MONCTON. POLICE TROUBLES.

Three Officers Charged with Drunkenness—Wanted for Theft—Good Curling Score

Moncton, Jan. 11.—(Special).—There is more trouble in the police department, and it is reported that Ald. Fryers, chairman of the police committee, has asked two of the police officers for their resignations, on the ground of drinking while on duty. The officers in question, however, have not resigned, but have asked for an investigation, which will be held in the near future.

It is reported, also, that a young man whom the police were after recently, has performed similar charges against another officer and this is to be inquired into by the police committee.

Flewelling Wilber, this morning swore out a warrant for William McGarry, charging him with stealing a gold watch and chain, \$20 in gold and other articles.

The police are looking for McGarry, who was up in court a short time ago for stealing \$10 from John Mollins at Hillsboro, Albert County, but disappeared.

He has been wanted by the police for some time.

W. J. Green, a former Pictou curler, won the gold medal in the annual points competition in the Moncton Club, which closed last night. His score was forty points.

LIPTON NOT DISCOURAGED.

New York, Jan. 11.—(Special).—Sir Thomas Lipton is making plans for another campaign against the New York Yacht Club next year, and the bone of contention will be the America Cup, for which the popular baronet has already tried three times.

Letters were received in this city this week from Sir Thomas, saying that he still has hopes of capturing the famous trophy, and is considering plans for building a new challenger, which he hopes to have here in time for 1907.

Just what plans he is making he will not divulge, but is pleased to think that next time he comes here he can bring a good, wholesome, type boat, and will be met by one built under certain restrictions that bar excessive overhangs and other features.

It is said on good authority that Sir Thomas may bring over a schooner, and that the new boat will be built up to the limit of that type of yacht allowed under the terms of the deed of gift, which is 115 feet on the water line.

PATENT MEDICINE POISONS.

Victoria, B. C., Jan. 11.—(Special).—Coroner Dr. Hart is making inquiry into a second case within a fortnight of the fatal poisoning of an infant by the administration of patent medicines.

The victim is a son of Mr. Duvall and its death is laid to the use of teething powders manufactured in

England, which are alleged to violate the Poisons Act of that country, in the proportion of opium contained.

In consequence of a similar case the government has already arranged to present stringent anti-patent medicines legislation during the session which opened today.

FICTITIOUS VALUES.

Toronto, Jan. 11.—(Special).—An examination for discovery before Official Examiner Bruce into the affairs of the Southern Light & Power Co., has revealed a sky rocket course of value in certain lots on the Humber owned by Mrs. Joseph Barrett.

She obtained these lots for the amount of mortgage, \$1,000, and they were turned over to the Southern Light & Power Company for \$172,500 in stock.

For financing the company, Joseph Phillips got \$122,500 in stock. According to an affidavit sworn to by Joseph Barrett, the York Loan Co. purchased or made advances upon the \$212,000 bonds of the Southern Light and Power Company, taking the land (originally valued at \$1,000) as security.

The York Loan Co., also through Phillips, agreed to advance the money which was to give this land, value by development.

Mrs. Barrett testified in the examination her husband had no money for the development of the land.

THE WRONG MAN.

Postmaster Hilyard yesterday received a note from a prominent educationalist of St. John complaining that a parcel mailed by him on December 15th to a Fredericton man named McDonald had never reached its destination. The postmaster was a little puzzled at first but was soon able to solve the mystery. He found the parcel after a brief search and was rather surprised to discover that a little error on the part of the sender was responsible for its non-delivery. It was not addressed to a Mr. McDonald as alleged in the note but to a Mr. Thompson, and the man could not be found. This goes to show that postal officials do not make all the mistakes that are made in the transmission of mail matter.

FOR MAYOR OF DARTMOUTH.

Halifax Chronicle.—Mr. Thos. Notting will be a candidate for Mayor of Dartmouth, at the elections to take place the first week in February. At the D. B. C. A. Hall, last evening, he was waited upon by a number of prominent citizens, who presented him with a requisition signed by 100 ratepayers, requesting him to allow himself to be nominated. After consideration, Mr. Notting accepted making a short address.

(Mr. Notting is a prominent barrister practising in Halifax, and is a nephew of Mr. L. C. Macnutt of this city.)

COUNTY COURT.

MUSIC IN THE SCHOOLS.

Important Conference on the Subject Between the Teachers and Board of School Trustees.

A delegation representing the city teachers' association held a conference with the Board of school trustees last evening and strongly urged that music be added to the list of studies in the schools. The trustees listened patiently to what the teachers had to say on the subject and promised to deal with the matter at the next monthly meeting of the board.

Those present at the meeting were Sheriff Sterling in the chair, and Messrs. J. J. Weddall, J. W. Spurdon, J. T. Sharkey and Dr. Vanwart. The teachers' association was represented by Principal Foster, of the High School, Principal Perry and Miss Thompson of the Charlotte St. school, Misses Harvey and Richardson, of the Model school, and Misses Vandine, Everett and McCann of the York street school.

