

PASSED THE ADDRESS.

Legislature Made Good Progress at Friday's Sitting—
Mr. Murray's Able Speech in Moving Address.

MR. ROBERTSON SECONDED, MR. HAZEN CRITICIZED AND PREMIER AND
MR. FARRIS FULLY REPLIED.

The House met Friday at three o'clock.
Hon. Mr. Tweedie laid before the House the bonded indebtedness of Woodstock.
Hon. Mr. Sweeney introduced a bill for the protection of feathered game. He explained that it referred to geese, brant, duck, partridge and Woodcock. It did not change the season but it provided a license for non-residents.

Mr. Hazen gave notice of enquiry in regard to the Highway Superintendent of Sunbury and Queens, the cost of the Consolidated Statutes and the expenses of the deal and dumb investigation.

Mr. Smith gave notice of enquiry with regard to the receipt and expenditures of the New Brunswick Coal and Railway Company and the Hartland Bridge revenue.

Mr. Morrison gave notice of enquiry with regard to the issue of provincial debentures since last session.

Mr. Grimmer gave notice of enquiry with regard to the crown prosecutions by the Attorney General.

Mr. Maxwell gave notice of enquiry with regard to the revenue from royalties on coal and tenders for the New Brunswick Coal and Railway Co.

DEBATE ON THE ADDRESS.

The order of the day being called, Mr. Murray rose to move the address in reply to the speech from the throne. He said:

I rise to perform this duty with more than usual amount of fear and trembling experienced on such occasions, realizing as I do my incapacity to deal properly with the several matters which should engage my attention at this time. However it seems to have become the custom of the junior member of the House to be placed in this position, and therefore I find myself where I am at present, not because of any abilities or fitness of mind for the occasion, but because of my being the baby of the House.

I understand that it has sometimes been asserted by the second that the mover has so fully coveted the ground that he has left little or nothing to be said by the second, but I wish to assure this gentleman who will follow me that he will have no reason to complain on this score as I shall not use up all the thunder but shall leave the major portion of it to be utilized by him.

The House has been called together this year by His Honor the Lieutenant-Governor at an earlier period than has of late been the custom and I think action in this respect will meet with the approval of honourable members as it is as well that the business of the past year should be closed up at as early a date as possible, besides which to a large majority it is more convenient to have the session closed before the rush of the spring and summer business begins.

I am sure that the Hon. members of the House will fully concur in the statements expressed in the speech of His Honour in reference to the visit of His Serene Highness Prince Louis of Battenburg. The people of the whole province rejoice at the honor paid us by the visit of His Serene Highness and were delighted to give him and his party a right hearty welcome to this loyal province of our well beloved sovereign, who has proved himself such a capable and worthy successor of the late lamented Victoria the good.

The sad and unexpected death of Honorable Raymond Prefontaine, late minister of finance, cast a gloom over the whole of Canada and our grief was accentuated by the facts of his being cut off in the prime of manhood, in the midst of his usefulness and in a foreign land away from his home and family.

Mr. Prefontaine, at any early age in life, attracted attention by his extraordinary abilities, his force of character and his untiring energy. These were so recognized that when quite a young man he became one of the leading citizens of his native city, the metropolis of Canada, where in contravention of all precedents, he was four times in succession elected mayor.

The admirable manner in which he served the public in that and other capacities, so brought him to the front that some few years ago he was elevated to the high and honorable position of minister of marine and fisheries for the Dominion of Canada, in which position he displayed his usual energy and administrative abilities, going heart and soul into the work, thoroughly acquainting himself with the details of the department and with the works undertaken and which should be undertaken by it with a view to the protecting of our coasts and fisheries, improving transportation facilities by water and in general the safeguarding and promoting of the welfare of Canada so far as pertains to this department.

New Brunswick joins with the other provinces of the Dominion in

mourning his untimely, regrettable death and fully appreciates the courtesies paid his remains by the respective governments of Great Britain, and France, as well as the sympathy extended from those countries which was displayed in kindly deeds as well as words.

