HONOR FOR LORD GREY.

Who with some of his Cabinet Ministers are to Dine at Waldorf-Astoria as New York Pilgrims' Guests.

PRESIDENT ROOSEVELT MAY BE PRESENT.

New York, March 10.—(Special.)—Lord Grey, governor general of Canada, has accepted the invitation of the Pilgrims to a dinner in his honor at the Waldorf-Astoria on Saturday, March 31st, and will come down to Ottawa for the occasion, with several of his cabinet ministers, according to The Tribune.

Secretary of State Root and other members of the Washington administration, as well as Sir Mortimer Du-

rand, British ambassador, have also promised to attend the dinner, while President Roosevelt may be present, if his engagements will permit.

The dinner will be the first public entertainment for the governor general of the Dominion any where in the United States.

In the absence of Bishop Potter, Morris K. Jessup, one of the vice presidents of the Pilgrims, will act as presiding officer.

PROBABLY A FORGERY.

Man Claiming to be Abram Jones, Burned in Moncton Fire, Puts Foresters in Awkward Position.

Moncton, March 10.—(Special.)—Fred Sears, secretary-treasurer of the Independent Order of Foresters' Court, of which Abraham Jones, the supposed victim of the recent I. C. R. paint shop fire, was a member, has received a letter from Boston, signed "Abraham Jones," saying he is in Boston, and requesting him to keep the dues paid up.

Sears has not been able to identify

the signature and the letter is regarded as a forgery, possibly, for the purpose of keeping the beneficiaries from collecting insurance.

There is scarcely any doubt that the remains found in the ruins were those of Jones. It is said, however, that the Foresters here have received notice not to pay over the insurance to Jones' wife at present.

CRAZED BY RELIGION.

Woman Brought from Florida in Straightjacket, Raving.

New York, March 10.—(Special.)—Made insane by her enthusiasm about her new creed, according to her brother, Mrs. William Jarvis, wife of a well known hotel man of Palm Beach, Fla., arrived in New Jersey City yesterday in a private car, confined in a straightjacket. She is at the home of her parents, Mr. and Mrs. William Decker, sr., at Bloomfield, Staten Island. It is feared that her reason may never be restored.

The younger Mr. Decker reached Palm Beach on Monday, and found his sister a raving maniac, guarded by several attendants, and pinioned in a straightjacket to prevent her doing injury to herself and those about her.

"Early last winter a woman exponent of Christian Science held services in Palm Beach," said Mr. Decker last night. "Mrs. Jarvis became mildly interested and finally enthusiastic. She was converted to that faith and soon thought and talked of nothing else."

"From a strikingly handsome and gracious woman she changed, until about a week ago she became a mental and physical wreck, due to thinking too constantly of her new belief. About ten days ago she collapsed and was found mad and shrieking in her room."

Considerable difficulty was experienced in getting Mrs. Jarvis away from Palm Beach, and she had to be restrained constantly by the attendants in the private car.

TRURO LADY'S DEATH.

Leaves Valuable Estate, Half of which will go to Sackville Citizen.

Truro, N. S., March 10.—(Special.)—Miss Lizzie Faulkner, died suddenly here this morning of heart trouble. She had been an invalid many years, but for some months had been quite active. She had a bad turn the first of the week, resulting in her sudden death.

She leaves a large property including valuable real estate in the centre of the town, which will be divided between J. Foreman Faulkner of Sackville, and her sister, Mrs. Churchill.

ARCHBISHOP O'BRIEN DEAD.

Distinguished Prelate of Halifax Passed Away Very Suddenly from Apoplexy.

Halifax, March 10.—The Right Rev. Cornelius O'Brien, D. D. Catholic archbishop of Halifax, died very suddenly last night of apoplexy.

His grace was in delicate health for several years, but recently showed much improvement and was actively engaged in the duties of his episcopacy. He issued his Lenten pastoral, which was read on Sunday last in the Catholic churches, and celebrated mass at St. Mary's Cathedral that day. A few days ago he complained of indigestion and was under his physician's care, but no serious result was anticipated. His doctor left him at ten o'clock comfortable and well. His grace had retired and his sister, who was at his bedside, left the room to get him a drink of water. Returning a moment later she found him dead.

He was sixty-two years old. He started life as a clerk in a country store at Summerside, P. E. I., where he had as fellow worker President Schurman of Cornell University.

