

LIBERAL PARTY NEVER MORE SOLID.

Mr. Calverton Unity of Following a nd Prestige of Leader

Montreal Herald.—Mr. W. S. Calverton, M. P., chief Government whip in the House of Commons who arrived here from Ottawa on a short visit in the course of a little talk on political affairs at the Windsor hotel is not expected to debate on the tariff question in Parliament will occupy more than about a month.

"While the inquiry has been most exhaustive, while the testimony offered with regard to industrial cravings has been most voluminous and while the ministers have shown the most exemplary energy and patience in the quest of information and listening to the cases presented nobody expects that there will be very drastic changes in the tariff.

"I should say that a few weeks ought to furnish the most ample time to dispose of whatever proposals may be made.

"The tariff will be the chief business of the session. That was and is the intention. There will be the usual legislation and the House will have plenty to occupy it, but I know of no question of vital importance to the country that is likely to prolong deliberations through the summer."

"How does the Liberal party stand at the present time?"

"This was a question upon which Mr. Calverton might be expected, as Liberal whip, to give an expert opinion.

PARTY NEVER STOOD SO WELL

The reply was electric. "The Liberal party," he said, "never in its history stood so well. You know what she majority is. It was never more complete, never more united, never presented a better front before the country."

"Opposition organs have been giving expression to dark hints of a revolt among Ontario members. Is there any foundation at all for such a supposition?"

"Absolutely none. The party in Ontario is perfectly united. There is hardly ever a murmur within the ranks."

"Of course the young men who have been fighting the battle of the party in the constituencies, doing the work that the older leaders did in years gone by, are pressing forward and looking for recognition, but there is nothing that could be called dissatisfaction apparent anywhere.

"The recent ministerial changes have been very cordially approved in

most quarters. It was felt that British Columbia was entitled to a representative in the Cabinet and Mr. Templeman who has been a minister without a portfolio for many years, was the proper man for the position. I do not think Quebec with its great numerical strength in the Cabinet including the Premier, who, to put it moderately, is equal to at least four ordinary ministers, has any reason to complain, and Ontario is not dissatisfied with the arrangement.

"I do not think there could be any more striking evidence of the popularity of the Prime Minister than has been evidenced by the great banquet which it is proposed to give him in Toronto on the 21st February. At first it was intended that the banquet should be held at the King Edward Hotel; but the demand for tickets was so great that we found that guests could not be accommodated there as the hotel cannot seat more than between three and four hundred. Then it was decided to hold the banquet in the Massey Hall, which is the largest place we can get suitable for the purpose. It is capable of furnishing accommodation for about 850, but there again we are confronted with a dilemma for the applications for tickets number over 1,200.

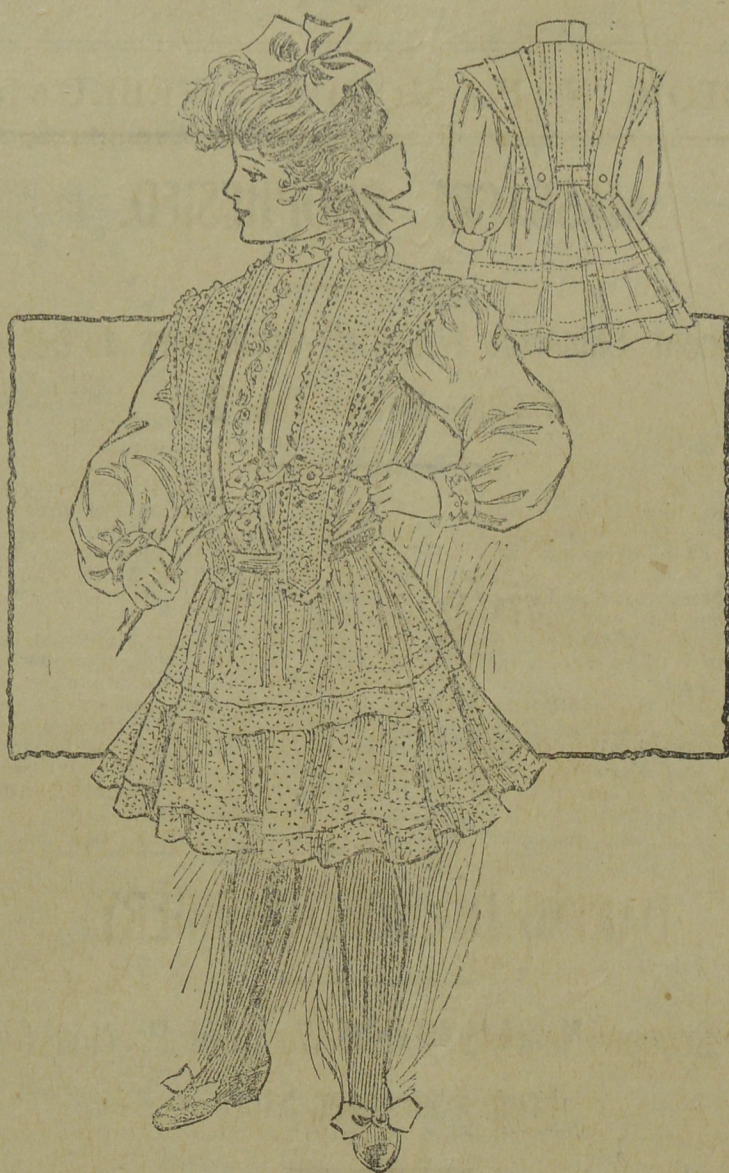
"But everywhere we see evidence of the powerful hold that Sir Wilfrid has upon the country."

