Mr. Max Aitken, a New Brunswick Boy, Will Lead Col Drury's Daughter to the Matrimonial Altar.

Halifax, Jan. 29.—(Special)—The marriage takes place at the Garrison Chapel this evening of Miss Gladys Drury, daughter of Lieut. Col. Drury and W. Max Aitken, managing director of the Royal Securities Company of this city.

The bride will be attended by her sister, Miss Edith Drury, while the groom will be supported by James A. Sears, of New Glasgow. The ushers will be S. Arnold Finlay, architect of Montreal, and G. W. Farrell.

The ceremony will be performed by Rev. Sub-Dean Crawford, uncle of the bride, who will be assisted by Rev. J. B. C. Murphy, chaplain of the imperial forces.

The wedding will be the chief social event of the week, and a large number of invitations have been issued. The presents received are numerous, handsome and valuable and come from friends from Montreal, Quebec, Hamilton, Toronto, Ottawa, Kingston and from England.

Mrs. Aitken, of Newcastle, mother of Mr. Aitken, and B. D. Aitken, his brother, have arrived to attend the wedding, and among others here for the same purpose are W. D. Ross, of Toronto, manager of the Metropolitan Bank, and Heber Vroom, St. John.

ENORMOUS NEW YORK STRIKE.

Proposed Walkout of the 150,000 Structural Workers of the Great Metropolis.

New York, Jan. 29.—(Special)—A strike, embracing 150,000 men and involving the entire building industry of New York, is now being aimed at by the structural steel workers of the city.

Such a desperate step is necessary, they say, in order to preserve their waning organization from complete ruin, as the result of a strike in which they have been engaged for the past seven weeks.

Delegates of the Housewrights' and Bridgemen's Union which embraces the structural steel workers, prevailed on the Central Federated Union yesterday, to order every labor organization still at peace with their employers, to break those peaceful relations and ally themselves with the strikers. If they fail to do so, they are suspended from the Central Federated Union.

An extraordinary situation will thus be created. A large number of

the labor unions, among them the Carpenters, Stonecutters, Roofers, Masons, Plasterers, are not only at peace with the Building, Trades and Employers' association, but many of them are represented by a board of arbitration composed of both employers and workers. Should they stick to the structural steel workers, they will not only have to strike, but also will have to withdraw from or repudiate the principle of arbitration which they have upheld.

Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor is also to be appealed to by the structural steel workers, who have been in hard luck ever since their leader, Sam Parks, died. Their present strike involves sky scrapers going up all over the city. They have been nearly overwhelmed they say, by strike breakers brought here from other cities. Only yesterday 200 of these passed through Jersey City, on their way to New York.

A THRIVING CONCERN.

Enormous Profit of the Ottawa Street Car Service.

Ottawa, Jan. 22.—(Special)—The net profit of the Ottawa Street Railway company for the past year was \$143,300, or 14.3-10 per cent. on the capital stock of the company, (\$1,000,000) being the largest per cent. of net profit on any street railway in Canada.

Much of the time she had a part of the audience in tears. The hall was packed.

IDENTIFIED.

Winnipeg, Jan. 29.—(Special)—In the recent inquiry regarding Dr. W. H. Harris, who committed suicide at Rome, Italy, a few days ago, W. J. Gibbons, of the Winnipeg Grain Exchange recognized the dead man's photograph as that of Dr. W. H. Harris, who practiced at Killarney. A photograph was also recognized by Dr. John Gray, who knew Dr. W. H. Harris, who practiced at Killarney some three or four years.

KING CHRISTIAN DEAD.

Copenhagen, Jan. 29.—(Special)—King Christian of Denmark, and father of the Queen of England, died today. He was 85 years old.

SIR EDWARD THORNTON DEAD.

London, Jan. 29.—(Special)—Sir Edward Thornton, a former British minister at Washington, is dead, after a lengthy illness.

