THE BUDGET DEBATE.

Mr. Osman concluded his speech in the budget debate Friday afternoon, and was followed by Mr. Hartt, of the opposition, who speaks moderately in comparison with some of his colleagues on the same side, and is always given a good hearing.

The Surveyor General followed and made a fine deliverance, showing his strong grasp of public questions, and intimate knowledge of the affairs of his department. He made the important announcement that the government purpose purchasing 60,000 acres of land from the New Brunswick railway company for settlement purposes. Mr. Sweeney is a most valuable addition to the debating talent of the House, and by his acknowledged ability and popularity brings great strength to the government.

Mr. Maxwell was the next speaker, and had not concluded at adjournment.

The debate is taking the usual wide range and will not likely be concluded before Tuesday or Wednesday.

The federal bye-election in Maisonneuve had an unexpected result. The constituency was carried in the last general election by the late Mr. Préfontaine with a majority of 2,200, but in Friday's contest the Liberal candidate was defeated by over 1,000 majority by a nominee of the labor party. Mr. Grothe who stood for the government and who is a manufacturer, seems to have ostracized the labor element, but as the successful candidate is not a pronounced partisan it is probable he will give the government an independent support.

The city council does not feel itself possessed of sufficient information to go ahead with the proposed scheme of commercial electric lighting. The committee, indeed, seems to have been entirely innocent of any knowledge of what such an enterprise would cost and showed wisdom in dropping the proposition for the present, under the circumstances.

The Herald has received another letter from "Justice," on women's rights, but as it is rather pointless, and as the matter has already been pretty well threshed out, no good purpose would be served in publishing it.

The Nova Scotia government promise to bring down during the present legislative session a measure providing for pensioning school teachers.

AFTER A DIVORCE.

Case of Lottimer vs. Lotimer to Come Before Judge Gregory on Tuesday.

A rather interesting divorce case is set down for hearing at the court of divorce and matrimonial causes which is to open here on Tuesday next. Judge Gregory presiding. The plaintiff is Mrs. Ida A. Lottimer, of this city, who is suing her husband, Mr. Robert A. Lottimer, of New York, for an absolute divorce on the ground of adultery and non-support.

The couple were married here in 1889, by Rev. A. J. Mowatt, and lived together as man and wife for a period of about one year. They quarrelled one day over going to a picnic and separated. Since that time it is alleged the defendant has not contributed to the support of his wife and child. He has for the past fifteen years been a resident of New York and it is alleged he has a wife and two children in that city. He holds a position as clerk in a large shoe establishment.

Mrs. Lottimer for some time conducted a dress making establishment on Queen street, but last fall closed up business and removed to Providence, R. I., taking her daughter. She has placed her case in the hands of Mr. O. S. Crockett, M. P.

It is understood that no defence will be offered, but under the rules of the divorce court it will be necessary for the plaintiff to prove her case before she can be granted a decree.

Astonishing Record of Improvements Accomplished by the Hon. H. R. Emmerson.

moving from active employment men whose best days have been spent in Moncton Transcript.—The Hon. Mr. Emmerson as Minister of Railways has established the following record on the Intercolonial Railway during the past six months:

A deficit of \$1,750,000 changed into a small surplus within one year.

The chief superintendent's department and staff abolished as unnecessary.

Season tickets with abnormally low rates changed to the commutation ticket plan.

Monthly statements of earnings and expenditure made public for the first time.

The antiquated system of book-keeping abolished and the system approved by the inter-state railway commission, and adopted by the Grand Trunk and Canadian Pacific being introduced.

The chief officials made responsible for their own departments, followed by increased effectiveness and revolutionary savings in the spending branches.

Unremunerative trains discontinued so far as consistent with the public convenience and efficient economy.

Passenger and freight rates re-adjusted or being re-adjusted so as to minimize inequalities.

The earnings increased within six months by over 6.4 per cent, and the expenditure decreased by 4 per cent.

Improved train despatching introduced and less payments for detention to train hands needed.

Long distance freight and passenger rates being brought up to the standard of other roads for corresponding distances having due regard to competition.

The expenditure and cost of management at terminals and railway stations is being reformed consistent with economy and efficient service.

The cost of fuel is being reduced and also that of haulage to storage points.

A pension bill is also contemplated which will, if adopted, increase the effective efficiency of the staff by re-

MAISONNEUVE ELECTION.

Labor Candidate Defeated the Liberal Nominee.

Montreal, Feb. 24.—Alphonse Ver-ville, president of the Dominion Trades and Labor Council, who ran as a labor candidate, was elected yesterday in Maisonneuve by a majority of 1,027 over L. O. Grothe, the Liberal candidate.

The election was to fill the seat made vacant by the death of Honorable Raymond Préfontaine, who had 2,200 majority in the general election.

Mr. Grothe's attitude on the labor question had considerable to do with his defeat. As a cigar manufacturer, he fought and defeated the labor men and on this account a labor candidate supported by Conservatives was placed in the field.

Owing to the illness of Mr. Grothe, he took no part in the campaign, which was conducted by the minister of marine and the solicitor-general.

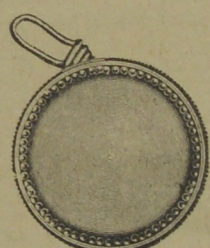

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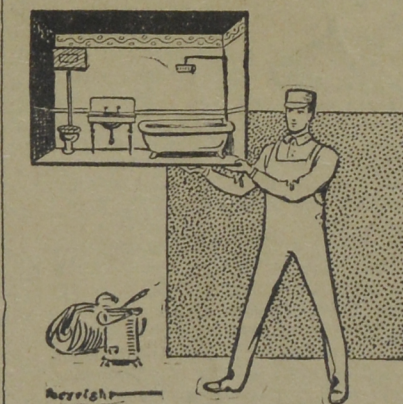
