

CELEBRATED THEIR DEBT REDEMPTION.

People of St. Paul's Presbyterian Church
Rejoice that Their Financial Obligations Are All Removed.

EVENT CELEBRATED BY PUBLICLY BURNING THE REDEEMED BONDS.

Interesting Historical Reviews by Mr. L. W. Johnston
and Mrs. J. R. Howie--Addresses by the Pastor
and Others--Good Musical Programme.

St. Paul's Presbyterian church in this city dates back to 1829 and its history has been one of constant progress during the intervening seventy-seven years.

In its early days it had financial struggles and its pastoral continuity was often disturbed, but today the church and congregation is one of the most substantial and flourishing in the maritime provinces.

Under the administration of Rev. Willard Macdonald, the present pastor, every vestige of debt has been removed from the splendid new stone church opened for worship in 1886, and the outlook for the future is most encouraging.

CELEBRATION PLANNED

In July last year the last of the \$10,000 bonds issued for the erection of the new church was redeemed and at the last congregational meeting it was resolved to celebrate the event by publicly burning the bonds with appropriate ceremony.

The members of the session and members of the trustee board with their wives were constituted a general committee to arrange the matter and they delegated the details to a sub-committee consisting of Mrs. W. C. Crockett, Mrs. Geo. W. Hodge, Messrs. W. M. Clarke, C. A. McVey and L. C. Macnutt, in consultation with the pastor, Rev. Willard Macdonald.

The celebration occurred last night and was a splendid success.

The new church was crowded with people of all denominations who took great interest in the unique event.

THE PROGRAMME.

Rev. Willard Macdonald occupied the chair and the exercises commenced at eight o'clock, with the singing of "All Hail the Power of Jesus Name" by the choir.

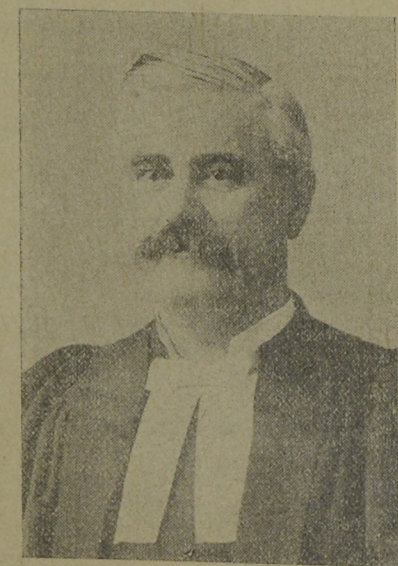
This was followed by a selection from a trio composed of Miss Maud McKee and Messrs. F. L. Cooper and A. E. Massie.

Mr. L. W. Johnston, secretary of the building committee of St. Paul's, was next called upon and gave a most interesting historical address, the full text of which will be found below.

Mr. Johnston's address was followed by a musical selection from a quartette composed of Messrs. Cooper and Edney, Mrs. Colwell and Miss Kelly.

Mrs. J. R. Howie was next introduced and spoke on the good work accomplished on behalf of the church by the Woman's Aid Society and Working Band. Her address will be found below.

The next speaker, said that Mr. Johnston and Mrs. Howie had gone over the ground so thoroughly that there was not much left for him to

say. Since last July he said the church had been free from debt, the last \$10,000 debentures having then been redeemed. He wished to point out, however, that more than \$10,000 had been collected by the church during that ten years.

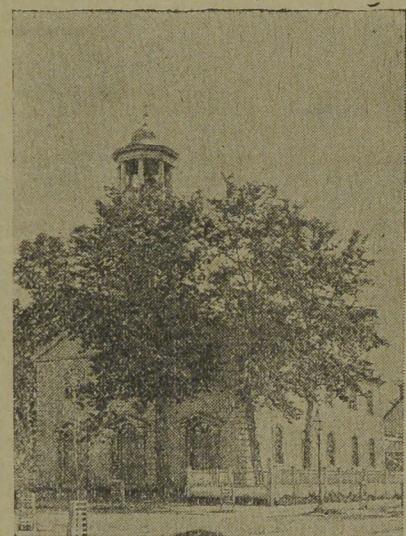
For the twenty years ending Dec. 31st, 1905, the amount raised by St. Paul's church for all purposes reached the magnificent total of \$103,000. Of this amount over \$13,000 was given to the schemes of the church, such as missionary and educational work, and \$4,000 was devoted to other religious objects.

He hoped that the good work would go on and at the end of twenty years the total would be \$206,000.

BURNED THE BONDS.

The pastor then produced the redeemed bonds of the church, amounting to \$10,000, and announced that they had served their day and were to be consigned to the flames. In doing this he said that they were following out a new scientific idea that all bodies should be burned that microbes might be done away with. All were thankful for the good they had done, but were ready to burn them with a great deal of joy. It was his earnest hope that the microbe of debt would never again touch St. Paul's church, either inside or out.

