PROPOSED ENTERPRISES.

Fredericton is not likely to secure new industrial enterprises until it goes after them in the usual way, and the city council has evidently struck a gait in the matter that will result in something substantial. The bonus system is not a popular one, but the proposition to make loans to companies to induce them to locate here, with free water and tax exemption for a stated period, meets with public favor.

Two new industries are already being talked of as a result of the recent move of the council and the board of trade, and if they materialize, there will be quite a handsome addition to the number of artisans in this city, the employment of whom will mean a large disbursement of money.

Mr. A. J. Gregory's proposition to rebuild the Estey mill under certain conditions, and Mr. Whelpley's proposal to locate his skate factory here, are matters which should engage the earnest attention of the authorities, who will be justified in proceeding to any reasonable length in encouraging these gentlemen in their enterprises.

LEGISLATURE WILL ACT.

The attorney general has made an early move to remove the disabilities of women with respect to becoming barristers in this province, and doubtless the bill which he has introduced as a government measure will pass the House by a large majority. Miss French, the St. John young lady who is immediately concerned in this legislation, will thus receive an act of justice, and her sex just recognition which were denied under the supreme court's recent interpretation of the present statute.

The young lady who is likely to become the first female barrister of New Brunswick, has passed all the examinations imposed on candidates for the legal profession, and a sense of fairness will dictate to the legislators her right to recognition as a full fledged lawyer.

The vacant seats in the House of Commons for West Assiniboia and Saskatchewan, caused by the resignation of Hon. Walter Scott and Hon. Mr. Lamont, now of the Saskatchewan local government, have been filled by the election by acclamation of W. E. Knowles and G. F. McCreanly, both Liberals. The reaction in the west, about which wires talked so glibly a few months ago, is not yet visible.

The fiendish murder of Freeman Harvie at Ellershouse, Hants County, N. S., has been fixed by the coroner's jury on Kavanagh, a recent English immigrant, who is also suspected of having burned St. Luke's Cathedral at Halifax. If the charge against the prisoner is proved, it may place the authorities on guard against the dumping of undesirable persons in this country as immigrants.

The tariff commission held its closing session Thursday at Ottawa, and will have its report ready for the opening of Parliament. Messrs. Fielding, Paterson and Brodeur have been engaged in the enquiry for four months, travelling from the Atlantic to the Pacific, and giving a patient hearing to every person who desired to be heard on the question of readjusting the tariff.

Mr. George W. Fowler, Conservative, M. P., for Kings has been busy the past few days in Fredericton, effecting the reorganization of his newspaper organ, which is now expected once more to espouse the Tory cause, and oppose the local government. The Conservative party however, loses the effective support of the Sun, so that the balance is very heavily against them.

St. John mourns the loss of a most esteemed citizen and a useful, public spirited man in the death of Dr. William Christie, whose charitable disposition and kindness to the poor among his patients, are especially dwelt upon by the newspapers of that city.

Mrs. Hroy and her sister, Miss Phillips, the elderly ladies who kept a millinery store at Kingston, died with a few hours of each other. One passed away at 8 o'clock Wednesday night and the other at 5 o'clock Thursday morning. They had gone to Harrowsmith to attend their brother, who was ill. Their deaths were caused by pneumonia.

FREDERICTON DEFEATED.

Moncton Beat Our Boys 5 to 0—
Marysvilles Beaten at Sackville.

Moncton, Feb. 9.—In the fastest game seen in Moncton this season, the Victorias, last night shut out Fredericton, score 5 to 0.

The first half of the game was especially fast, and play all through being sent off. The game was free from roughness and furnished a splendid exhibition. It was the seventh game the Victorias have played in the New Brunswick league and although they have not yet been scored on, they had some exceedingly close shaves last night, especially in the second half, when the quality of hockey put up by the Victorias was not up to their usual standard.

E. P. Howard, of St. John, refereed and it was contended by some that he allowed a good deal of off-side loafing in the second half.

