NO USE FOR CANADIANS.

Judge Winchester's Report a Severe Arraignment of G. T. P. Tactics.

Ottawa, March 1.—The report of Judge Winchester, employed to investigate the alleged employment of aliens on the Grand Trunk Pacific, has been published. It says:

"As a result of the evidence taken before me during the investigation I am of the opinion that there was no earnest endeavor to obtain Canadian engineers for the location of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway by those having authority to employ such."

"That had such an effort been made, there would have been no trouble in obtaining a sufficient number of capable men not only of locating but of constructing the whole work."

"In the word engineers I include all from the chief engineer and harbor engineer to the transmitters, draughtsmen, levellers and topographers."

"There was, however, a very earnest desire to obtain American engineers for the work, and in some cases applications were made to the heads of other railway companies to relieve men for the purpose of having them brought to Canada to be em-

ployed on this road. I have already stated the number of American engineers so employed.

"I find also from the evidence that the Canadian engineers are not inferior to the American engineers for the work in question, but having a superior knowledge of the country, they are better qualified for that work."

"I also desire to state that the Canadian engineers are not asking for protection for themselves, but merely desire that no discrimination be made against them. That discrimination has been made against them, in my opinion, there is no doubt."

The report is very severe on Mr. Stephens, the G. T. P. engineer.

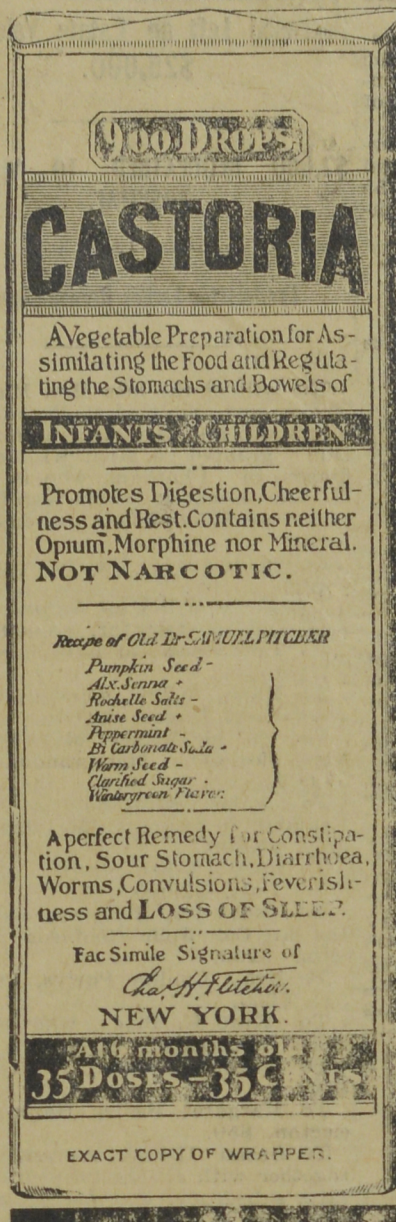

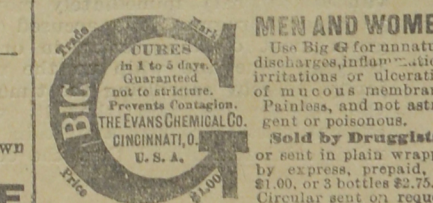
