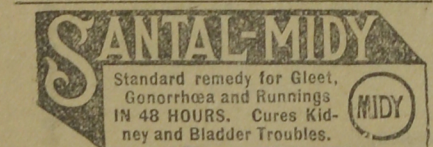

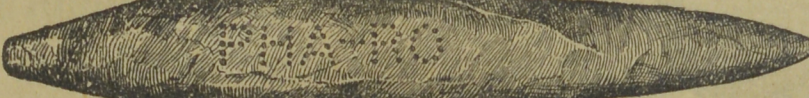

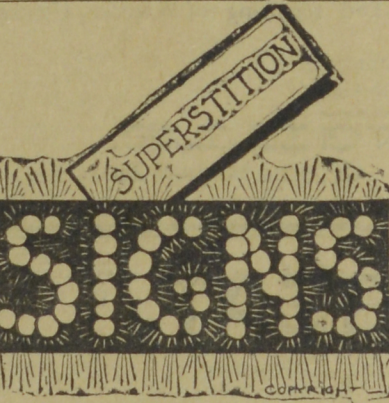

method and correctness. The hon. gentleman has fallen into a state of chronic lethargy and the only thing which the government has left undone that it should have done was the repairing and the reopening of government house. Some of his (Osman's) suggestions are good and if he persists in his course he may have the repairs effected by the time he is fit to fill that mansion, for which position a better man could not be found.

It occurs to me that this valuable property now lying useless and idle, might, with its 50 acres of good land, be put by the government to some profitable use, and as the government has not done what it should have done for the cause of agriculture, why not utilize the estate as a training school for farmers' sons. The needed buildings are there as well as the land, and the school could be run cheaply by only taking up the rudiments essential to a farmer, and best of all, by fitting the youth to acquire further information later on; in short to teach him how to study. This would not necessitate a large staff, and the cost at the most would not be more than the expense of keeping up a lieutenant governor. It is almost out of the question now for the average farmer to send his son to an agricultural college for a term of years, but he would find it possible and profitable to send his offspring for a year or so to an institution so near home. I believe the general intention of the government with respect to agricultural education is well intended, but their diary instructors and other officers confine themselves too much to one locality. Kings County, for instance, to the neglect of the rest of the province. What keeps them in Kings? I do not know unless it is the magnetism of the attorney general who seems to draw all

things unto him. But because agriculture succeeds and grows apace in Kings is no reason for the government claiming that there efforts are successful in their parts of New Brunswick. Nor was the statement made by the member for St. John (Robertson) that he had recently paid 52 cents per dozen for eggs in the St. John market any proof of the success of the government's agriculture policy. On the contrary, it showed, if it showed anything at all, that the supply was so far below the demand as to put eggs out of the reach of the working men.

I do not exactly know how to take hold of the Central Railway matter in its present shape. Two nights ago the premier said that he had received an offer of \$21,000 a year for it on a 999 year lease, and as he made that statement he put on the most cheerful smile that I had ever seen grace his countenance, and his supporters smiled in unison. Was this offer so good as to produce such a crop of facial happiness on the government benches?

Dr. Pugsley—And so much sadness in the opposition ranks?

Mr. Hartt—I didn't look sad and I am not sad now. The house has not been fully taken into the premier's confidence and we do not yet know who made the offer or what guarantees there are back of it. We do not know but what this white elephant may be again returned on our hands. It may be, and I would not be surprised to find, that some near friend of the government had stepped in with this offer to keep the administration out of a deep hole and it is not improbable that before the end of the session the house will be called on to vote \$100,000 more on account of this railway.

Dr. Pugsley—You need not fear that.

Mr. Hartt—The grant of \$250,000 was made last year in the closing days of the session under pressure.

Dr. Pugsley—The grant was made by unanimous vote and the opposition was not appealed to to support it.

Mr. Hazen read from page 114 of the debates of last session to show that the premier had urged proceeding at once with the bill, as Dr. Pugsley, who had given it a great deal of attention, might be called away at any moment by reason of serious sickness in his family.

Mr. Smith—I was the only member of the opposition in the house at the second reading and Dr. Pugsley assured me that there was an understanding with the leader of the opposition as to the progress of the measure.

Dr. Pugsley—I most emphatically deny that I made any such statement. I had no conversation of that kind with the member for Carleton.

Mr. Smith—I reiterate my statement and am amazed at the denial.

Dr. Pugsley—I solemnly re-affirm I said nothing of the kind.

Mr. Hartt—Whether Mr. Smith was leading himself or not I do not know but the bill was considered in a very slim house, if my memory serves me correctly.

