porter, M. P., in connection with the bogus ballot boxes, was settled, the defendant agreeing to publish an apology, and pay costs.

This ends the libel proceedings in the celebrated ballot-box scandal of West Hastings.

WELCOMED PRINCE LOUIS.

British Admiral and His Squadron Given Cordial Reception at Annapolis, Md.

PRINCE CREATED FAVORABLE IMPRESSION AT OPENING CEREMONIES.

Annapolis, Md., Nov. 2.—The commander-in-chief of the North Atlantic fleet, the superintendent of the Naval Academy, and the Governor of Maryland, yesterday welcomed Rear Admiral Prince Louis of Battenberg, and the armored cruiser squadron under his command, to the United States. Strictly according to regulations as the several official welcomes have been, each has been characterized by genuine hospitality.

Twenty-one guns from the Drake announced the approach up Chesapeake Bay yesterday morning, shortly after nine o'clock, of Prince Louis' squadron. The weather was perfect. A light breeze set every flag in motion.

Prince Louis stood on the bridge of his flagship at the front of the column of leaden-colored cruisers and gazed on the scene with evident pleasure. Immediately ahead, stretched out across the bay to welcome him, were the eight battleships of the first and second divisions of the North Atlantic fleet, anchored in single column some 200 yards apart, the Maine at the head of the column flying the pennant of Rear Admiral Evans and the Missouri, Kentucky, Kearsarge, Alabama, Illinois, Iowa, and Massachusetts, in the order named. Three miles further toward the shore five smaller craft could be discerned from the bridge of the Drake. They were the boats of the destroyer flotilla, the Hopkins, McDonough, Lawrence, Worden and Stewart, which arrived over night and anchored well up in the harbor. The background of the picture was formed by the massive granite buildings of the Naval Academy.

As the Drake began the firing of the national salute, the American flag was hoisted at the main. When the Maine returned the salute, the English ensign was hoisted on the American ship.

Rear Admiral Evans was then saluted by the Drake with 13 guns, and 13 guns from the Maine immediately carried back the salute to the British Rear Admiral. A salute of 13 guns was later exchanged between the Drake and shore station.

The British squadron steamed past Admiral Evans' squadron to positions about 600 yards inside, and came to anchor in single column parallel with the American battleships. Straightway a boarding officer put out from the Maine for the Drake, and presented to Prince Louis Admiral Evans' respects. Arrangements were then made for the official list of Prince Louis upon Ad-

miral Evans. As Prince Louis' barge came alongside the starboard gangway of the Maine, Admiral Evans, Captain Niles commanding the Maine, and the officer of the deck were at the gangway to greet him, and assembled on the quarterdeck were Captain John E. Pillsbury, chief of staff, and the fleet officers of Admiral Evans' staff.

From the Maine, Prince Louis and his flag lieutenant went aboard the Alabama, flagship of Rear Admiral Davis, commanding the second division of the first squadron, the Alabama firing 13 guns as the Prince left the ship.

When Prince Louis returned to the Drake, he received the aide of Rear Admiral Sands, the superintendent of the Naval Academy, and Capt. Ryan, naval attaché of the British Embassy at Washington. Prince Louis, accompanied by his flag lieutenant, then started up the harbor for Annapolis to pay his respects to Admiral Sands and Governor Warfield. He was greeted at the boat landing of the Naval Academy by Admiral Sands and his aide. Drawn up to render the prescribed salute was a company of marines. Awaiting him was Governor Warfield's carriage, in which the Prince and Admiral Sands drove to the latter's residence, whence, after a few minutes, the Prince drove to the Governor's mansion and paid his official call upon Governor Warfield. The Prince was met at the front door by the governor and given a hearty reception. After the first official exchanges the visit was informal. The governor was assisted in receiving by the members of his staff in full uniform.

The Prince was most democratic in the manner in which he greeted the governor and staff. The Prince chatted with little Emma Warfield, who is only six years old.

"I have a little boy just your age" said his highness.

"What's his name?" the governor's daughter asked.

The prince replied: "He has nine names, one of which is Louis, but we call him Dick."

The prince's health was then drunk informally, and he returned to the Drake, where at half past one in the afternoon he received the return call of Admiral Evans. Later in the afternoon Admiral Sands and Governor Warfield and the commanding officers of the American ships paid their respects to the British junior officers of each cruiser.

DALHOUSIE OUTPLAYED THE UNIVERSITY OF NEW BRUNSWICK.

