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A BOSTON BANQUET.

At Which Surveyor General Sweeney Was One of the Chief Guests and a Leading Speaker.

Boston, Jan. 27.—Over 200 members of the Massachusetts Fish and Game Protective Association attended the annual banquet at the Brunswick Thursday night, one of the largest gatherings in the history of the organization. The special guests were the members of the North American Fish and Game Protective Association, numbering about fifty, many of whom are Canadians.

In compliment to the guests the decorations of the hall, which were elaborate, consisted of the British and American colors entwined, with the Canadian coat of arms a central motive of the design.

The guests included Hon. Nelson W. Fisk, ex-governor of Vermont; Hon. F. J. Sweeney, surveyor general of New Brunswick; E. S. D. Chambers of Quebec, secretary of the fish and game protective association of that province; Hon. Henry G. Thomas, fish and game commissioner of Vermont; D. G. Smith, fisheries commissioner of New Brunswick; Hon. L. S. Carlton, chairman of the Maine fish and game commission; A. Kelley Evans, secretary of the Ontario fish and game protective association; Dr. John S. Finnie, president of Quebec fish and game protective association; Charles H. Wilson, vice-president of the North American fish and game protective association, and others.

The introduction of Mr. Sweeney of New Brunswick, was preceded by the drinking of a toast, standing, to King Edward VII., followed by singing by the gathering of God Save Our Gracious King, and then three hearty cheers in response to a shout, "The King, God bless him."

There was a lot of breezy singing by the gathering, between the courses of such lyrics as A Hot Time in the Old Town, Rosy O'Grady, etc., which both astonished and amused the Canadian visitors.

Mr. Sweeney, after a brief resume of the work of the North American Fish and Game Association, concluded by saying:

"Wherever else we may need to come together as nations, there is certainly need of reciprocity in this matter of game protection."

At the closing session of the convention of the North American fish and game protective association the following officers were elected: President, Hon. Jean Provost; vice-presidents, Hon. L. T. Carleton of Me. Hon. F. J. Sweeney of New Brunswick, A. Kelly Evans of Ontario, Dr. George C. Parker of Connecticut, and last year's board of vice presidents. The new executive committee comprises C. F. Burnhaus of New York, Oliver Adams of Ontario, John Chamberlain of Connecticut, and C. E. E. Ussher of Montreal.

A resolution introduced by Hon. Leroy T. Carlton, chairman of the Maine fish and game commission, was discussed, but was not voted upon.

"That the sense of this association is that the carrying of firearms, other than small arms with barrels not exceeding six inches in length, into the wild lands of the state or provinces in the close season, is not conducive to the protection of game. Therefore, this association recommends the passage of legislation to prevent the carrying of firearms other than small firearms, into the wild lands."

THE VALENCIA DISASTER.

Only Forty Survivors of the Awful Wreck on the Pacific Coast.

Seattle, Wash., Jan. 27.—The steamship Topeka, which arrived at Port Townsend yesterday, brought no survivors of the Valencia save those already reported.

The total saved, according to the figures of the officials of the Pacific Coast Company, is forty, including three men found on Turret Island, and one man believed to be alive on the Island, and for whom Indians are searching. This total also includes three reported on the beach near Elanewake. The tug Pioneer, returning from the wreck, reported nothing left of the hull of the Valencia.

Not a man who was saved brought any of his personal effects from the wreck, with the exception of the clothing he wore and what few articles were in his pockets.

During Wednesday night the City of Topeka lay inside the straits and, early Thursday morning, ran westward along the Vancouver shore towards the scene of the wreck. The weather was clear and everything could be seen on the Washington and Vancouver shores. When off Garamnah, a light fog and rain set in around the ship and the shore line, a half mile away, was blotted out.

At ten o'clock the tug Lorne was sighted near the place where the Valencia struck. She reported having cruised five miles to the westward and found no signs of the wreck.

Joe Cigalas, the hero of the wreck who tried to swim to shore, with a life line, and was all but drowned, volunteered to show the Lorne's life-saving crew that was going ashore yesterday in a small boat, where the Valencia lay, and he was transferred from the Topeka to the tug. The Lorne then ran east about two miles but the life boat could not land near the wreck.

The Salver was next sighted by the Topeka, lying further up the coast to the westward, flying signals. The Topeka ran alongside and Captain Troup, of the Salver, reported that he had on board Boatswain Tim McCarthy and the five men who landed at Cape Beale from the Valencia and reported the wreck. He also reported

ed having seen two men on shore who had rigged up a semaphore. The Salver had not been able to make a landing.

A small tug was sighted in the breakers where the wreck was reported to be. The waves appeared to be sweeping all over her, and when the tug was first sighted, it was mistaken for the wreck.

At 11:30 o'clock the tug came alongside the Topeka and proved to be the Orion, a whaler, of Victoria. She reported the wreck all broken up nothing standing but the stump of the mainmast. She had seen no persons standing on shore and no bodies in the wreckage.