Regarding the highway act, I would like to see it receive a fair trial, but I do most emphatically object to the funds of 1906 being used up in 1905. This may be no criminal offence, but if it goes on how are we to know where the yearly accounts stand. The way in which the superintendents are paid is highly objectionable and is in many respects almost on the lines of the old act, which was faulty in many respects. Some of the superintendents who have taken hold of road machines and personally operated them, would not pay themselves for their own services, thus showing a more tender conscience than did some of the members of the provincial government. There should be a uniform system of payment for road superintendents, applicable to all parts of the province, and the act could not be a popular success until that is done.

I was much pleased with the premier's explanation of the government's forest protection and development policy. The forest growth is actually of more value to the province than what it receives in the way of stumpage. After a spruce tree is, say, ten inches in diameter, it grows much faster than in the smaller stages and the surrounding small trees, which should not be cut down but intelligently protected. There is a belief in many quarters that the scalers after a time become too well acquainted with the lumber owners, and that the province loses a considerable amount of stumpage thereby. If this is true, the proposition to shift them every two years, which is one of the planks of the premier's bill, is a necessary one. Business, to be successful, must be conducted on business principles, and the banks find it necessary to shift their clerks from town to town, lest they might let personal friendship and social ties warp their banking judgment.

After a suggestion that the same vehicle employed by the surveyor general to hold the ashes of the burned debt of a Moncton church might be used to contain the charred remains of his new feathered game protection bill and some of the tentacles of the succession duties amendment act, the government having not paid off the debt to incinerate, Mr. Hartt closed by remarking that he the debt what ever it may the annual charge of \$200,000 tells its own story, unless the government was using this term of interest to accumulate a fund for election purposes.

Dr. Pugsley—The house has been told there will be no election this year.

Mr. Hartt—Perhaps not, but you can't always tell. (Laughter.)

THE SURVEYOR GENERAL.

Hon. Mr. Sweeney said: I have listened with much interest to the criticisms of the opposition speakers during the debate and I now propose taking up, but in a brief matter, some of those which I deem to be the most important points. The amendments to the succession duties bill have been arranged but they would be fully explained when the measure came up before the house. I may say it has been found that in some cases estates worth over \$50,000 were inventoried below that figure to escape the tax, hence the necessity

for one amendment to be made this year. We have not, it is true, many what might be called valuable estates in New Brunswick, but this is no reason why the province should not have on its statute book a measure to increase public revenue that had been found to work well in nearly every other country. Despite what had been said to the contrary, the act for the protection of feathered game was a necessary one, if we wish to prevent the extinction of our great possessions in that direction.

We have the best game country in all America this side of Alaska, and our feathered game constitutes a most important part of that treasure. The government has done much for the protection of the fur-bearing animals and forest game, and it now proposes to enlarge its operations by taking the wild-birds under its wing.

Forcibly shoot over the border, immense quantities and it is at these people the bill was aimed, I believe the time will come, however, when it will also be found necessary to protect our feathered game from our own people as well as visiting sportsmen. I differ somewhat from the member for Charlotte (Hartt) with regard to the growth of small trees. This is a subject to which I have devoted considerable attention and I know that the degree of growth differs radically in various parts of the province. In most sections of New Brunswick the early growth is the most rapid. I had the pleasure of meeting the crown land scalers here in convention last year, the first time a surveyor general ever had that privilege. We went over their duties fully and thoroughly and I was deeply impressed with the intelligence and knowledge of their work.

In every instance investigation found them to be honest and faithful and not in collusion with the lumbermen, a charge that is now and then set afloat on flimsy foundation, quite frequently jealousy being the inspiring motive. While the stumpage returns are not as large now as years ago, the logs being of smaller size, we are getting about every dollar to which we are entitled. Changing the scalers from time to time in new territory was open to the objection that it was hard for a new man to locate all the logs liable to stumpage. I have found it necessary to enlarge the territory of a few scalers, but only in one instance had I to dismiss one of these officers and I am safe in saying that this important service is receiving the very best possible attention.

One reason agriculture does not progress in Carleton county at the rate it does in Kings is the propaganda adopted by the opposition members, who try their utmost to persuade the people that every step in advance taken by the government is for its own partisan advantage and not for the benefit of the country. I deeply deplore such narrow conduct on the part of the gentleman on the other side of the House, but it is on all fours with their treatment of the Highway Act, which when introduced they promised to help make perfect and yet attacked it unmercifully before there was an opportunity to give it a fair working trial.

The member for Northumberland (Morrison) had charged that the business of the country was not being conducted in a business like way, but he had failed to bring forward a single fact in the support of the statement. Then one opposition speaker put the public debt at 33 millions and another at 5 millions. The country would not fail to note the vast discrepancy.
