MODERN GRACE DARLING.

Cape Breton Women Aided in Rescuing Sailors From Wreck.

Glace Bay, N. S., March 14.—Further and fuller particulars of the loss of the steamer Baines Hawkins have come to hand. The steamer left Port Morien for Mulgrave at 5.30 last Friday morning. It was then blowing hard from the south, but good headway was made until the ship was ten miles south of Scattarie, when ice was encountered and it became necessary to lay to.

It was then Captain Peters learned that the ship was leaking in the forepeak on the starboard side. Immediately he did so, he ordered that she be put about and headed for the nearest shore with the intention, if nothing could be done of beaching her.

At seven o'clock in the morning they were at the eastern side of Scattarie. So desperate had the situation become that the boatswain, Thomas Bowdridge, got the boats ready, fitting them out with water food, clothing and sails. The clothes were put into the smaller boat. Bowdridge, as soon as he had made the boats ready, was anxious that they leave the sinking ship immediately, but the captain determined to remain a while longer, believing that by doing so their chances would be much better when they took to the boats.

In the meantime, Bowdridge got into the small boat, and, in his excited condition, cut the painter, or else it parted, owing to the tremendous strain on it, for in a minute after entering the boat he was adrift alone. The last the rest of the crew saw of him, he was waving his hat, while the boat was fast drifting towards Flint Island, at which place it was hoped he might reach, but as the hours went by, and no further tidings of him were forthcoming, he was given up as lost.

Ten minutes after he went adrift, Captain Peters gave the order that the big boat be manned, which order was promptly obeyed and when it was one hundred yards from the steamer, she was seen to lurch and then immediately disappeared, going down bow first.

She was then one and a half miles off South Head. The boat was then put to windward and headed for the shore. It was a tough pull, but one upon which depended eleven lives, therefore, what seemed like superhuman effort was put into the strokes of those at the oars, but finally Long Beach was reached at ten o'clock. There the then almost completely exhausted men met with a new difficulty.

The water for some distance from the shore was full of lolly ice, so much that it was impossible for them to pull through it, and they would have perished almost within reach of land, only that a modern "Grace Darling" in the person of Miss Katie McDonald, went to the rescue. She saw the boat approach the ice, quickly took in the situation and immediately gave the alarm, with

the result that Angus Ferguson and another man rushed to the assistance of the men struggling in the ice with Miss McDonald encouraging them on. But it was a herculean task and one that proved too much for them; but nothing daunted, Ferguson rushed off to Port Morien, nearby, sought and readily found help. Thus reinforced, he returned to Long Beach, and the work of rescuing was taken up anew. During Ferguson's absence, however, the boat had drifted in through the "lolly" far enough for one of the men in the boat to jump overboard, with a rope tied around his waist, and reach land. Fully two score of willing hands then seized the rope, and a few minutes afterwards the boat was drawn into safety.

Two of the occupants were so badly exhausted that it was necessary to assist them from the boat. The men were taken to a nearby house and made as comfortable as possible.

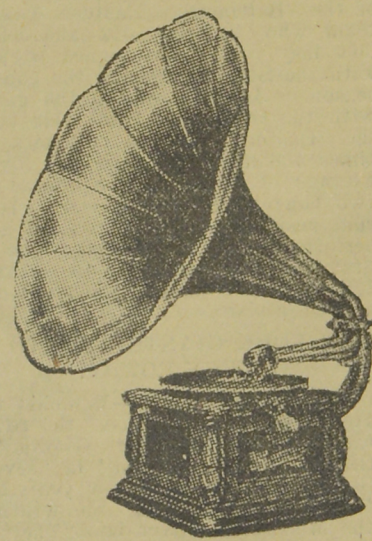
