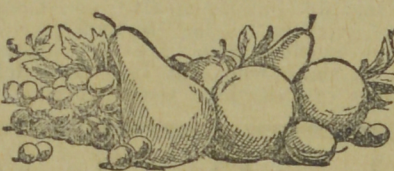

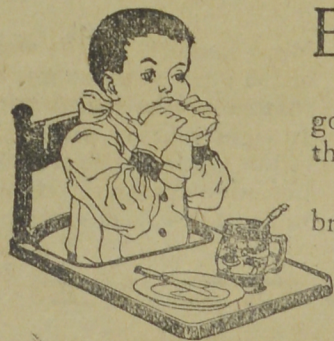

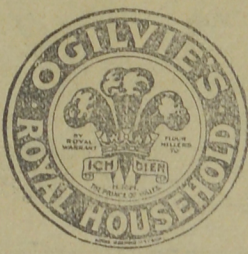

CITY COUNCIL.

was read by Ald. Barbour and laid on the table, pending the submission of Engineer Barbour's report. It recommended the adoption of Mr. Barbour's report, and that he be engaged to prepare plans and specifications at a cost not exceeding \$250. Also that a bill be sent to the legislature, authorizing the council to borrow \$45,000 for the work.

At the suggestion of Ald. Barbour it was decided to have Mr. Barbour read a portion of his report and explain it.

MR. BARBOUR'S REPORT.

Engineer Barbour then addressed the council, presenting a summary of his report and explaining it as he went along. He said that the result of his investigations had convinced him that a gravitation system for Fredericton from any of the sources named was altogether out of the question. As for Mill Creek, the water was good but there was not sufficient of it and the cost was too great, being estimated at \$250,000. This, he held, was about \$25 per million gallons more than water from the present source would cost with a filtration plant added.

In regard to the present system, he said the capacity of the fifteen inch intake pipe was about one-quarter less than when it was new. It was evident to him that something had to be done at once to improve the present supply for fire purposes. There was no doubt that the water needed to be purified. Whatever typhoid existed in Fredericton was in his opinion caused by the upward movement of the tides, and contamination from points above the intake, which a sewerage system would not remove. He believed that the best investment the city could make just now was to install a modern filtration plant.

The engineer then explained the different methods of filtration and stated that a system of sand filtration was the kind he recommended for Fredericton. He said that a low lift pump would have to be used and this would raise the water into a coagulated basin. It would then pass into a clear water well, out of which it would be pumped. From the clear water well the supply for domestic and fire purposes would be drawn. This well would have a capacity of 400,000 gallons, and there will always be that quantity available. He maintained that the construction of the clear water well would remedy the present weakness in the fire service. It would mean an extra cost of about \$8,000, but to his mind the money would be well invested. The capacity of the three units will be 1,200,000 gallons per day, and the average daily consumption at present is about 700,000 gallons.

Mr. Barbour explained that all the buildings and tanks to be erected in connection with the system would be absolutely permanent. He estimated the total cost at \$42,300, and the annual cost of maintenance at \$3276. The latter item included the sum of \$500 to be laid by each year to cover the cost of depreciation in the plant. He claimed that by the filtration method the water would be made as pure and sparkling as spring water.

Mr. Barbour said that the actual record of the amount of coal used at the pumping station for one year showed an average of seven pounds per horse power. He did not think this was very economical. He knew of an engine that could be bought for \$15,000, that would be the means of saving the city \$1,000 a year in fuel. Unless the present engine can be put in better condition it would pay the city to buy a new one. With an additional engine the total cost of the improvements would be \$55,000.

This would make the entire cost of obtaining filtered water \$5 per million gallons less than it could be obtained by a gravity system. The cost of filtering would be about \$0.20 per million gallons, which was less than one cent per thousand gallons.

NO ACTION TAKEN.

The report of the water committee was next taken up and considered section by section.

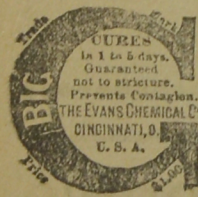