In the first half Rowan sustained a bad cut on one of his hands and was replaced by Hughes. Frank Staples' mouth was badly cut by some stick striking him.

In the first half the Victorias scored four goals and gave a magnificent exhibition of team work, along with brilliant individual plays of the most spectacular kind.

In the second half Fredericton played a great defense game, while the Victoria forward line played carelessly and not up to the standard. Crockett played the best game for the Moncton forwards and Malloy the Moncton forwards. Leahy played a good individual game for the Victorias, doing many spectacular stick handling stunts.

THE DETAILS.

The game started off at a fast clip and the play went right into Fredericton territory. It was run up and down for a couple of minutes and then settled at the Fredericton end, and after seven minutes of the fastest kind of play Leahy scored the first goal for Moncton. Less than a minute later from the face-off Crockett made a brilliant run up the ice and notched a second. One minute later Trites scored a third. Fourteen minutes after play had started Crockett got the fourth with a shot from the side on a pass from Leahy. Leahy and Brown each served two minutes for tripping and a few minutes later Malloy went to the fence for the same offence. Crockett soon scored another, but it did not count as the puck went through a hole in the net and the goal judge did not see it. He was replaced by another official.

The Fredericton forwards made some good runs, but the snobs were nearly all wide and Wortman had few stops to make. Morrison got through once and came near scoring through once after the second half. Eight minutes after the fifth goal, started Crockett scored a fifth goal, the puck striking Martin's foot and sliding into the net. Fredericton disputed the goal but it was allowed and another goal judge put in.

Brown did great work for Moncton defense and broke up some dangerous rushes, while Wortman's startling stops were all that saved the team from being scored on more than once.

The capital team is weak on shooting and their combination work is not very strong, but better than that of any other visiting team here this winter. The defense work is fair, but the defense players are poor checkers although they lift fairly well.

SACKVILLE, 5; MARYSVILLE, 0.

Sackville, Feb. 9.—Sackville once again put up a winning brand of hockey when last night they defeated Marysville by a score of 5 to 0.

The locals put up the best home game of the season and won the contest on its merits. The game was exceptionally clean and good feeling prevailed throughout. The visitors had a good back defense, and their centre forwards were exceptionally speedy, otherwise the team was out-classed. Sackville forwards put up a fast game and showed considerable combinations.

The game started shortly after schedule time and things moved towards Marysville end. However, the contest was keen, and it was the middle of the half when Phalen scored Sackville's first. This was the only score of this half, which was decidedly in favor of the locals. In the second period the game got faster and better work was shown by both teams. Marysville made several fine rushes, but again they were outplayed. Ayer, Phalen, Stuart and Ayer scored during the half and the game ended 5 to 0 in Sackville's favor.

The Sackville goal was seldom in danger. Laidlaw and Norman doing most of the defense work.

Norman showed up in last year's form and played his best game here this winter. Fred Delahunt, Moncton, made a most efficient and satisfactory referee.

Peter C. Keegan, a member of the legislature of Maine, was presented Thursday by Representative Burleigh of the same state, to President Roosevelt. Mr. Keegan is in Washington to advocate the repeal of an old law which admits free of duty certain lumber manufactured in New Brunswick. The Maine legislature adopted resolutions asking congress to repeal this law and those resolutions have been presented to the senate and house respectively by Senator Frye and Representative Burleigh.

John A. McCall, former president of the New York Life Insurance Co. is reported seriously ill at Lakewood, N. J.

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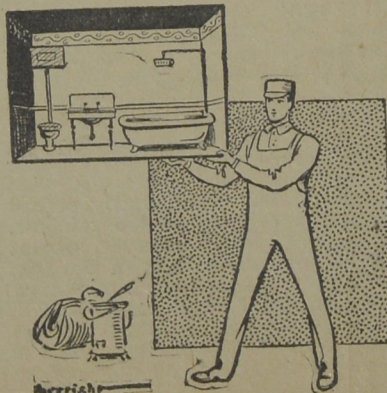