Sir Edward Thornton was born in 1817 and entered the British diplomatic service in 1842. He served as minister to Brazil from 1865 to 1867. From 1867 to 1881 he was British minister at Washington. In the latter year he was transferred to St. Petersburg, and in 1884 to Constantinople. He retired on a pension in 1886.

SECOND CHILD DEAD.

Little Fellow With His Deceased Brother Was Victim of Scalding Accident.

St. John, Jan. 29.—(Special)—Leslie Cusack, infant son of George Cusack, Marsh Road, who with his brother, Gregory, was scalded Friday, died at 5 o'clock this morning.

It was thought yesterday that the child would recover, but a change for the worse took place in the evening. The funeral takes place tomorrow.

Little Gregory was buried yesterday.

RALPH ST. J. FREEZE THE WINNER.

Unanimously Awarded the U. N. B.'s Second Rhodes Scholarship.

A BRILLIANT CAREER AS A STUDENT.

Mr. Ralph St. John Freeze, of the teaching staff of the Rothesay Collegiate school, has been awarded the second Rhodes' scholarship from New Brunswick. The scholarship this year belongs to the University of New Brunswick and the selection committee which is composed of Chancellor Harrison and Profs. Raymond, Scott Bailey and Brittain met Saturday afternoon and decided the matter.

From a list of nine applicants Mr. Freeze was unanimously chosen on the first ballot.

The successful applicant is a son of Mr. J. Arthur Freeze, barrister of Sussex, formerly of this city, and a grandson of the late E. C. Freeze, at one time inspector of schools and afterwards inspector of weights and measures. He was born in St. John on June 8th, 1882, and is therefore in his twenty-fourth year. He completed a brilliant course at the U. N. B. in 1903 graduating with first class honors in mathematics, physics, science and chemistry. During his course at College he won the Brydone-Jack Memorial for proficiency in physics, the governor-general's gold medal for mathematics and mathematical physics and the alumni gold medal for the best Latin essay.

After graduating from college, Mr. Freeze occupied an appointment on the teaching staff of the Rothesay Collegiate School. He was an applicant for the first Rhodes scholarship awarded by the U. N. B. two years ago to Mr. Chester Martin and came very near winning it.

Principal Moore of the Rothesay school, in a letter to Chancellor Harrison supporting Mr. Freeze's application says of him:

"In appearance, in address, in physique, in public spirit, in scholarly attainments and in general excellence of character, Mr. Freeze approaches the ideal type of a University man, and as the professors confidently recommend him to me in 1903, I believe that I can now more confidently recommend him to those who have the responsibility of selecting the Rhodes scholar for next year, and as a young man who will, if selected, fully appreciate the honor and all the benefits which it carries and who will while at Oxford, fully justify the high hopes and confidence which such an appointment implies."

Concerning Mr. Freeze's athletic prowess Mr. Moore writes:

"He has also ably assisted the college in athletics. During the past three seasons he has played on our football team, which has made records unsurpassed in the history of the school. He was also a member of one of the teams in the St. John city league and was this year selected to play with the St. John team in their match against all Halifax."

Mr. Freeze has been a student at the St. John Law School for some time past and has made excellent progress. He has developed greatly as a debater since leaving college, and recently led the winning side in an important debate at the Law school.

THE RHODES SCHOLARSHIP.

The scholarships are provided from a fund left for the purpose by the great empire builder, the late Hon. Cecil Rhodes, and are of the value of \$1,500 per annum and tenable for three years. The winner of a scholarship is required to take a three year's course at Oxford University.

Candidates for Rhodes scholarships must be British subjects and unmarried. They must have passed their 19th birthday but not have passed their 25th birthday on October 1st of the year for which they are elected.

Only candidates who have passed an equivalent to the Oxford responsibility examination or those who are exempted from responses by the colonial universities' statute, are eligible for election. The University of New Brunswick has been admitted to the privilege of the statute, so that its candidates for Rhodes scholarships are accepted without further examination.

The scholarship is made quarterly, the first payment of \$375 being made during the first week of Michaelmas term.

Mr. Freeze's many Fredericton friends will be much pleased to hear of his success and will unite with the Herald in extending congratulations.

