LOSS TO N. B. JOURNALISM.

The Herald has had many a friendly bout with Editor Scott of the Sun, with whose political views we have not always been able to agree, but there never was any trace of bitterness in the discussions, and we with his friends generally in the province regret the removal of so accomplished a journalist from New Brunswick, rendered necessary by the change of ownership and politics of the newspaper with which his name has so long been associated.

Although a native of Nova Scotia, Mr. Scott has been so long a resident of this province, that we can fairly claim him as one of our own. It was on the Sun that he made his splendid journalistic reputation, and all New Brunswickers, whether they agree with his views or not, will follow his future career with considerable interest.

Mr. Scott has not only been a successful journalist, but a good citizen, who has taken his full share in many enterprises, having for their object the improvement of social and other conditions in this province.

That he will continue to occupy a position of prominence in his profession in Canada few will doubt, and whatever newspaper is fortunate enough to secure his services may well congratulate itself on having on its staff one of the brightest and most forceful writers of the Canadian press.

The Herald wishes Mr. Scott untold success wherever he may take up his residence, and its hope is also that the Sun directorate may be able to enlist in their service an editor with the intelligence, the industry and influence of him who is soon to retire from the Canterbury street sanctum.

At the opening of the Ontario legislature recognition of that province's great prosperity was made in the governor's speech in these happy terms: "Our very earnest thanks are once more due to Almighty God for the bountiful harvest of the year that has passed, which even excels the one that called for our gratitude last year. With this harvest, the market conditions have been such as to maintain the prosperity which our farmers have enjoyed in recent years. This has been noticeable in the dairying industry, the output of which has been very large. The evidences of steadily increasing enterprise and activity on the part of our people which have been apparent for several years past are to be seen on all sides at the present time, and afford good reason for congratulation and thankfulness."

A correspondent, whose letter appears in another column, expresses satisfaction at some phases of the women's rights question, and approves the Attorney General's and Herald's course with respect to Miss French, but wants the legislature to go further and give women a chance to become members of that body. At this point, however, the Herald at least draws the line. There is a great deal too much talk already in the various legislatures, and parliament, is overburdened with it.

John A. McCall, the late president of the New York Life Insurance Company, has paid the debt of nature before being compelled to make good all he was alleged to owe the company, which he and other officials exploited for their own benefit. No doubt the worry of the investigation brought on the disease which finished McCall, and his case should be a warning to men in high position, who make the attainment of riches at the expense of others, their chief aim in life.

King Edward, it is said, is one of the hardest worked men in the empire, His Majesty generally putting in twelve hours a day at hard labor, and there is no evidence that he is likely to demand an eight hour day.

The late election campaign in Great Britain appears to have developed some smart repartee here and there, on the hustings, though some of it lacked originality. T. P. O'Connor's Weekly, for instance, tells of a Liberal candidate who, when he had received a rotten egg full in the face, said, as he wiped off its nauseous contents: "Ah, that is the sort of argument used by my opponent, and even that is unsound."

No doubt the Senate vacancies will be filled before parliament opens on March 8, and two of the plums must come to New Brunswick. Mr. Costigan and Mr. LaBillois' friends profess confidence that they will be remembered in the distribution, while a great many people have an idea that Hon. A. R. McClellan may be one of the lucky ones. The Herald has no guesses to register.

It has not been usual to oppose a Mayor of Fredericton seeking a second term, but this year it appears Mayor McNally will have to face a contest. Ald. Stockford says he is in the fight to stay, and there is a rumor that there will be another Richmond in the field before the contest is far advanced.

Vancouver Province:—The new Minister of Railways Hon. H. R. Emmerson, has agreeably surprised his political friends and apparently dashed the expectations of his critics by placing the Intercolonial Railway on a new basis, on which a surplus instead of a deficit is secured from it each month.

A newspaper editor and a blacksmith are candidates for the mayoralty of Burlington, Vermont.

BITS OF NEWS.

The Monarch Bank of Canada is opening an agency in Halifax with J. F. Barry late an inspector of the Royal Bank in charge.

John R. Stetson, the millionaire hat manufacturer, of Florida, died at his winter home at Gillen, Florida on Sunday.

O. M. Melanson, ex-M. P. P., the well known merchant, of Shediac, who has been suffering some time from stomach trouble, was taken to Montreal Saturday night for special medical treatment.

The wooden working house of the Duluth grain elevator plant of S.H. Peavy & Co., of Minneapolis, was burned Saturday night with its contents, consisting of about 1,000,000 bushels of grain, principally wheat. The loss is \$1,500,000.

Rev. E. B. Hooper, rector of St. George's church, Moncton, has completed fifteen years of his ministry in Moncton. Saturday evening members of his congregation, representing nearly every family in the church, held a reception at the rectory. Rev. Mr. Hooper was presented with an address, accompanied by a purse of \$114.

Arthur S. Skead, assistant miller in the H. B. Company's mill at Prince Albert, met a horrible death Saturday morning when at work alone in the basement. He evidently became entangled in the belting, and when found was lying on the floor with one leg torn from the body, but still alive. He was taken to the hospital, but died immediately afterwards.

Archbishop Bruchesi of Montreal, has issued an important pastoral letter placing the ban on Sunday amusements, and prohibiting horse racing, baseball and other like contests, political meetings, public excursions, theatrical representations and concerts on the Sabbath. Dances and balls organized for charity are also forbidden as being contrary to the spirit of the church.

W. R. Pendleton, well known for his specific, Pendleton's panacea and other remedies, died early Sunday morning at his home, St. John. "Doctor" Pendleton, as he was always known, had been in poor health for a month past, but on Saturday he went to his pool establishment on Mill street, and while engaged in a friendly game was stricken down. Dr. Broderick was called, and Mr. Pendleton was removed to his home, where he died early Sunday morning. Deceased was a native of Maine.

The Bank of America, incorporated last December at Chicago with a capital stock of \$250,000, has been placed in the hands of a receiver by Judge Shytraus of the Superior Court on complaint of John E. Kavanaugh, a stockholder. In the few weeks since the opening of the bank President Smith is charged by Mr. Kavanaugh with having so manipulated securities, mortgages, notes and stock of the bank that he has obtained amounts aggregating \$146,000.

Mrs. Augusta Elizabeth Ross, widow of the late Hon. John Ross, who was made Attorney-General of Upper Canada in 1858, died last March in London, England, leaving an estate of \$699,642.22, consisting largely of real estate in the downtown section of Toronto. The will, which has been filed for probate in the Toronto Surrogate Court, directs that the property be divided equally among the four surviving children of the deceased, and the estate of John Ross, a child, deceased. The beneficiaries will each receive about \$139,928.—

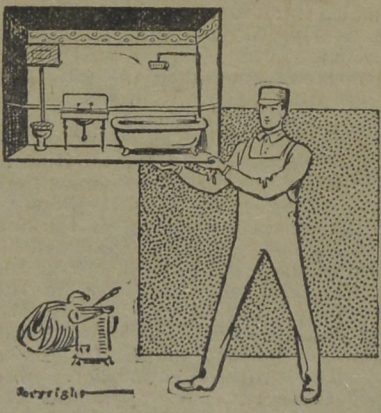
