out and put some one else in who will do right. I have been endeavoring since I really and truly became minister of railways, that is since the first of August last, to administer the affairs of the I. C. R. so that it will serve the interests for which it was intended without being a burden to the people at large.

"I can account for five or six hundred thousand of the deficit. It was due to bad conditions, storms, etc. But there are other hundreds of thousands of dollars that have to be accounted for and it will be my duty from my place in parliament to say something in reference to this. Contrast the past six months with the same period of the previous year. When I tell you there was actually an equilibrium between receipts and expenditures during that six months, I am telling you what is an actual fact.

He had said there would be equilibrium between receipts and expenditures for six months of the current year and he could go a little further and show a balance on the right side. Mr. Emmerson said he felt that the good they had accomplished on the road was not for a year alone, but for years to come. The retrenchment meant that every year there would be assured to the I. C. R. and people of Canada that this great railway system would no longer be a burden upon the people.

The administration of canals was also undergoing some overhauling the same as the administration of the railways was and at the proper time he would be able to take the public into his confidence.

"I am deeply interested," he said, "in the success of the Intercolonial. I have felt that this fire was a great calamity and a grave situation and we should meet it."

PREDICTS GOOD YEAR.

"The present year will show splendid results. This is a very great loss, but how much will go to capital account or expenditure I do not know. But I do know that the money is coming from somewhere and I don't care whether you charge it to capital or expenditure. It has got to come from somewhere; it is all the same in the end."

SCOTT ACT WAR.

Some Interesting Evidence Elicited at the Police Court.

The case against a local druggist, charged by Rev. J. J. Colter with violating the Scott Act, was taken up in the police court yesterday. Robert Candemire, a liquor spotter, from Brockville, Carleton, was the most important witness for the prosecution. He swore that he had visited the defendant's store on the evening of the 20th and had purchased a flask of brandy for fifty cents. He drank some of the liquor afterwards and knew it was brandy.

Under cross examination by Mr. Hanson, the witness said he was employed as a spotter by Rev. Mr. Colter. He was to receive ten dollars for every liquor seller he could catch in the country, but no tariff was agreed upon for city cases. He was simply told to go to work and he would be paid. He said that the liquor that he had purchased he had drank a portion and had given the rest away to friends in Carleton County. He had visited four places in Fredericton and had bought liquor in two. Rev. Mr. Colter supplied him with the necessary cash.

The defendant took the stand in his own behalf and emphatically denied that he had sold liquor to Candemire at any time. He said that Candemire visited his store on Sunday night and asked for liquor, but it was refused him.

Under cross examination by Mr. Phinney, the defendant admitted he had sold liquor by the bottle during January and February.

DEATH AT MARYSVILLE.

The death occurred at Marysville last night of Mr. Charles Burns, aged 23 years. He made his home with his brother, Mr. Lawrence Burns. He is survived by one brother and two sisters. The funeral will take place here tomorrow morning at 8 o'clock, with services at St. Anthony's Church. Mr. George W. Adams has charge of the arrangements.

DEATH AT GEARY.

Mr. George W. Anderson, son of the late Mr. Joseph Anderson of Cambridge, Mass., died at Geary, Sunbury county, yesterday, aged eighteen years. The funeral will take place at ten o'clock tomorrow with undertaker John G. Adams in charge.

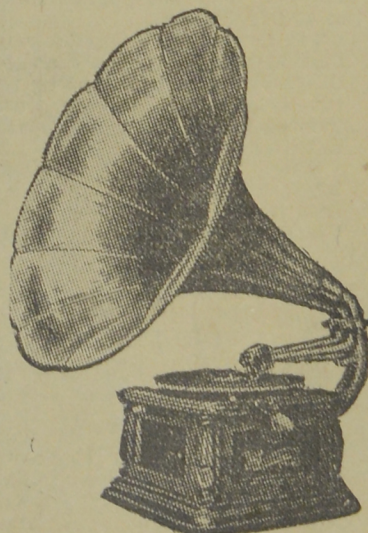
