DEBATE ON THE ADDRESS.

Mr. Murray, the mover, and Mr. Robertson the seconder, of the address in the legislature acquitted themselves admirably. Mr. Murray showed full knowledge of public matters and Mr. Robertson with his usual eloquence, took a broad view of the topics he discussed.

Mr. Hazen's speech has a familiar ring, and his criticisms have often been heard before in the House. The government does not pretend to be infallible, but they have tried to pursue a progressive and enlightened policy, and have faithfully administered the affairs of the province, and the opposition leader failed to establish a reasonable case against them.

The Premier in his reply met Mr. Hazen's criticisms, and refuted them one by one, and their re-echo by Mr. Smith fell harmlessly.

The usual attack on the agricultural management of the government will meet with small response in the country. The people remember the absolute failure of last year, the collapse of the charges with respect to the provincial dairy school, and it is a wonder the opposition has the temerity to mention that subject.

The House promptly passed the address, and the real business of the session will commence next week.

THE LATE DR. HAND.

Sincere regret will be felt throughout the province at the death of Dr. Hand of Woodstock, and his demise will cause especial sorrow in that town and in Carleton county.

Dr. Hand was not only an eminent, efficient member of his profession, but he took a deep interest in all public matters, and was regarded as likely to occupy a leading position in the political arena at no distant day.

His death is all the more sad from the conditions surrounding it. In the discharge of professional duty he contracted blood poisoning with fatal results.

The discussion at the joint meeting of the city council and board of trade committees with Mr. Gregory and Mr. Whelpley respecting the introduction of new industries in Fredericton is expected to bear practical results.

One of the most important measures of the present legislative session will be the compulsory school bill, an outline of which Premier Tweedie gave in his able speech in the debate on the address.

The bye-election in Victoria B. C., in which Hon. Mr. Templeman, the new minister of inland revenue, will seek the confirmation of the people will take place March 6, and no opposition is likely.

The Sun is showing practical signs of its conversion to Liberalism. It publishes a long government advertisement, and fails to criticize the local government with respect to proceedings in the legislature.

Mr. Pardee, the new Liberal M. P., West Lambton, Ont., is to move the address in the House of Commons.

NEW INDUSTRIES.

that Fredericton should make sure of both proposed new industries.

Mr. Neill from his experience as a manufacturer and importer had no complaint to make in regard to freight rates out of Fredericton. His company obtained good rates on steel imported and also on the finished article sent out. New factories were wanted to build up the community, and any proposals made with that object in view should be given careful consideration. Mr. Neill thought that the Whelpley concern would not confine their operations to the manufacture of stoves, but would eventually take up other lines. Mr. Neill in conclusion complimented Mr. McFarlane very highly on his success as a manufacturer.

Mr. Palmer told of an industry in Hamilton which gave employment to 7000 hands. Another industry in that city employed about 2500. They were able to obtain cheap electrical power from Niagara Falls.

In reply to Mr. Barry, Mr. Palmer said that he did not think it would be practical to have power brought to Fredericton from Grand Falls. However, Pokio Falls might be utilized.

Ald. Barbour made some explanations in regard to the bonus bill that the city intended sending to the legislature. The council proposed to ask for power to deal with applications of the kind now before the business.

Mr. Phinney thought that in dealing with applications for bonuses it was necessary to exercise great caution. He did not think the city council should have too much power.

Mr. Slipp thought that public opinion in Fredericton in regard to the bonusing of new industries had undergone a change in recent years. About three years ago he had attempted to interest the Board of Trade in a proposition from the Anderson Furniture Company, but had not been able to achieve much success. He was glad to note the change of sentiment, and thought it augured well for the city. Mr. Slipp spoke very highly concerning the Whelpley industry and thought it would be of great benefit to Fredericton. There were only two such concerns in Canada and the field was a large one. In regard to Mr. Gregory's proposition, he thought if the proposed concern intended to saw long lumber it would enter into competition with existing industries. If the price of lumber had been so good the past few years, that the millmen were able to ignore the local market as alleged by Mr. Gregory, he thought the business was prosperous enough and scarcely needed to be bonused. It would be better in his opinion to try for industries that would be new to the place and non-competitive.

Mr. Barry was not altogether in favor of offering bonuses to induce new industries to come into the city of Fredericton. He did not think it was well for it to be given out to the world that Fredericton was a lender of money without interest. In regard to exemption of taxes and free water that was a small matter, and would not involve any great sacrifice on the part of the citizens.

Mr. Barry figured out that terms were accepted it would cost the Whelpley Company's cost the city about \$355 per year. To offset this he thought that twenty-five men would pay back annually about \$300 in taxes, and if they spent \$10,000 a year, there would be a profit on this amount to the citizens of about \$1,000. It seemed to him that the proposition was a good one.

Mr. Gregory said that Mr. Whelpley's proposition was even better than represented by Mr. Barry. Mr. Whelpley proposed to repay the money borrowed from the city, which meant that in a few years the city would get rid of the interest charge. The same would apply to the proposition which Mr. Gregory had put forward. His company were not asking for a bonus, but merely for a loan to assist in purchasing a site. He did not think it was in the interests of the city that such a good mill site should be allowed to remain idle. In regard to the bonus given to the Hartt Boot & Shoe Company he did not think that any citizen would say today that the city council had made a mistake in assisting that industry.

Mr. Palmer said that since its inception the Hartt Boot & Shoe Company had disbursed \$250,000 in wages.

Mr. Gregory said that the company had not yet reached its limit.

Mr. Palmer said he was mayor at the time the Anderson Furniture Co. were carrying on the negotiations for a loan. The concern wanted a loan of \$30,000 without interest, and while the council had the matter under consideration, it was announced that a suitable site could not be obtained and they could not locate here.

Mr. Slipp thought it would be a good plan for the city to acquire the Estey mill site.

Mr. Phinney was strongly opposed to the city going into the real estate business. He agreed with Mr. Barry that the bonus principle was dangerous and that it was liable to be abused.

Mr. Palmer thought that Mr. Phinney did not look at the question from a business standpoint. A new industry would mean more people to pay the taxes.

Mr. Phinney remarked that Mr. Palmer's industry had received no bonus.

Mr. Palmer—No, and I am not asking for one. But I have had offers to go elsewhere, but intend to remain here.

After some further discussion it was decided to refer both applications to a joint committee of the city council and board of trade. Messrs. Edgecombe and Palmer were added to the Board of Trade committee.

Ald. Chestnut promised to arrange for a meeting of the committee on Monday afternoon.

After some further discussion the meeting adjourned.

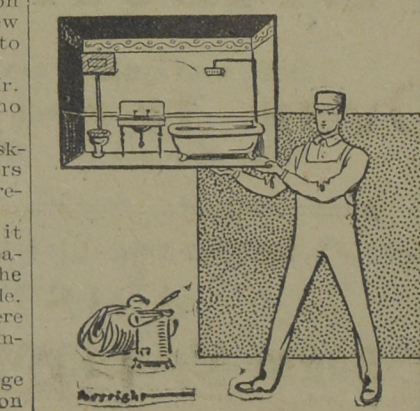
