STILL PLANNING FOR IRELAND.

Lord and Lady Aberdeen will spend Christmas in Rome, and their return to Dublin in January will be followed by one of the most brilliant Vice-Regal seasons Dublin has ever witnessed.

A big function planned by Lady Aberdeen is an Irish lace ball, at which every lady guest will wear a dress trimmed with Irish lace or crochet, while the men will appear in court dress, with Irish lace jabots and ruffles.
