## HOW TO VOTE.

The Herald has heard of several "Slates" that have been made up for Monday's voting in the civic election, but the electors would do well to beware of combinations and exercise their own independent judgment in marking their ballots.

There seems to be an impression in some circles, that almost any man, no matter how small his measure of intelligence, or how meagre his business capacity is good enough to be an alderman, but there are some large questions to be handled by this year's council, and the best available men should be sent to that body.

Electors should vote for no candidate who has shown little aptitude for conducting his own business, or for one who has small appreciation of the responsibility of the position he seeks. The electors should also be on their guard against the non-progressive candidate, who perhaps, on the alleged ground of economy, is prepared to oppose every measure looking to the advance and development of the city. Fredericton people have faith in the future of their city, and want men at the council board, who while carefully guarding the public interests, are prepared to support measures for the upbuilding of the city.

More personal canvasses, should not avail any candidate, but all should be judged on the ground of their capacity for discharging the duties which they are seeking to undertake.

## A GREAT OPPORTUNITY.

Members of the legislature will be good boys tomorrow and attend church. By special arrangement in the morning they will be present at the Cathedral and hear a sermon from their chaplain, Rev. Sub-dean Street. There is no hint of the Sub-dean's probable subject, but it would not be surprising if he were to discuss the text, "Thou shalt not bear false witness against thy neighbor, and thou shalt do no slugging nor encourage fictitious encounters or other breaches of the peace by the use of violent language." The Sub-dean will have an excellent opportunity to do the state a great service by mellowing the hostile attitude of the politicians towards each other, and forcing on their attention the precept "Let brotherly love continue." As a recessionary hymn, "Peace, perfect peace," with the attorney general, and the opposition leader linked together, and the members of the public accounts committee in friendly intercourse, would also tend to heal the wounds, opened in the legislative chamber.

It should be understood, however, that quotations from Shakespeare will be tabooed for the day, and with this proposition, doubtless both the attorney general and the opposition leader will agree.

## HONORED MR. EMMERSON.

The Canadian society of New York, a large, representative and very much alive organization, announce their annual dinner for Saturday evening, March 17, at the Hotel Astor, and that Hon. Henry R. Emmerson will be one of the chief speakers at the function. A splendid musical programme will be presented, and a reception held just before the dinner. Each year this society secures the attendance of some prominent Canadian public man as one of the chief speakers at their dinner, and this year the executive was able to induce Mr. Emmerson to join in the festivities. The president of the Canadian Society is Mr. Wallace Downey, the well known shipbuilder and with him on the entertainment committee is Mr. Gilbert M. Edgett, both former New Brunswickers.

The Herald feels sure that the society will be pleased with Mr. Emmerson and his address, and the members need not be told that he is one of the leading figures in Canadian politics to-day, and is charged with the responsible task of managing the government railways and bringing surpluses to the Intercolonial, instead of the usual deficits.

## TORY JOB RECALLED.

The Quebec Telegraph asserts that the payment the other day of the large sum of \$7,000,000 by the C. P. R., to the treasurer of the province of Quebec recalls one of the foulest episodes in our provincial history. This money was the balance of the price for which the old North

Shore Railway was sold in 1882 to Senechal and his gang by the then Conservative administration. By this transaction a road that had cost the province \$12,615,426 was sacrificed to a gang of speculators for \$8,150,000, thus occasioning in one swoop a loss to the province of no less than \$4,664,426.99. It is estimated that the deal netted to the conspirators the handsome profit of \$1,395,000.

Little wonder that the Quebecer of today mistrusts the modern disciples of the political party which condoned such prodigal misuse of public property.

The Telegraph is urging the St. John civic candidates to call a public meeting before the elections and discuss questions at issue. We do not know how it is in St. John, but Fredericton ratepayers take so little interest in civic affairs that when the aldermen called a public meeting, the audience numbered scarcely two hundred. Perhaps it was because we have been hearing so much oratory in the legislature recently that we were indifferent to the rich bill of fare in that line offered at the Opera House.

This is the best financial year the Presbyterian Church has yet had. Receipts over and above last year are about \$42,000. A deficit of \$20,000 in the foreign mission fund at the beginning of the year has been wiped out, and all funds are out of debt except the aged and infirm ministers' fund, in which the deficit stands at \$4,000, compared with \$6,000 previously. The contributions in 1904-5 exceeded those of the previous year by \$40,000.

An interesting political rumor is that Mr. Hazen will not again contest Sunbury, but will try to hand that constituency over to Organizer Hubbard. Mr. Hazen's prospects for re-election in Sunbury are not of the brightest. The people of that county are tiring of a non-resident representative. Mr. Hazen assured them last election that he was sure to come into power immediately, and it would be a great thing for Sunbury to have the premiership.

The Moncton City Council, composed of both Liberals and Conservatives, has passed an unanimous vote of thanks to Hon. Mr. Emmerson for his prompt action in coming to Moncton after the recent fire, setting in motion temporary relief as well as permanent improvements, also for his assurance that the railway shops will be rebuilt, and that he will uphold and maintain the principle of government ownership and operation of the Intercolonial.

The sudden death of Archbishop O'Brien of Halifax, shocks the public, and is a matter of general regret. His Grace was a man of rare talent and rose to his exalted position from humble beginnings by sheer force of his ability. He was an accomplished preacher and speaker and took a warm interest in all public questions.

It is apparent, says The Ottawa Free Press, that the Canadian Methodist Church regards Japan as a most promising field for mission labor. Both Rev. Dr. Sutherland, missionary secretary, and Rev. Dr. Carman, general superintendent of the Church, go to Japan this summer to look after her varied interests in the Japanese field.

Hon. Winston Churchill, under secretary of state for the colonies, has shown appreciation of his position by choosing Mr. Hamar Greenwood, a Canadian member of the Imperial House of Commons, for his private secretary. Mr. Greenwood is a native of Ontario and represents the City of York.

## BITS OF NEWS.

Mr. Charles Thornwhite, wife of the proprietor of the grist mill at Vienna, Ont., was accidentally killed Friday. She was standing near a revolving shaft, which caught her dress and wound her up on the shaft, her head striking on two hoppers, which stood each side of the shaft, and she was carried around. Before the mill could be shut down part of her skull was torn off and she was dead when released from the shaft.

Hon. Mr. Emmerson has received two offers of land near Moncton for the workshops of the Intercolonial and if he does not get land to suit him at a reasonable price in the city of Moncton he will accept one of these offers. He wants more land on account of the transcontinental terminal as well as the workshops.

Geo. A. Sherriff, who two months ago married Martha, daughter of the late Senator Fulford, died at St. Vincent de Paul Hospital, Brockville, Ont., Friday. He was taken seriously ill a few weeks ago, and last week submitted to a surgical operation in the last hope of saving his life. He was 30 years old.

Two accidental deaths occurred in Albert County within the past week. Last week John Steeves was killed at Curryville by a tree falling on him, and Thursday, in the Osman plaster quarries at Hillsboro, Richard Milton was crushed to death by a cave-in in a tunnel in which he was working. A quantity of plaster fell on him and his head was crushed, his leg broken and other terrible injuries sustained. Other workmen were nearby, but were not injured.

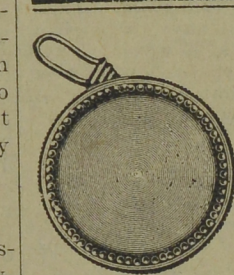
