

DuDOMAINE--WINSLOW.**Brilliant Nuptial Event at the Cathedral this Afternoon.**

A wedding which has been looked forward to with more than ordinary interest for some time past took place at Christ Church Cathedral at 1.30 o'clock this afternoon in the presence of a large gathering of people. The contracting parties were Lieut. E. Louis du Domaine, of the Royal Canadian Regiment, Halifax, son of Mr. H. leCoeq du Domaine, late professor of languages at Winchester University, and Miss Marguerite Winslow second daughter of the late Mr. E. Byron Winslow, K. C.

The bride who was given in marriage by her brother, Mr. Jasper A. Winslow, was attended by two bridesmaids, Miss Elsie Holden, of St. John, and Miss Lenore Allen, of this city, while Captain H. Kemmis Betty of the R. C. R., discharged the duties of best man.

The ushers were Messrs. C. H. Allen, J. J. Fraser Winslow, J. Alex. Thompson and Donald B. Winslow. The beautiful Church of England marriage ceremony was performed by His Lordship Bishop Kingston, assisted by the Very Rev. Dean Partridge and Rev. Sub Dean Street. The full choir was present and rendered with splendid effect "The Voice That Breathed O'er Eden," and at the conclusion of the ceremony the sweet strains of Mendelssohn's wedding march filled the edifice.

The bride wore a magnificent costume of ivory satin trimmed with Duchess lace, bertha and chignon yoke, with white tulle veil and orange blossoms. She carried a beautiful shower bouquet of white roses and lilies of the valley.

The bridesmaids were costumed in pale blue serge made with short slashed jackets, over champagne Irish blouses made with Princess skirts. Their hats were of Valenciennes lace with trimmings of gold lace and pink roses. The bouquets carried by the bridesmaids were of pink carnations and lilies of the valley.

The interior of the Cathedral was tastefully decorated for the occasion with cut flowers and potted plants.

At the conclusion of the ceremony the bridal party and guests repaired to the residence of the bride's mother, Church street, where luncheon was served and a reception held. The dining room was very prettily decorated, pink being the prevailing color.

The bride, who is one of Fredericton's fairest daughters, and a great favorite in social circles, was the recipient of a host of magnificent wedding presents from friends far and near.

The bridegroom, remembered her with an ermine stole and muff, and to each of the bridesmaids he gave a V. R. I. pin surmounted by a pearl crown and his gift to the best man was a walking stick.

The choir of the Cathedral, of which the bride has been a valued member, presented her with a silver bread board; the gift of the R. C. R. was a Queen Anne silver tea service; her mother's present was a pair of gold bracelets, and from her brothers J. J. Fraser and E. Edward Winslow she received a set of colonial cut glass. The remembrance of Messrs. J. A. R. A. and Rainford Winslow was a chest of silverware.

Lieut. duDomaine is one of the most popular and efficient junior officers of the Royal Canadian Regiment and a very accomplished violinist. He is certainly to be congratulated on winning such a lovely and charming bride.