With reference to the paragraph of the address relating to dairying in this province, I may say that I am in full accord with the policy of the government. In reference thereto, I am pleased to be able to concur with the views expressed in the speech. While there are only some comparatively small sections of the province suitable for the raising of beef cattle, I believe, as in Maine, the whole province is peculiarly adapted to the dairying industry. The farmers are gradually coming to realize this, and this industry has made steady progress during the last ten years, as will be seen by the figures which I am about to quote. In 1896 the value of the dairy products of the province was \$76,151. In 1900 it had risen to \$284,325, in 1903, the total was \$387,639. In 1904, there was a decline, due to the unfavorable season and the drouth, to \$339,969. During that year hay was also short and many farmers had to reduce their stock, so that last year the value of the dairy products only rose to \$344,026. There is no doubt that this industry is one that is certain to increase, notwithstanding the temporary check which it has received from two unfavorable seasons. I think that the action of the government and its policy in regard to the agricultural education is to be highly commended. Meetings have been held in various sections of the province, addressed by experienced and practical farmers, and have done much good. It is difficult to move some people out of the habits and customs they have practiced for years, but our farmers are awakened to the fact that much valuable information can be acquired at those meetings, which will be of material assistance to them in the future.

The department has in addition adopted a plan to encourage young farmers to improve their knowledge of the business. To any scholar who will take a course at an agricultural college either at Truro, N. S., or Guelph, the department will pay transportation charges to and from the college. The scholar when he purchases ticket takes receipt from the agent for amount of fare and on leaving college he gets a certificate from the Principal of his having been in regular attendance and on presentation of this to the commissioner of agriculture the amount paid for transportation will be returned him. If he visits his home during vacation his cost of transportation for the two trips will be refunded him.

By this policy young farmers of the province have the same opportunity of attending an agricultural college as if there were in this province while the cost of the department is trifling in comparison with what the cost of establishing and maintaining a college, would be. The munificence of Sir Wm. Macdonald in erecting and endowing an agricultural college at St. Anne de Bellevue, Quebec, has also enabled the Government to grant similar transportation facilities to students from this province who wish to attend that institution.

In the past year the crops were better than in 1904 with a single exception of buckwheat, 405,897 bushels of wheat were grown or 30,000 bushels more than the previous year. The crop of oats was 5,486,528 bushels, an increase of 333,468 bushels over the crop of 1904. The crop of potatoes was 5,518,782 bushels, an increase of 138,468 over the previous year. The turnip crop was 2,645,000 bushels or 135,000 more than the previous year. There is no doubt that wheat growing will increase wherever roller mills are provided. We have one in Northumberland Co. and the miller who was brought from Ontario to operate it says that our wheat is the best he has ever handled except Manitoba hard.

Notice of Legislation

Notice is hereby given that the Fredericton Boom Company will cause to be introduced at the next session of the legislature of New Brunswick a Bill to amend the Acts relating to the said Company, and among other things to provide for an increase of the Tolls and Charges for securing and rafting logs and lumber as follows: Pine Timber, from thirty-five cents to fifty cents per ton; Hemlock Timber from sixty cents to seventy-five cents per ton; Spruce and Pine logs and other lumber, excepting Cedar, from eighty-five cents to one dollar per thousand superficial feet; Cedar of all kinds, from one dollar and thirty cents (\$1.30) to one dollar and forty cents (\$1.40) per thousand superficial feet; Spruce and Pine logs belonging to any one owner averaging less than seventy on each.

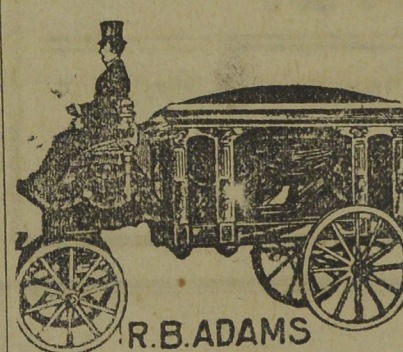

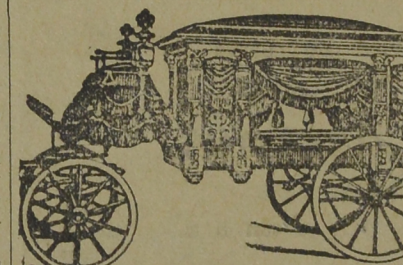