Principal Foster, who was the first speaker, said that there was a unanimous feeling among the teachers in favor of the introduction of music in the schools, provided a competent instructor was engaged. He claimed that music would not interfere with the other studies, to any appreciable extent. He believed that Fredericton was behind other towns and cities in this respect, notably Moncton, where the system was in vogue.

Miss Thorne did not think that the introduction of music in the schools would seriously interfere with other studies. Even should it replace some study of less importance, so great harm would result. She thought a special instructor should be appointed for the work, and there should be two lessons a week of half an hour each.

Miss Harvey thought the introduction of music in the schools would fill a long felt want. She had visited the Boston schools and had been greatly impressed with the musical proficiency of the students. She believed that in time the teachers would secure musical training themselves and would be able to impart instruction. The instructor would need to under-

stand how to deal with children in the primary grades. Music, she thought, would have a refining influence on the pupils. She did not altogether favor the Canadian system, as it had some weak points.

Miss Vandine did not think sufficient was done to promote culture in our schools at the present time, and because of boys and girls having separate classes in sloyd work, lessons often have to be repeated, and much time is thus wasted. She thought that examinations should be less frequent as they consumed a large amount of time. She was in favor of the introduction of music.

Principal Perry agreed with the other teachers that music was an important subject and should have a place in the schools. He did not claim to be sufficiently posted on the subject to be able to give instruction to the pupils. Probably his lack of musical training, when at school was in a measure responsible for this. He heartily recommended the study of music in the schools. He believed its adoption would mean a change and relaxation for the pupils, and would be very welcome to them on that account.

Misses McCann and Everett endorsed the stand taken by the other speakers, but Miss Thompson, who followed, did not express much sympathy with the movement.

In a general discussion which followed, as to the best method of working out the scheme, it was shown that there were now twenty-four separate departments in the city schools. It was suggested that an instructor could be engaged for twenty-five hours a week, and this would enable him to give two half-hour lessons weekly to the pupils of each school room.

The trustees seemed to be favorably impressed with the arguments advanced by the teachers, and there is a strong indication, that music will be added to the list of studies in the city schools in the near future.

A MINNEAPOLIS HOLOCAUST.

Nine Persons Met Death in a Burning Hotel.

Minneapolis, Jan. 11.—Nine persons lost their lives in a fire which burned out the fifth, sixth and seventh stories of the West Hotel in this city yesterday. The blaze started in an unknown manner in the packing room on the first floor. Ascending the elevator shaft it spread when it reached the fifth floor. Awakened by the ringing of the alarm bells in their rooms, the guests, who numbered in all about 700 rushed wildly about seeking safety.

Those on the upper floors were driven back into their rooms by the smoke which filled the hallways and when the firemen arrived they were greeted by cries for assistance from scores of men and women, who, scantily clad, were shivering on the window ledges. Smoke was pouring out around them and soon two men were compelled to leap to avoid the flames. Both were killed. One of them has been identified as J. B. Peisinger, a travelling salesman from New York.

HEROIC FIREMAN KILLED.

Captain John Berwin, of a hook and ladder company, having broken open a window on the seventh floor, which he had reached by means of a scaling ladder, stumbled onto the body of Mrs. Emeline Barlow, an aged woman. He strapped the unconscious form to his back and started down the ladder. When midway between the seventh and sixth floors the strap broke. Bending over to balance the body for a moment, he then leaned at the risk of his life, and threw the woman toward a projecting ledge on the floor below. Apparently being revived by the fresh air or by the shock, the aged woman grasped the projection and held on. Later she was rescued. But in

throwing the woman to safety Captain Berwin lost his balance and fell to the pavement. He was instantly killed.

J. E. Wolfe, 55 years old, travelling representative for Sperry & Alexander, wholesale hardware merchants of New York, met a horrible death. He was burned in his room and the condition of the furniture indicated that he had fought the flames until the last.

Thomas Somerville, of Springfield, (Mass.), a travelling salesman; W. C. Nicholls, a grain commission merchant, of Minneapolis, and Clinton Lamme, a cadet from West Point, were suffocated in their rooms.

Mrs. Barlow may die from inhaling smoke.

A colored porter is reported missing.

The property loss is estimated at \$25,000.

Thomas Somerville, Springfield, (Mass.), salesman for Atkins & Co., manufacturing stationers, Burnside, (Conn.), suffocated in his room on sixth floor.

Alice Lawson, servant, jumped from seventh floor.

W. C. Nicholls, chamber of commerce, suffocated in his room.

Wm. Block, of New York, travelling salesman for A. Tazuo, wholesale jeweler, jumped from seventh floor.

J. E. Wolf, northwestern salesman for Sperry & Alexander, New York, burned to death on seventh floor.

Clinton Lamme, a West Point cadet, on way to Bozeman (Mont.) on a furlough, suffocated.

Mrs. M. E. Hodges, Minneapolis, representing university extension course, jumped from seventh floor.

J. B. Peisinger, New York, jumped into an alley.
