INTERCOLLEGIATE CHAMPIONSHIP.

The St. Francis Xavier team won the intercollegiate hockey championship of the Maritime provinces by defeating the Mt. Allison team at Truro Thursday night, 4-1. Mt. Allison won the championship of the New Brunswick section, taking 10 out of three games from U. N. B., and St. Francis won the Nova Scotia end of the league, defeating Dalhousie two straight games. According to the league schedule, the winners of the respective sections were to play a "sudden death" game in Nova Scotia. The game was played Thursday night and St. Francis Xavier is now the champion college team of the provinces. This is the first year that the league has been in existence. The Hewson trophy, donated by the Hewson Woolen Mills, Amherst, accordingly will be held by the St. Francis team.

BASE BALL.

ECHOES OF THE GAME.

Frank Isbell has signed a Chicago contract. He is one of the two original White Sox who have been retained. Patterson is the other.

Umpire Jack Sheridan expresses regret that changes in the rules were not made to increase batting, and thinks the public will size of low score games before the end of another season.

Olding, a candidate for third base on the Athletics, has seen big league service before. He received a brief trial with the Highlanders at the close of last season.

The Boston Americans are loath to lose such a consistent stickler as Bill Clay, who dropped to the York team. The defection of Clay means that Selbach, Stahl and Freeman will take care of the outfield positions.

It will be noticed by those who are interested that there are not so many players deserting organized baseball this season. Several who did jump have been making strenuous efforts to get under cover again.

Washington is a team that will have to be watched. While it is not made up of championship timber, still Jake Stahl will have a nine that should make every team in the league hustle to beat it, and with Lave Cross on he will keep the infield on edge all the time.

Tom Jordan, the big first baseman of the Baltimore Eastern League team, who batted .312 and fielded .986 last year, has signed to play with the Superbas during the coming season. Jordan played 130 games with the Orioles in 1905. He faced the Eastern League pitchers 493 times and made 203 base hits for an average of .312. He registered 26 two baggers, 10 triples and 1 home run, besides scoring 77 runs, a good performance. In fielding the big first baseman made only 19 errors in 1,359 chances, having 1,306 put-outs and 34 assists.

NEW YORK GIANTS SAID TO BE VERY ROWDY.

Memphis, March 13.—Memphis men are up in arms against the rowdy tactics of the New York Giants. The Giants "got in bad" in several Southern cities in former years. Now they are weathering the wrath of the Mississippi River fans. They are described as "night owls" and "cut ups."

Their specialty, it is said, is insulting Southern women. This offense is generally punishable by death south of Mason and Dixon's line. Ed. Hulbert, a Southern League catcher,

His operations have been much regarded for want of snow but he will be likely to succeed in getting the lumber all in this season.

The Scott Lumber Company of Fredericton have a considerable quantity of hemlock, bark which was brought here from the neighborhood of Lake George, more than a year ago. They have recently shipped four carloads of it to St. John and will continue their shipments. Several cars of spruce pulpwood have been shipped westward from this station this season and there is a number of carloads yet to be shipped \$3.20 per load is the price paid here for it.

freight at sixty cents a ton of \$90,000 a year gross revenue. It is always estimated that the net revenue will be from 30 to 40 per cent of the gross revenue. 40 per cent would give us \$27,000. This takes no account of any other kind of freight or of passenger traffic. That this estimate is not too high is shown by the rental paid by the Canadian Pacific railway and Grand Trunk railway for their branch lines. I believe therefore that this railway property today is worth more than three per cent on \$700,000. I believe that within a very few years we will be offered at least \$40,000 a year for this railway. I hope that every member of this house will vote on this question as he believes it to be for the best interest of the province. I venture the prediction that if we accept this proposition as a result of this vote not many years will roll by until we shall see this road pass into other hands and become a highly profitable line. I therefore would not be doing my duty if I did not vote against this resolution.

MR. HAZEN.

Mr. Hazen—If the amendment of the member for St. John has served no other purpose it has had the effect of causing one member of the government to speak. It is true that his speech has not given us much information. One would suppose that in a matter of this sort a member of the government would have been able to tell us something about the offer that has been made and the intentions of the government with regard to it. Here we have a line of railway that has cost an enormous sum of money to the province and it might be supposed that the government would have some policy in regard to it. But that it seems is not the case. The attorney general takes great pains to say that he is speaking only for himself. Therefore I must infer that the government have not been able to come to an agreement on any policy. The attorney general has been at great pains to place the member for St. John in a false position and make it appear that his interpretation of the engineer's report with reference to steam shovel was wrong, but I affirm that his interpretation of it is a logical and natural one. However, passing away from that topic let me remark that the attorney general has referred to the coal development at Grand Lake as if the government were the first discoverers of that coal field. This coal field was known more than a hundred years ago and coal was mined there at that

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case of a railway and the sale of a house, for this railway is the property of the people and the people have a right to know before it is sold who is to own it and what is to be done with it. If the Grand Trunk Pacific could get access to St. John it would be of a great benefit to the province and we might be disposed to accept this offer. But if this offer is simply made by speculators who are gambling on the chances the whole matter assumes a different aspect. The amendment of the member for St. John places him in a position which the people of this country will approve. While not disposed to go into ecstasies over the future of this road, I cannot shut my eyes altogether to the representations of the engineer who claims that he can earn \$40,000 a year, and that it is worth from \$850,000 to \$900,000. Then we have the glowing statements of the attorney general as to the earning power of this road. In view therefore of all the facts and of the lack of information on the subject, I intend to vote for the amendment of the hon. member for St. John.

Hon. Mr. Tweedie moved the adjournment of the debate.
