DEATH ENDED THEIR ROMANCE

Lena Howering, Factory Girl, Unwilling Witness of Accident that Took Lover's Life.

New York, Feb. 17.—There had been an exchange of valentines between Lena Howering, 19 years old, of 764 Park avenue, and Walter Feuerhacker, 23 years old, of 180 Broadway, during lunch hour Friday, in the Greenfield Company candy factory, at 107 Lorimer street, where both were employed. The young woman is a packer while Feuerhacker was employed as a machinist. The two were engaged to be married, their romance having begun in the factory. The pair were extremely happy and, as they went about their work, there was no sign of the impending tragedy which resulted in the death of Feuerhacker, just before closing down time.

The young machinist was engaged in connecting some water pipes located close to a rapidly moving belt. In his happiness he may have become careless and brushed close to the belting. The next moment the employees on that floor were horrified by the sight of the young machinist's body being carried toward the ceiling. The cry to stop the machinery was raised, but, before the engine could be stopped, the young man's body was whirled around the moving shaft. When Feuerhacker was removed, it was found his skull had been shockingly crushed, and he died before the arrival of Dr. Lippold of the Williamsburg hospital.

As the body was lowered to the floor, among the employees who pushed forward was the dead man's fiancée who, on learning that he was dead, collapsed and was removed to her home. The body of the machinist was claimed later by relatives.

\$5,000 CASH VAN SHES.

Supposed Bag Contained \$18,000; Only \$13,000 Was Found.

New York, Feb. 17.—The Fourteenth Street Bank, 14th Avenue and Fourteenth street, Manhattan, of which R. Ross Appleton, of Brooklyn, is president, lost \$5,000 last Tuesday in such a way as to mystify the bank officials and detectives of a surety company, who are investigating the loss.

Two brothers by the name of Ernest, 25 and 28 years old, who have been employed as messengers at the East side branch of the bank ever since the branch was established, left the East Side Branch at Avenue A and Second street, Tuesday noon, with a satchel supposed to contain \$18,000 in bills, but when they reached the main bank it was discovered that there was only \$13,000 in the satchel, although the deposit slip with the money read \$18,000.

The messengers, who bear good reputations, reached the main bank in due course of time, there having been only a few minutes difference between the time they left the East Side Branch and their arrival at the main bank. The \$5,000 shortage was discovered immediately after they handed the satchel to the teller of the main bank, and both declared that they delivered the satchel just as they received it from the teller at the East Side Branch.

President Appleton admitted this morning that the satchel was not locked when it reached the bank. It was also learned that it was not locked when it left the East Side Branch, but merely fastened with three patent clamps. It was the fault of the teller at the East Side Branch that it was not locked, as was the rule when sending money in it to the main bank. Any one could have opened the satchel from the time it left the teller's hands at the East side branch until it reached the teller at the main bank, but both messengers are positive that no one touched it.

The messengers are bonded with the Fidelity and Casualty Company, whose detectives are at work on the case. George F. Seward, president of the company, will not discuss the matter, but intimates that the detectives believe the young men to be innocent. The young men have been relieved from duty pending the investigation, but the bank officials express the greatest confidence in their integrity.

President Appleton scouted the idea that the teller of the East Side Branch had made a mistake and put only \$13,000 in the valise with an \$18,000 deposit slip. The teller, whose name was refused by the manager of the East Side Branch, is positive that he put \$18,000 in the valise. The cash at the branch bank balances to a cent, it was said this morning.

The manager of the branch bank is Elton W. Clark, of 521 West One Hundred and Twenty-Fourth Sts., Manhattan. He is quoted in a Manhattan newspaper this morning as having said last night that he had a receipt for the \$18,000 from the main bank, and is said to have pulled from his wallet a paper appearing to be a duly signed receipt for the \$18,000.

President Appleton noticed this statement and this morning, after reaching his office, he called up Mr. Clark to ask him about it. Mr. Clark said that he had been misquoted, and that he hadn't shown any paper purporting to be a receipt from the main bank for the \$18,000.

Mr. Clark declined to discuss the loss of the \$5,000 this morning. He refused to give the names of any of the bank employees handling the money before it left the branch bank.
