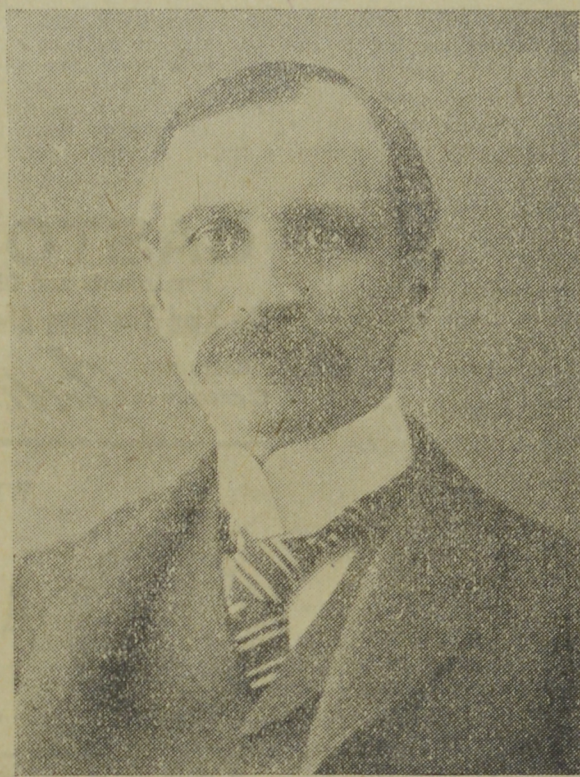

## HON. MR. LABILLOIS' ADDRESS.

Chief Commissioner of Public Works Made Able De-  
fence of His Department and of the Gov-  
ernment Policy.



In the Legislature Monday even-  
ing, Hon. Mr. LaBillois, chief com-  
missioner of public works, in resum-  
ing the budget debate, said he did  
not intend to follow the hon. gentle-  
man from St. John (Maxwell) through  
the items of his long and eloquent  
address, but he noticed some refer-  
ences to the department of public  
works and its management, which he  
felt called for a reply on his part.

The department of public works is  
chargeable with an expenditure that  
absorbs about one-quarter of the en-  
tire revenue of the province. I was  
very happy to hear Mr. Maxwell's  
statement that he endorsed the gov-  
ernment's policy with respect to ad-  
vancing industrial and agricultural  
development, and that he pronounced  
our policy a successful one. But he  
should have gone farther and ad-  
mitted that success crowned all the  
agricultural policy. Great progress  
has been made in improving the stock  
of the country since the govern-  
ment had compelled all agricul-  
tural societies to spend 50 per cent.  
of their grants in that direction.

The expenditure of \$220,000 for  
bridges and repairs of roads is an  
important one, and I hoped when the  
new road act was introduced it  
would be treated like education, en-  
tirely outside of party politics. I re-  
gret to see the county councils pass-  
ing condemnatory resolutions and  
putting the department of public  
works in a false position before the  
electorate. The act was introduced  
NOT AS A POLITICAL MEASURE

but because it was greatly needed all  
over the country. Everybody, par-  
ticularly in the rural districts, know  
that not 50 per cent. of the statute  
labor required under the former order  
of things was done, in some cases ev-  
en wealthy men shirking their road  
work altogether. Last year, with  
the ordinary grants and no statute  
labor except in a few districts where  
it was done by mistake, a great deal  
was accomplished. It was the gov-  
ernment's intention to keep the road  
tax one year ahead, and there is  
now some \$62,000 on hand and when  
the taxes are all collected there will  
be \$80,000 available to repair the  
roads next summer.

I have a pretty good idea of the  
situation in all parts of the province  
and I feel that I am within the mark  
when I say that there has been as  
much work done under the new regime  
with 180 inspectors under bonds, for  
\$60,000 as in the old times with the  
statute labor added to the grants.  
In order to keep one year ahead as  
above stated, we had to pay off the  
bye-road grants, and had to advance  
a large sum to the superintendents  
for work. The question of the salary  
of the superintendents has been  
discussed. Last session the hon.  
member for Charlotte, Mr. Grimmer,  
said that it would cost 60 per cent.  
to effectively carry out the expendi-  
tures on the roads but the account  
will show that it

for the regular expenditures. Des-  
pite all the talk, there was no loss  
in paying a superintendent to run a  
road machine as if he did not do the  
work somebody else would have to be  
employed.