EX-MINISTERIAL PENSION MAY BE CHANGED.

"Have you heard anything of a proposal to amend the legislation of last session with regard to the annuities to ministers who have retired from public service?" Mr. Calverton was asked.

"There is undoubtedly a feeling in favor of a change in that respect," replied Mr. Calverton. "That vote of a pension to ex-ministers will very likely be changed. Just what form the change may take I am not in a position to say, but a good many Liberals think that the annuity should only be given to those who require and who apply for it as I think is the case who require it get an income of \$10,000. The onus and responsibility of deciding upon the merits of the application should rest, I think, with the Government in power."

FORTY MILLIONS MORE C. P. R. STOCK.

It will be a big Melon for the Shareholders.

Montreal, Feb. 8.—This afternoon Sir Thomas Shaughnessy made the following statement to the press:

"The official Gazette of Saturday will contain a notice of special meeting of the shareholders of the Canadian Pacific Railroad Company, to be held at the head office of the company in Montreal, March 19, for the purpose of considering and acting upon the recommendation of the directors that the ordinary share capital of the company be increased from the present authorized amount of one hundred and ten million dollars, of which the amount of one hundred and one million four hundred thousand dollars has already been issued, to one hundred and fifty million dollars.

"In view of the great increase in the company's business and its continued expansion it is desirable that immediate provision be made for still further increasing the facilities of the company on every section of its system. The directors have therefore decided, subject to the approval of the shareholders, at the special meeting, to make an issue immediately thereafter, of twenty million two hundred and eighty thousand dollars of primary capital stock, being eight million six hundred thousand dollars already authorized by the shareholders, and eleven million six hundred and eighty thousand dollars of the proposed increase, thus making the total amount outstanding one hundred and eighty thousand dollars, and, as in the case of previous issues of new stock, to give the shareholders of the ordinary capital stock the privilege of subscribing for the same at par in the proposition of one share of new stock to five shares of their registered holdings, on the closing of the transfer books for this purpose on Friday, April 20, 1906."

Rev. Mr. Maxwell of Brantford preached the sermon from the words "Endure hardness as a good soldier of Jesus Christ." The address was a ringing call to duty under the great Captain of our salvation.

Rev. R. G. McBeth of Paris addressed the new pastor in appropriate language.

Rev. Dr. E. R. Hutt, interim Moderator of the Sessions of Chalmers Church, then addressed the congregation, and pointed out in a plain but interesting way the duties of the members of the congregation in their relation to the pastor.

At the close a hearty welcome was extended to Mr. Dickie by the congregation, and he begins the duties of his new pastorate under most favorable and encouraging circumstances.