Archbishop O'Brien was a man of great intellect, force and literary taste. As monuments to his religious zeal he has left many fine churches, schools and philanthropic institutions erected during his twenty-three years' episcopate. He was an eloquent advocate of home rule for Ireland, a staunch imperialist and strong Canadian.

ACTIVE AND USEFUL LIFE.

His Grace Cornelius O'Brien, Archbishop of Halifax, was the son of a Wexford county father and a mother whose birthplace was in the county of Cork, Ireland. Born near New Glasgow, P. E. I., he commenced his common school education under Robert Laird, an elder brother of Hon. David Laird. He afterwards attended school at Pubnico, principally to learn French, and commenced the battle of life as a clerk in a mercantile establishment at Summerside. When 19 years of age he realized what had long been his strongest desire, by entering St. Dunstan's College, Charlottetown, to study for the priesthood. After two years he became a student at the College of the Propaganda at Rome. There he carried off the gold medal for excellence, and graduated doctor of divinity and philosophy. In 1871 he was ordained to the priesthood, and re-

turning to P. E. I., was for two years a professor and prefect of studies in St. Dunstan's College. In 1873 he was appointed principal priest at the Cathedral, but his health giving way, he was sent as parish priest to Indian River, where he remained eight years. In 1880 he accompanied the late Bishop McIntyre to Rome as secretary, and in the following year paid a second visit to the Eternal City with Archbishop Hannan, at his special request. On the death of the latter prelate, Dr. O'Brien was appointed to succeed him as fourth Archbishop of Halifax.

Since his appointment His Grace has always shown unwavering activity in the work of the diocese, a large number of churches, schools and glebe houses having arisen through his instrumentality.

During his first year of office he commenced the erection of St. Patrick's Church, Halifax, which he later completed at a cost of \$75,000.

Subsequently he revived St. Patrick's Home, a reformatory for Catholic boys; founded the Victoria Infirmary and the Infants' Home; purchased an archiepiscopal residence; established several colonies of nuns; and carried out certain costly and much needed repairs in St. Mary's Cathedral.

In 1897, it was announced that the archbishop was taking steps for the establishment of a Catholic university at Halifax under the management of the Jesuits of the Benedictines. His Grace's literary efforts have kept pace with his other work. To many fugitive poems, essays and articles contributed from time to time to the periodical press, he added works of lasting interest and merit. Of these the principal are: "Philosophy of the Bible Vindicated," "Mater Admirabilis," "After Many Years," a novel; "Saint Agnes, Virgin and Martyr," "Annita, a modern life drama," and "Memoirs of Bishop Burke."

Archbishop O'Brien was, during its existence, an office-bearer in the Imperial Federation League, and was a vice president for Nova Scotia of the British Empire League in Canada. He preached the sermon at the state funeral of the late Sir John Thompson, in January, 1895, and in 1896 was elected president of the Royal Society of Canada.

DIED AT THE HOSPITAL.

Mr. Michael Larry, of Marysville died at the Victoria hospital this morning, after a short illness. He was seventy-five years of age and a native of Ireland. There are no relatives living in this country. The deceased was a well known character and will be much missed around Marysville. The remains were interred in the rural cemetery this afternoon, R. B. Adams undertaker.

CHILD'S DEATH.

May the three year-old daughter of Mr. William Millican died last night from tuberculosis. The funeral will take place tomorrow afternoon, John G. Adams, undertaker.

LATE DR. MACDONALD.

Deceased was One of the Best Known Physicians of Boston's West End.

Boston Herald, Friday.—Dr. James Macdonald, one of the best known physicians of the West End, died at his home, 23 Bowdoin street, yesterday morning, of heart failure, at the age of 73. Dr. Macdonald was a graduate of the Harvard medical school and had practised his profession in Boston for 40 years, residing first at 83 Leverett street, then at 42 Stanford street, and subsequently at 23 Bowdoin street. He began to fail in health about 18 months ago, and for the last six months his decline had been rapid.

Dr. Macdonald came originally from Nova Scotia, and a sister and a brother, Rev. Willard Macdonald, a Presbyterian minister, reside at Fredericton, N. B. Another brother, George F. Macdonald, lives at Melrose Highlands. The funeral will be held Sunday at 2 o'clock, from 23 Bowdoin street, and interment will take place at Woodlawn cemetery.

UPPER MAUGERVILLE.

March 10.—The heavy wind of last evening did considerable damage down river. At Upper Maugerville in addition to blowing down several trees, a barn owned by Mr. John Rice, was struck by the gale and completely demolished.