The bonds were burned in a copper

vessel, which rested on the baptismal font immediately in front of the altar and in full view of the whole congregation. The copper vessel was loaned for the occasion by the local government, it having been the official half bushel measure used in this province under the law relating to weights and measures in vogue in New Brunswick before confederation. A pan was placed inside of it and held a small spirit lamp.

The bonds were divided into six packages, and were burned by the following:

Rev. Willard Macdonald representing the church.

Mr. S. H. McFarlane, representing the session.

Mr. J. F. McMurray, chairman of the Board of Trustees.

Mrs. W. C. Crockett, president of the Ladies' Aid.

Mrs. John Harvey, of the working band.

Mrs. G. W. Hodge, treasurer of the century fund.

At the conclusion of the rather unique ceremony the choir rendered the beautiful hymn "Oh God of Bethel by whose Hymn."

Short addresses congratulating the congregation of St. Paul's, on their freedom of debt, and extending best wishes for the future, were delivered by Rev. Mr. Anderson, moderator of the St. John Presbytery, Rev. Geo. D. Ireland of St. John, and Rev. J. J. Colter.

The interesting and memorable service was brought to a close by the singing of "Oh God our help in ages past, our hope for years to come," followed by the benediction by the pastor.

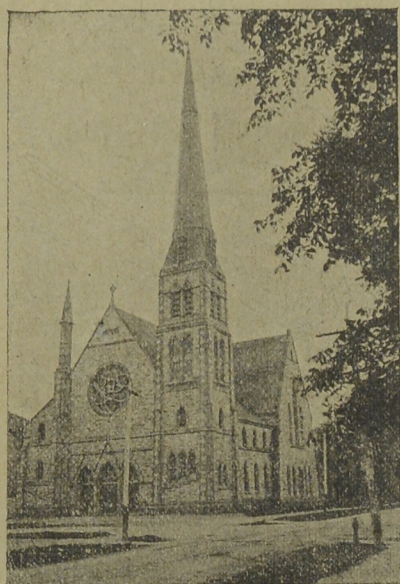
that have helpfully supplemented records in my own hands and revived memories of happenings twenty and more years ago.

THE NEW CHURCH

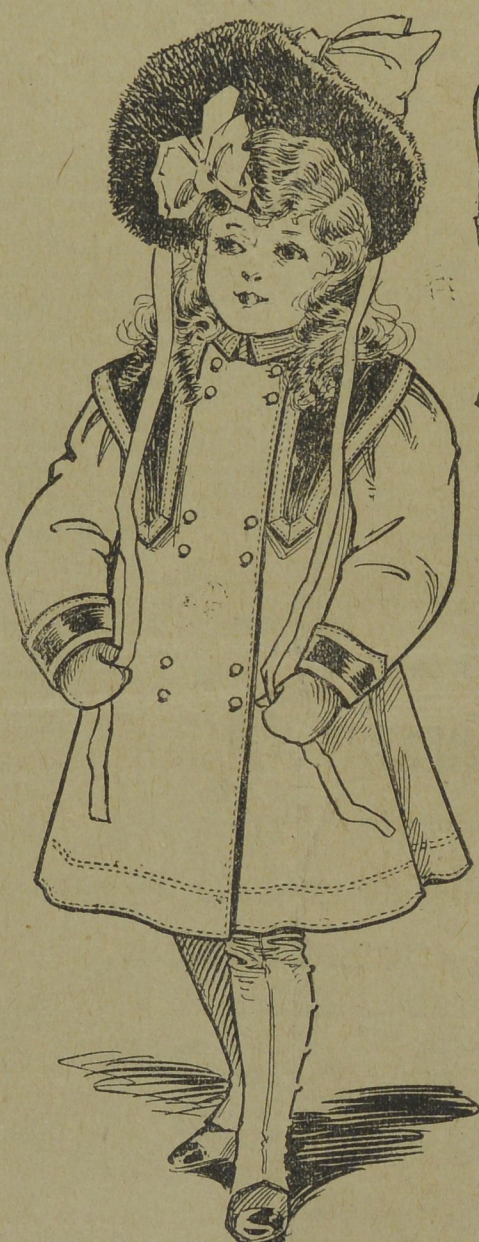
The history of the new church edifice ought to begin with the advent of Rev. A. J. Mowatt in charge of St. Paul's congregation, because Mr. Mowatt was in the Providence of God the main cause of its being erected. For many years prior to Mr. Mowatt's advent, the church was not in the condition to promote enthusiasm and growth. Mr. Brooke had been minister of the church from 1843 to 1874, but in the last six of these years he was unable to undertake all his duties with comfort and satisfaction to himself and Dr. Brooke