In conversation with a Telegraph reporter Mr. Freeze said that he was naturally elated when he received a telegram from Chancellor Harrison of the U. N. B., stating that he was the unanimous choice of the faculty for the Rhodes' scholarship. He said that he intends to pursue his law studies at Oxford and also expects on his return to take the degree of B. C. L. from the St. John Law School. He would probably leave for England about the last of September.

ANOTHER RHODES' SCHOLAR.

Mr. Arthur G. Cameron Selected to Represent P. E. Island.

Charlottetown, P. E. I., Jan. 28.—Yesterday Arthur G. Cameron, aged twenty-four a native of Montague, was nominated Rhodes' scholar for P. E. I. by a committee composed of Lieut. Governor McKinnon, Chief Justice Sullivan, Dr. Anderson, chief superintendent of education, Dr. Robertson, principal of Prince of Wales' College, and Rev. Dr. Curran, principal of St. Dunstan's College.

Mr. Cameron is now in senior arts at Queen's University, Kingston, specializing in Latin and English history and ranking high in his classes. He will receive his M. A. degree next May.

He is one of the best athletes the Island has produced. He stands over six feet and has a magnificent physique. As a member of the Abegweit Athletic Club he swept prize after prize in the maritime provinces. He now holds the maritime province record for quarter and half mile bicycle.

THE TARIFF COMMISSION.

Halifax, Jan. 29.—(Special)—The opening session of the tariff commission was held at the Board of Trade rooms this morning, Hon. Mr. Fielding presiding. The attendance was large and quite a number of delegations were present from outside the city.

W. J. Clayton and L. J. Mylius, speaking for the Board of Trade, advocated that the preference on British goods be only extended when goods are imported through Canadian ports.

The Farmers' Association asked that duties on farming implements be reduced, and that no increase be made in the tariff.

SEAT FOR BALFOUR.

London, Jan. 29.—(Special)—At a meeting of the Conservative association of the city of London today the resignation of A. G. Gibbs, a member of parliament for the city of London was accepted and the candidature of Arthur J. Balfour for that constituency approved.

The Liberal association of London also met today, but has postponed until Friday, its decision whether to oppose the former Premier. Several Liberals expressed a willingness to contest the seat.

Three more Liberals and two Conservatives are returned as the result of Saturday's elections.

Charles Dyer, of Musquash, N. B., who was arrested at Fort Fairfield, Maine, charged with assault by fracturing the skull of Elias Dobson with a peevy in a lumber camp near Howe Brook station a week ago, was arraigned before the police court Friday. He pleaded not guilty waived examination and was held in \$5,000 for appearance at the April term of

the supreme court. He was committed to jail in default of bail. Dobson is at the eastern Maine General Hospital in Bangor in a critical condition.

EXPECT 1000 GUESTS.

Total of 4000 Invitations to White House Wedding Sent to Various Parts of the World.

Washington, D. C., Jan. 29.—The president and Mrs. Roosevelt issued the invitations today for the wedding of their daughter, Miss Alice, and Representative Nicholas Longworth. Those issued in this city were one-fourth of the 4,000 which have been engraved, the other 3,000 having been sent to various parts of the world. The invitation reads as follows:

"The President and Mrs. Roosevelt request the pleasure of your company at the wedding of their daughter, Alice Lee, and Mr. Nicholas Longworth, Saturday, February the seventeenth, twelve o'clock."

"An answer is requested." They are extremely plain. The president's seal, the eagle with outspread wings, is embossed in white at the top of the unfolded sheet, and on the flap of the envelope, and the words "White House" is embossed in white in the upper left hand corner.

It is believed that at least 1000 guests will be present. A statement was issued from the White House today that the guests will include "only the relatives of the bride and groom elect and their intimate friends and a small official list."

Miss Roosevelt and Mr. Longworth were the guests of honor at dinner Friday evening of the secretary of war and Mrs. Taft. The dinner was followed by a large reception to the members of the Philippine party.
