THE WEATHER.

DIED IN THE WEST.

Lieut.-Governor Snowball Notified of the Death of His Only Brother.

Lieutenant Governor Snowball received a telegram yesterday from Grafton, Yoho County, California, notifying him of the death at that place of his only brother, Judge John W. Snowball. He had been in falling health for some time and his death was not a matter of surprise. He had reached the advanced age of seventy-nine years and is survived by a widow and family of one daughter and several sons.

The deceased gentleman was a son of the late Rev. John Snowball and was born in the province of Nova Scotia. He removed to California in 1849, when the gold fever was at its height and has ever since made his home in that state. He was a man of exceptional ability and took an active part in public affairs. For some years he presided over the criminal court in one of the districts of the state. It is thirty years

since the deceased last visited his old home.

Besides the Lieutenant Governor deceased is survived by two sisters, Mrs. F. P. Thompson, of this city, and Mrs. J. L. Black of Sackville.

HOUSE OPENING.

Everything about Ready for Tomorrow's Ceremony.

The Legislature will be formally opened by His Honor the Lieutenant Governor at three o'clock tomorrow afternoon. His Honor will wear his Windsor uniform and will be attended by the acting A. D. C., Major Bridges, of the Army Medical Service, officers of the 71st Regiment and Private Secretary Barker.

A guard of honor consisting of 100 rank and file, with a band of music, will be furnished by the 71st regiment. Capt. Grey, of Marysville, will be in command. The guard will parade at the drill hall at 2.30 and march to the Parliament building by way of Queen street.

A detachment of fourteen men and two officers from the Woodstock Field Battery, under Major Good, will arrive here this evening with two nine pounders for the firing of the customary salute. The men will be quartered at the York Hotel while here.

Tomorrow evening the Lieutenant Governor will give the usual state dinner at Government House. The members of the government, leader of the opposition, mover and seconder of the address, and commanders of the guard and battery contingent will be among the guests.

Mr. Robert Murray, M. P. P., of Chatham, is to move the address in reply to the speech from the throne, but there is some doubt as to who will be the seconder. Mr. Gogain, M. P. P., for Kent, was chosen for the duty, but owing to the illness of Mrs. Gogain he may not be present at the opening.

Chief Commissioner LaBillois has had a "press gallery" for the use of newspaper men, fitted up on the floor of the House. It is partially concealed from view by a brass railing and curtain.
