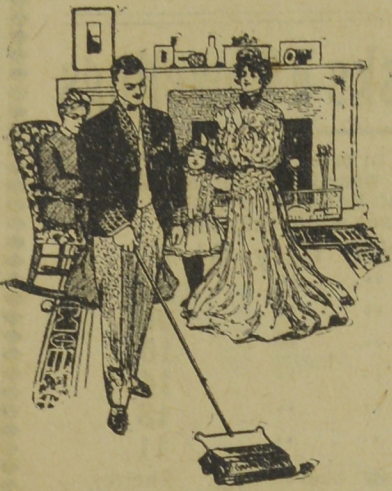

MUST BE NO RICE-THROWING.

The Rev. Dr. J. C. Jones, Rector,
Opposed to Wedding Custom.

Rev. Dr. J. C. Jones, rector of
St. Mary's, P. E. Church, Glasson
avenue, near Willoughby, N. Y., had
forbidden the throwing of rice at
weddings in the church named. Dr.
Jones says:

"I wrote a short article on that
subject, which appeared in St. Mary's
Parish Record of November, 1905,
and since that time we have had no
rice throwing in the church. St.
Mary's church is a free church, open
to any one who wants to be married.
The rich do not pay, nor do the
poor. Of course, under the circum-
stances, if people do not wish to con-
form to our rules, they cannot be
married in St. Mary's church. Some
people bring rice to a church on the
occasion of a wedding, and there is
no harm in it, but, on the other
hand, there are people who, perhaps,
do not understand what is the prop-
er thing to do at a service of that
kind. The incident that promoted the
article in the Record occurred at a
wedding in our church, when a wo-
man stepped out and threw a two
pound bag of rice at the bride as she
was coming down the aisle on her
way to her carriage. While it is true
that the bride was not seriously
hurt, she received a severe shock. The
sexton tried to find out who the wo-
man was, but she escaped to the
street. Since then we have had no
rice throwing in St. Mary's Church."

Dr. Jones said the bag of rice
struck the bride in the face and he
spoke as though he thought the mar-
riage ceremony was of too sacred a
character to permit any act or prac-
tice that would tend to coarseness or
to mar the sanctity of the service.

Notice of Legislation

The City of Fredericton will pre-
sent for enactment at the next ses-
sion of the Legislature of New
Brunswick Bills to authorize and em-
power the city council as follows:

To provide for the appointment of
a Chief of Police, and to vest the ap-
pointment of Police Officers and Po-
lice Constables in the city council.
To establish and carry on a system
of incandescent lighting in said city
with the necessary powers incidental
thereto. To issue debentures to de-
fray the expense of the proposed im-
provements to the water supply and
to amend the acts relating to water
and sewerage. To regulate the num-
bering of houses and buildings with-
in the city and confirm a bye-law
relating to telegraph, telephone and
other pole lines within the city. To
encourage the establishment of indus-
trial enterprises in said city by
granting certain exemptions and
other aid and assistance thereto. To
amend and consolidate the law relat-
ing to rates and taxes in said city.

FATHER INTERVENES.

G. B. Gardiner, 16-Year-old New
Hampshire Swain, Led Home by
Father, His Lady Love is True.

Providence, R. I., Feb. 12.—The mi-
nions of the law have cruelly, and at
the instigation of stern parents, in-
terfered with the affairs of the hearts
of two young lovers. As a result,
Gardiner B. Gibson, who looks to be
twenty-three years old, but is not
quite seventeen, journeyed tonight or
tomorrow morning, while Annie Sul-
livan, nearly seven years his senior,
has returned to her home in North
Providence, intending to wait until
Gardiner shall have attained his ma-
jority and is his own boss.

The young man is a splendid speci-
men of the hearty New Hampshire
type. He is big, strong, broad
shouldered and full of blood. Last
summer he went into the woods near
Bemis, N. H., and was made a sec-
tion boss. When he came out of the
woods in September he went to the
Bemis House, a small hostelry, and
there saw Miss Sullivan, who is tall
and very good looking. Annie was
working as a chambermaid, and later
as a cook.

With both it was a case of love at
first sight, the courtship progressing
so well that Annie left Bemis on
January 19th, and it was understood
that Gardiner would come here and
make her a visit. Two weeks ago
today he appeared at the door of An-
nie's mother's house. Arrangements
were made for a wedding when Gar-
diner should obtain work, his inten-
tions being to "drive an electric
car."

His people got word a few days
ago that he was here, and yesterday
a telegram and letter were received
from Bemis asking that the boy be
taken into custody. The letter was
from the mother, who averred that
her boy had been bewitched by the
girl. Tearfully Gardiner promised to
go home with his father. Annie was
not so soft. She was indignant at
the separation. She would never
forget Gardiner, but would wait for
him to come and wed her. She went
home to await his coming.

CURE FOR TUBERCULOSIS.

Prof. Behring's Treatment of Cows
With Tuberculin.

New York, Feb. 12.—The Herald
publishes the following despatch from
Berlin.—Professor Emil Von Behring
discoverer of the diphtheria serum,
addressing the German Agricultural
Council, announced his determination
to adhere to the resolution which he
promulgated in Paris of keeping his
tuberculosis remedy secret till the
autumn.

Prof. Behring discussed at length
the method of preventing consump-
tion by immunizing milk cows. The
aim is to obtain milk having immu-
nizing properties. He asserts that he
has approximately solved this prob-
lem. Cows are treated when very
young with a fluid which Professor
Behring calls tuberculese.

