DENMARK'S NEW KING.

Frederick the Eighth Proclaimed Sovereign Amid the Hearty Plaudits of the People.

Copenhagen, Jan. 30.—(Special)—Frederick VII. was proclaimed King of Denmark at noon today in Amal-fenberg square in front of the palace.

The ceremony lasted only a few minutes. Premier M. Christensen appeared on the balcony, and announced to 50,000 persons assembled below, the death of King Christian IX, and the accession of his eldest son. The premier then called for cheers for King Frederick VIII.

The new ruler of Denmark joined with the law, ascended to the throne. While thus assuming this high, and responsible position, for which the Almighty has chosen us, it is our determination to maintain unswervingly the constitution of our country, and to preserve the rights and privilege of the whole people.

King Frederick received a warm, hearty greeting from the assembled crowd, whose cheers mingled enthusiastically with the National anthem.

King Frederick early in the afternoon announced his accession to the throne in a proclamation as follows:

"We, Frederick VIII, King of Denmark, by the grace of God, do hereby announce and make known, that our dearly beloved father, King Christian IX, was yesterday gathered to his fathers by a sudden, but calm and peaceful death.

"We have, thereupon in accordance with the law, ascended to the throne. While thus assuming this high, and responsible position, for which the Almighty has chosen us, it is our determination to maintain unswervingly the constitution of our country, and to preserve the rights and privilege of the whole people.

"If, the people themselves will have the same confidence in their King, which we have in our people, then will God grant, his grace and blessing to all of us."

BANISHED THE BIBLE.

Justice Tierney Thinks it Desecration to use it in Court.

New York, Jan. 30.—Justice Tierney, of the municipal court in the Bronx has abolished the use of the Bible in his court. Explaining his action he says:

"I have removed the Bible from use in my court. It was a desecration to use it there. The lying words from the mouths of witnesses made its use a mockery, a travesty. I was brought up to regard it with veneration and reverence as the Word of God. It is shocking to find men calling upon the Deity to witness the truth of what they say—so help me God—with a lie in their hearts and upon the lips with which they profaned the Good Book.

"I now swear or affirm a witness with uplifted hands, but it really has no significance to my mind. I would prefer to let every person tell his or her story without oath or affirmation and then do the best I can toward ascertaining the truth."

JACK THE SQUEEZER.

Hides in the Street, Makes Faces and Terrifies Women.

Boston, Jan. 30.—South end young women are afraid to go out after dark nights because of the appearance of a strange man who is hiding nightly in the vicinity of East Newton and Washington streets and who follows young women, making horrible faces and threatening bodily harm. Policemen in civilian clothes are patrolling the streets. The man is thought to be mentally unbalanced. Young women living at the Franklin Square House in East Newton St. are so frightened that they fear to go out at night.

The police call the man "Jack the Squeezier," for he has seized several young women and attempted to hug them. One woman described him as being about 40 years old, with a bushy gray and dark beard and a heavy mustache. He wears a short coat and a dark colored sweater and a cap with visor.

Over a dozen complaints have been lodged against this man. He generally makes his appearance about 8 o'clock. A man thought to be causing a commotion last week in a colored people's church in Northampton street. An hour later, in a Rutland street restaurant, when a waiter spoke to him, he jumped up and ran out.

PLAYED A DRAW GAME.

Marysville and Fredericton Hockey Teams Made Exciting Sport at the Arctic Rink.

Fredericton, 3; Crescents, 3;

The second of the series of hockey matches between the Marysville Crescents and the Fredericton team for a trophy was played at the Arctic rink last evening and resulted in a draw, each side scoring three goals. It was a spectators' game of the whirlwind sort and everybody thoroughly enjoyed it. Within five minutes of the close the score, stood 3 to 1 in favor of the visitors but the Fredericton boys woke up and were able to run in two goals before the whistle tooted. It was a sensational and brilliant finish and the noise and shouts of the fans, made the rafters reverberate.

The game was undoubtedly the fastest seen here this season and the eight hundred or so spectators more than got their money's worth. Both teams were on their mettle, and worked hard for victory. The play was a little on the rough side at times, but there were no serious casualties and the spare men were not called upon to take the ice.

Owing to a misunderstanding over a referee the game was half an hour late in starting. George Blizard of St. John had been chosen but a telegram from him stated that he had been unable to make train connection. The Crescents wanted a Marysville man to officiate, but the Fredericton boys would not consent to this; neither would the Crescents accept a Fredericton man. Just as the members of the rival teams had about given up hope of arriving at an agreement, a long, lanky chap named Miller, hailing from Montreal, blew in an offered his services. As he was a stranger to all hands neither team was able to raise objections and he refereed the match. He proved rather an easy mark, and allowed the players on both sides more latitude than is usually allowed. Only once did he enforce a penalty and that was when he caught a Fredericton man and a Marysville man scrapping near the Fredericton goal. He sent them both to the boards for a two minute rest.

MATCH IN DETAIL.

The game started very lively at the sound of the whistle, and the boys kept up a cyclone clip all the way through. The puck went into Marysville territory after the face off, but was soon travelling in the other direction. In less than a minute from the commencement of the play Fred Robinson shot the first goal for his team. Sharp work followed for the next ten minutes with honors about even. Winslow aimed several hot ones at the Marysville goal but they were neatly blocked by

Fullerton. Finally Rowan captured the puck and shot the first goal for his team, at short range. The applause which greeted this play was almost deafening. Just before half time was called Fred Robinson after considerable juggling with the puck, lanced it into the Fredericton net, making the score stand 2 to 1 in favor of the Crescents.

Both teams were in good form when they faced off for the second half. The Fredericton boys realized that the odds were against them, but their work did not show that they were in the least discouraged. They played on the aggressive and kept the Marysville defence line on the alert. After the play had proceeded about ten minutes Inch gave goal keeper Martin a shock by scoring from the side of the rink. The shot was not well aimed and was probably not intended for a goal, but it struck a player and hopped into the net. It was a piece of bad luck for the Fredericton boys but seemed to spur them on to greater efforts. In a skirmish at the Marysville end of the rink Inch met with a slight accident, which caused a delay of five minutes. The boys were pretty tired by this time, and the rest seemed to be appreciated.

The Fredericton boys certainly made a splendid finish by tying the score and the enthusiasm of the spectators knew no bounds. Five minutes before the close Malloy got the puck on a pass and scored the second goal for his team. After the face off the puck was returned to Marysville territory and Sandy Staples in a very pretty play, landed it into the net, tying the score.

The most exciting hockey game that Fredericton has seen this year ended with the rubber in Marysville territory.

MONCTON WHITEWASHED ST. STEPHEN.

St. Stephen, Jan. 30.—While the score in the hockey match here last night was seven to nothing in favor of Moncton, the game was by no means all one sided.

Moncton played seventeen minutes before it scored, and, with one or two exceptions, all the other goals were only won after hard contests and the puck was around their goal often enough and long enough to keep the friends of the home team in intense expectancy and to give abundant opportunity for cheering.

The Moncton team put up an excellent game of good, clean hockey, as was expected of them and when they were not kept too busy gave some excellent exhibitions of combination work.

The Thistles played with much of their old time vigor, strengthened as they were by two of the old members who had not played in other matches this year, it is doubtful if any league team excepting Moncton could have won from them.

Mr. Howard's work as referee was not as satisfactory as on former occasions here. It was almost impossible for St. Stephen to play in Moncton territory without repeated soundings of the whistle and in other ways he gave evidence of too great solicitude for the welfare of the visitors.