Champions Rolled up a Score of 16 to 0 Against the Visiting Team in a Loosely Played Game.

Halifax Chronicle.—Dalhousie won from the University of New Brunswick Tuesday 16-0, the same figures that the Halifax college scored against the New Brunswick boys when the latter were here two years ago. The day was a perfect one and about four hundred people saw the match.

Play was rather of a listless character, but although the visitors did not display very much knowledge of the game, they fought gamely to the end and several times nearly caught the yellow and blacks napping. Dalhousie made two tries and two goals, scoring twice in the first half, but twenty minutes elapsed in the second period before the third try was made, the fourth being scored a few minutes later.

In the first half the Dalhousie half backs came in for considerable work, and did some very pretty passing, both tries being obtained in that way. But in the second half, although the yellow and black forwards showed that they were disinclined to be strenuous, the scrim play was persisted in, and as the U. N. B. eight were working well they frequently got the ball. Their halves, however, showed that they knew little of combination work, and they thus were unable to profit by their chances. Dalhousie could without doubt have increased the score by dropping the wheeling scrim, and continuing the half back play of the first half.

Dalhousie played without Rankine, and made a couple of other changes. L. Buckley who played quarter in the first two league games, showed up well in the half line, while Sweet, at quarter back and Cameron among the forwards were promoted from the junior team. The yellow and black halves, however, now that they are bound for Havard, will have to practice hard. They passed well yesterday, but do not make enough ground at the same time, running across the field too much. U. N. B. had no hopes of winning, although they would have liked to have kept the score below the previous figures. They play Acadia today, and were looking for practice and experience.

THE GAME.

About eight minutes after the start of the game a pretty piece of passing between Buckley, McClellan and Baillie brought about the first try. Baillie getting across near touch. No goal was kicked, and the play remained almost wholly within the U. N. B. thirty-five. Hamilton was get-

ting the ball out well and the Dalhousie backs were getting considerable work. Hayward, the U. N. B. full back, was doing good work and MacLean on the opposite side did a lot of splendid punting. Baillie made several good, but unsuccessful drops for goal. MacRae (R.) dribbled the ball across the line, but the ball slipped from him and U. N. B. got a safety.

The second score was gained by good passing from Sweet to Hamilton to Buckley to Flemming. U. N. B. worked hard during the remainder of the half, and Dalhousie found herself on the defensive for some minutes.

THE SECOND HALF.

A pretty pick-up by Buckley almost led to a score near the opening of the second half, but Dalhousie was playing carelessly and U. N. B. got down inside their twenty-five. They failed, however, to down MacLean, and his punts kept the play up the field.

Dever, of the U. N. B., got in a good run, and Dalhousie, waking up, rushed it back to the U. N. B. line. A free kick to the U. N. B. relieved their goal. U. N. B. was getting the ball frequently, but her passing was weak, although her forwards were working well. Sharp following up of a kick by Dalhousie, led to the third try, Flemming falling on the ball between the posts, and the kicking of the goal put the figures at eleven. A couple of minutes later Buckley got across and Baillie's kick equalled the score of two years ago.

F. B. McCurdy, of the Wanderers, referred to the satisfaction of both teams.

A MONGTON FIRE.

Shop and Plant Used by I. C. R. Maintenance and Way Department Destroyed.

Moncton, Nov. 2.—(Special)—Fire this morning totally destroyed Hoppers' blacksmith shop near the northern Intercolonial crossing, also Bleakney's carpenter shop.

Hopper's shop, seventy by fifty, was headquarters for the maintenance and way department's blacksmith work.

Large quantities of tools, a twenty horse power engine, a large iron lathe, two Bertram drills, sawing machine, five frogs, were almost totally destroyed. The loss of Bleakney's shop was chiefly eight thousand feet of flooring and sheathing destroyed.

ANOTHER MAMMOTH DEER.

The carcass of a monster deer shot on the Yoho stream yesterday by Mr. Clovis Bastarache, of Kingsclear was brought to the city this morning and sold to Deputy Surveyor General Flewelling for the Crown Land office collection. Mr. Bastarache was accompanied on the trip by Messrs. Edward Goodine, Patrick Dobalen and Gabe Palchies. The animal was sighted just after it had waded the stream, and it took six shots to bring him down. The carcass was dragged two miles to a tote road, it was then loaded upon a wagon and taken to French Village. It was weighed this morning and tipped the scales at 250 pounds. Emack Bros. will mount the deer for the crown land department.
