A GREAT ORGANIZER.

The Farmers and Dairymen's Association last evening gave a strong endorsement of the agricultural policy of the local government, by promptly bowing out a resolution to establish provisional schools of agriculture, moved by Mr. George E. Baxter of Andover. New Brunswick is without an agricultural college but the government has made arrangements by which, those in this province desiring advanced knowledge on agricultural matters can attend the excellent institution lately established at Truro. Mr. Hazen thought he saw in this arrangement a chance to score a point against the government, so he delegated organizer Hubbard to attend the Farmers' Convention and work up an agitation on the question. The organizer carried out his instructions and the result of his labors is seen in the resolution introduced by Mr. Baxter who was the only man who could be found in the whole convention to show any sympathy with the movement. Mr. Hubbard tried hard to get a practical farmer to second the resolution but failed and had to do the job himself. When the vote was taken it was found that the convention was overwhelmingly against the resolution, only the mover and seconder voting for it. Hon. Mr. Farris should certainly feel proud of this strong endorsement from the farmers of New Brunswick. Organizer Hubbard should go away back and sit down.

EXPENSE FOR DUTY.

During the holiday season when the hustling and popular Dominion Express agent in Fredericton, Mr. J. W. Smith, has had his office sometimes overflowing with packages containing tokens of good will from city residents to their far away friends, the musical voice of the agent might be heard in the familiar tones as he checked the goods to his deputy, "Expense for duty," the duty on the packages so marked being paid by the Express Company at the border and expensed back against the Fredericton Office.

Two other instances of expense for duty are related in regard to instruction in music for the pupils of the public schools, and it is to the credit of the parties concerned. One is that of Miss Richardson of the Model School, who, upon taking her first school and finding it laid down in the regulations that "provision should be made when practicable for a systematic course of instruction in music," set to work at once to become to some extent qualified as an instructor in the of rotation, by taking an expensive course in a school of correspondence, took the subject up in earnest with her pupils and succeeded in having them pass with honors through a thorough examination upon the work at the close of the term. This incident came out at the recent conference between the trustees and teachers here.

The second case is that of the late Mr. Meagher, formerly principal of the Regent Street School, and father of the present Mr. F. B. Meagher, school inspector. Principal Meagher who made no claim to musical attainments himself, engaged at a considerable expense the services of Mrs. John R. Costigan, formerly Miss Alta Dowling, daughter in law of the ex-minister of inland revenue as instructor in that subject, and in that way satisfied his personal convictions as to the obligation of discharging his duty under the rule.

These incidents go to show that the teaching fraternity only lack the opportunity to interest the pupils in this important branch of a general education.

Mr. Donald McMaster, the ex-Canadian Tory, M. P., did not receive enough votes in the Leigh division of Lancaster to elect him to the British House of Commons, but he seems to have made an excellent impression on the ladies of that constituency.

A London cable says:—"Mr. Donald McMaster, K. C., failed in his effort to wrest the Leigh division of Lancashire from the Liberal column. He was defeated by J. F. Brummer (Liberal) by 2,006, the vote being 7,175 to 5,169. The constituency has been Liberal for over twenty years, with majorities ranging in the neighborhood of a thousand. A MIDWINTER EXCURSION.

The Tug Lord Kitchener Made Remarkable Voyage Yesterday.

(St. John Telegraph.)

The above record, inscribed in the register at Belyea's, near Public Landing, across from the R. K. Y. Club summer rendezvous, at Carter's Point, tells the "farthest north" story of winter navigation on the St. John River.

The expedition, provisioned for six hours, left North Wharf shortly after one o'clock yesterday afternoon and boldly proceeded through the Falls and up the river. A little ice field was encountered off Westfield, and what a man who had once read a book on Arctic exploration said was "jolty" was seen near Wae's Landing.

At Carter's Point, the wall of ice extended clear across the river, but the Lord Kitchener ploughed her way through it for a quarter of a mile or so, until at a thickness of about five inches it began to resist her attacks.

By this time she had proceeded about a hundred yards farther than any previous midwinter expedition had been able to go, which was glory enough for even the distinguished party of daring navigators on her decks yesterday.

The ship was rammed another length into the ice, jammed hard against it, and a ladder put over the

side. The party disembarked and walked to the shore. They went to the store of Mr. Belyea and made a number of important purchases. Col. McLean was quickly in converse with a dainty little maiden, greatly to the discomfiture of Colonel Dunn, who edged around for an introduction, but was received with marked evidence of disfavor. He was in equal ill-luck later when he edged around where Mr. Stavert was basking in the smiles of four young ladies who were skating on the river. There is some doubt whether the collector will relate either of these incidents to his grandfather.

A flag was flung to the breeze at Belyea's in honor of the day, and a number of the neighbors came down to look over the party. When they learned that there were half a dozen bank managers in the lot, some of them retired to a safe distance. When the party had returned across the ice to the Kitchener, a quadrille was executed on the ice with much precision and effect by certain persons whose chief business it is to make other people dance, but whose names are withheld lest they should be annoyed by requests to repeat the performance of yesterday.

The Kitchener backed and turned, and with all safely stowed, set out on the return voyage. Some interesting presentations were then made. Mr. Cutler, who had made extensive purchases at Belyea's, presented souvenirs to Commander Moore, Mr. Kessen, Mr. Shadbolt, Mr. Blair, Col. McLean, Mr. Barnhill, Mr. Miller and some others. The nature of the gifts and the accompanying remarks provoked some light-minded persons to profane laughter, but the recipients were charmed with the delicate and considerate souvenirs of the esteem in which they were held by their fellow-citizens. For example, Commander Moore received a graceful eulogy and a fine-tooth comb, the purpose of the latter being "to remove his little troubles."

It should be observed that on the voyage up the party were entertained at luncheon, for Commander Moore insisted that Arctic explorers, to be successful, must be well fed. And they were both.

The return to Indiantown was a quick run, and the party were in the street cars bound city-ward shortly after 5 o'clock.

They will not come here to testify at this session.
