THE WEATHER.

CIVIC POLITICS.

Indications Point to a Municipality of Aldermanic Candidates.

The civic elections are to be held this year on Monday, March 12th, and the indications are that there will be no lack of aldermanic candidates.

In Wellington ward ex-Ald. J. S. Scott and W. S. Hooper have expressed their intention of opposing the present aldermen. Both are strong men and would make a hard fight against any candidates opposing them.

In St. Ann's ward ex-Ald. Joseph Walker has signified his intention of entering the field. The ex-alderman was defeated in a bye-election last year, on a side issue, which is not likely to play much part in the approaching contest. The present alderman for St. Ann's will offer again, and ex-Ald. Vanwart may also enter the field.

In Carleton ward the friends of ex-Ald. John Maxwell are urging him to offer as a candidate, but he has not yet consented. Ex-Ald. Farrell has not yet made any announcement as to his intentions with respect to the coming civic contest.

In Queens ward Recorder Colter and Mr. John McKnight are likely to offer as aldermanic candidates.

Ex-Ald. James Rogers has his ear to the ground in King's ward, and may be a candidate.

Ald. Stockford says that if he is opposed in Wellington ward for alderman, he will vacate the field and go after the mayoralty.

The injunction order was for the purpose of restraining the purchasers from paying the Richards Company the money due them until Mr. Winslow's claim is settled.

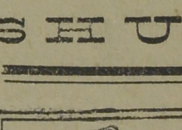