It is injected under the skin of the
young cows repeatedly for two to
four weeks. The remedy at first was
very costly, because it was almost
impossible to preserve it in good con-
dition, but a method has recently
been discovered by which it can be
preserved satisfactorily and at a
moderate cost.

Professor Behring also treated
cows which showed a virulent type of
tuberculosis in their milk, but the
bacteria disappeared after several
weeks' treatment. His theory is
that children fed on milk from cows
rendered immune through his treat-
ment become themselves immune.

NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

SEALED TENDERS, addressed to
the undersigned, marked on the enve-
lope "Tenders for Construction,"
will be received at the office of the
Commissioner of the Transconti-
ental Railway at Ottawa, until twelve
o'clock noon on Monday, the 12th day
of March, 1906, for the work re-
quired for the construction, in accordance
with the plans, profiles and specifica-
tions of said Commissioners for the
following sections of the Transcon-
tinent Railway, the said work to
be completed on or before the first
day of September, 1907, viz:—

(1) District "F." From a point
designated on the plans of the said
Commissioners at or near the City of
Winnipeg, to a point known as Pen-
insula Crossing, near the junction
point of the Fort William branch of
the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway, a
distance of about 245 miles.

(2) District "B." From a point
designated on the plans of the said
Commissioners, at the north end of
the Quebec Bridge and Railway Com-
pany's bridge in the vicinity of the
City of Quebec, to a point near the
La Tuque, a distance of about 150
miles.

(3) A steel viaduct about 3,000 feet
long across the Cap Rouge Valley, in
said District "B," in the vicinity of
the City of Quebec, the work to be
performed in accordance with the
General Specifications of the Com-
missioners of the Transcontinental
Railway, and the General Specifica-
tions for steel bridges and viaducts
of the Department of Railways and
Canals of Canada, 1905.

Plans, profiles and specifications
may be seen in the office of the Chief
Engineer of the Commissioners at
Ottawa, also in the office of the Dis-
trict Engineer at Kenora, Ontario,
for the section of District "F," and
for the section of District "B," in
the office of the District Engineer at
Quebec.

Persons tendering are notified that
tenders will not be considered unless
made in duplicate, and on the print-
ed forms supplied by the Commis-
sioners.

Separate tenders must be submit-
ted for the work in each District.

Tenders shall not be in any way
entitled to rely on the classifica-
tion or any other information given
by any person on behalf of the Com-
missioners, and before submitting
any tender, bidders should make
a careful examination of the
plans, profiles, drawings and
specifications, and read the forms to
be executed, and fully inform them-
selves as to the quantity and quality
of materials and character of work-
manship required; and are understood
to accept and agree to be bound by
the terms and conditions contained
in the form of contract, specifications
etc., annexed to the former tender.

Each tender must be signed and
sealed by all the parties to the ten-
der and witnessed and accompanied
by an accepted cheque on a char-
tered bank of the Dominion of Cana-
da, payable to the Commissioners of
the Transcontinental Railway for the
sum of four hundred thousand dol-
lars (\$400,000), for District "F," and
two hundred and twenty-five thou-
sand dollars (\$225,000), for District
"B," and thirty-five thousand dol-
lars (\$35,000) for steel viaduct in
said District "B." Any person whose
tender is accepted shall within ten
days after the acceptance thereof
furnish the security required by the
Commissioners for the due and faith-
ful performance of the contract ac-
cording to its terms, sign the con-
tract, specifications and other docu-
ments required to be signed by said
Commissioners; and in any case of re-
fusal or failure on the part of the
party whose tender is accepted to
complete and execute a contract with
the said Commissioners and to fur-
nish the approved security within ten
days after the acceptance of the ten-
der, the said cheque shall be forfeit-
ed to the Commissioners as liquidat-
ed damages for such refusal or fail-
ure, and all contract rights acquired
by the acceptance of the tender shall
be forfeited. Cheques deposited by
parties whose tenders are rejected
will be returned within ten days af-
ter the signing of the contract.

Attention is called to the following
clauses in the form of contract:—
"All mechanics, labourers or other
persons who perform labour for the
purposes of the construction of the
works hereby contracted for shall be
paid such wages as are generally ac-
cepted as current for competent
workmen in the District in which the
work is being performed, and, if
there is no current rate in such Dis-
trict, then a fair and reasonable rate
and, in the event of a dispute arising
as to what is the current or a fair
and reasonable rate, it shall be de-
termined by the Commissioners,
whose decision shall be final."

"This agreement is subject to the
regulations now in force, or which
may at any time hereafter be in
force, during the construction
of the works, hereby con-
tracted for, made under the author-
ity of the Department of Labour, and
which are or shall be applicable to
such works."

"The contractor shall in connec-
tion with the whole of the said work,
as far as practicable, use only ma-
terial, machinery, plant, supplies and
rolling stock manufactured or pro-
duced in Canada, provided the same can
be obtained as cheaply and upon as
good terms in Canada as elsewhere,
having regard to quality and price."

The contractor shall conform to
the Fire Regulations adopted by the
Commissioners, and also to the Laws
and Regulations respecting fires in
the different Provinces wherein the
work is being performed.

The right is reserved to reject any
or all tenders.

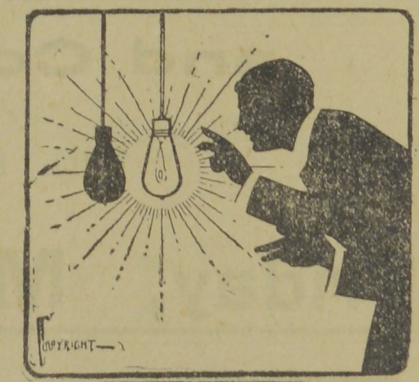