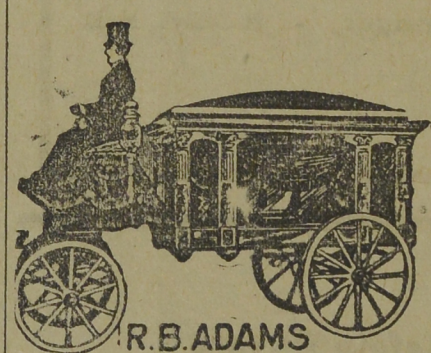

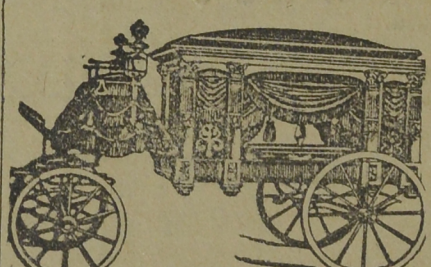

FOR OUR OWN PROTECTION.

What Canada Should do Towards Imperial Defence.

Toronto Globe.—"How Canada can best contribute to Imperial defence" was the subject of a paper prepared by Lieut-Colonel Mason and read on his behalf before the United Empire Loyalists' Association last night. The paper commenced with figures showing the expense of maintaining the army and navy, which cost Great Britain and Ireland last year about \$300,000,000, to which the people of Canada contributed \$200,000. Colonel Mason's contention was that it was Canada's duty to do more as a matter of self-protection, for without the protection of the navy and army the Dominion would be at the mercy of any power which desired to take possession of Canada. He argued how without any heavy burden upon the people of Canada they could contribute more liberally towards the militia, and he advocated a return to the system of military schools in addition to the present system and went on to state that where 10 qualified now, under the old system 100 would qualify for commissions in the militia. Any young man, properly recommended, could qualify before starting in the business of life not necessarily to take up a commission. These men, many of them returning to their vari-

ous districts, would no doubt be glad to act as instructors for the boys at the public schools, and would thus obviate the difficulty now felt in drilling such boys.

Boys in the schools throughout the Dominion should be given a certain amount of military training. With regard to the navy Canada should contribute one battleship every few years, and this would cost probably \$1 per head of the population, distributed over that period. The upkeep would not amount to more than ten cents per head. In that way Canada would be removing the justifiable reproach that she benefited by the army and navy without contributing to their support.

Colonel Mason also strongly advocated a system of naval militia, pointing out that there were many men on our coasts and on our lake shores who could receive naval training in the same way that the land forces were trained. In this way England would have material for the fleet from which she could draw in times of need. Any power, or combination of powers, contemplating an attack upon the empire would have to reckon with the assistance given by her colonies.

MORMON LEADERS SWAY SUPREME.

Implicit Obedience to Priesthood Demanded Declares Witness—
"Brigham Young our King"
Favorite Song.

Washington, Feb. 9.—The Woodruff manifesto was declared to have been of no effect in the Mormon church by a witness at the Senator Smoot hearing today, because it was never approved by a quorum of apostles, Henry W. Lawrence, an aged business man, who has held several public offices, including the territorial nar-shalship, gave the testimony.

Ex-Secretary Carlisle, attorney for the protestants against Smoot, brought out considerable interesting testimony from Mr. Lawrence, but finally that about the manifesto was eliminated, because he declined to give the name of his informant.

Several witnesses testified about the oath-taking, house oath of vengeance, which Mr. Lawrence said was: "I covenant and agree, before that we will avenge the blood of the saints."

He added that he had administered the oath many times before becoming an apostate, and that he had often heard it administered by others. None of the witnesses, however, had heard the words "nation" or "United States" used in immediate connection with the oath of vengeance.

The necessity of implicit obedience to the priesthood was emphasized, Charles A. Smurthwaite said he had been expelled from the church for engaging in the salt business, contrary to the wishes of President

Smith. The preponderance of Mormons in state and federal offices was testified to by Charles Owens, who has been employed in getting evidence against Senator Smoot.

During his testimony Mr. Lawrence referred frequently to the tyranny of the priesthood that existed during his membership in the church, and Chairman Burrows asked if that tyranny existed today. The witness said there was more liberality shown now but that a man who desired to continue in good standing in the church must obey the leaders in all things.

In regard to teachings of the church he said that nowhere in the books was there to be found anything directing loyalty to the government, and that they sang a song containing the lines "Brigham Young is our King." He said that from the preachings he had heard he believed the teachings were the same today. He said that the revelation of polygamy must be believed by a good church member.

Mr. Carlisle said he thought he could close the Protestants' case tomorrow.