A great handle has been made by  
members of the opposition of the ar-  
rangement in King's County, but, af-  
ter all, it is the best that could be  
made and was entered into on the re-  
commendation of the representatives

of that important county. These  
men are engaged all the year round,  
repairing roads, inspecting culverts,  
bridges, etc., and at the present time  
one of the number is superintending  
the work on a bridge at a saving of  
\$160 for inspection fees. The \$54,-  
000 advanced to the superintendents  
last year, said the member for Carle-  
ton, would be taken out of the road  
tax. That was not so. The amount  
to credit in the different sections now  
is \$63,427.01, and he felt that when  
the taxes are collected there will be  
\$80,000 available for road expendi-  
ture by the superintendents under the  
highway act.

Mr. Smith—What is the delinquent  
list?

Mr. LaBillois—\$17,000 or \$18,000.  
This \$80,000 properly expended would  
maintain the roads and bridges in an  
efficient condition. But we have  
new development roads to open up,  
and having no colonization fund, we  
must get the money from other sources.

Last year, in company with the  
representatives of Gloucester, I visited  
many sections of that county and to  
my intense surprise, found places  
where

NOTHING IN THE SHAPE OF A  
ROAD EXISTED.

The Island of Misco has none. The  
people have to walk along the beach-  
es at low tide when they want to go  
from one place to another, and this  
was the only way available for car-  
rying the bodies of their dead to the  
various burying places. Yet Misco  
is an island settled for over a hun-  
dred years and now peopled by over  
140 families. Under these circum-  
stances I ask you, what was the duty  
of the department but to open up  
roads at once. A road was constructed  
from Mission Harbor to Lighthouse  
Point, which has already proved of  
great convenience to the people.

I went to the flourishing settlement  
of New Denmark with the local mem-  
bers, and there I found the situation  
the same being pressed on all sides  
for long needed roads. So it was  
in other sections of the province. It  
is on this line that the department  
of public works is spreading itself  
and will continue to spread itself  
in the full belief that in no way can  
public money be better expended than  
in opening up good settlement land  
to the young men of the country.

Last year I told the house there  
were some four thousand bridges in  
New Brunswick to maintain and last  
spring when the new Highway Act  
came into force, I deemed it neces-  
sary for its proper administration to  
procure a carefully prepared census  
of the roads and bridges in all parts  
of the province. We sent out a bul-  
letin to each superintendent to get  
this and some other information.  
Some of the returns are not yet com-  
plete and the county of St. John is  
not included in what I have before  
me, but the figures already total 3,-  
608 bridges and will reach 4,000 when  
all are heard from.

Last year I said we had 10,000  
miles of highway. The figures so far  
received show 12,183 miles. Of a  
bridge-work we have 75 miles if all  
the bridges were put in a line every  
year there are from 300 to 350  
bridges to be repaired and the expendi-  
ture on this head was

larger this year than the average.  
The first two months of this year  
the department has attended to the  
repairing of 150 bridges. We are al-

so looking carefully after the main-  
tenance of the steel bridges. These  
are important and costly structures  
four to six of which must be printed  
every year to preserve them against  
corrosion. We have looked after them  
carefully as I have said while in the  
neighboring province of Nova Scotia  
they have been neglected involving a  
big financial loss, while ours are in  
perfect condition.

No member can be better pleased  
than I am with the development of  
the resources of the province. For  
23 years as a member of the House,  
and seven as a member of the gov-  
ernment no one in this legislature has  
travelled more throughout the prov-  
ince than I have done, and it was  
with great surprise that I heard the  
statement made by an opposition  
member the other day that there are  
thousands of girls and boys in the  
province, who can neither read nor  
write. That was certainly not my  
experience along the North shore or  
along the St. John river valley. I  
knew places where fifteen or sixteen  
years ago you could hardly see a  
newspaper because the old people  
could not read. Now you see both  
English and French papers there and  
the young folks reading them to their  
elders.

in this province for it is after all the  
most powerful factor in the elevation  
and growth of a country.

As to the lumber resources I will  
not say much at present but I come  
from the county of Restigouche which  
next to Northumberland is the lar-  
gest lumber producing county in the  
province.

The towns of Campbellton and  
Dalhousie are growing rapidly  
through the spread of lumbering op-  
erations and our working men now  
own houses, which was not generally  
the case even a few years ago. But  
with the building up of our towns by  
lumber we also want to encourage our  
young men to settle upon the lands  
of the country. In the amount ex-  
pended last year the members for  
Madawaska, Victoria, etc., will testi-  
fy the department dealt as liberally  
as possible with their applications for  
the opening up of settlement  
roads.

I am proud of our educational and  
agricultural progress and if we con-  
tinue the policy pursued by this gov-  
ernment, we will not worry of the  
progress of the great west, as our  
young men will eventually return  
home and help to make New Brun-  
swick one of the finest provinces in  
the Dominion of Canada. (Applause.)
