McCALL IS DEAD.

Former President of New York Life
Succumbs to Worry Incident to
Recent Investigations.

New York, Feb. 19.—John A. McCall, until recently president of the New York Life Insurance Company, died at 5.35 o'clock yesterday afternoon at the Laurel House in Lakewood (N. J.), where he had been taken three weeks ago in the hope that the change might benefit his health, which had suffered a breakdown two months ago.

It was announced that Mr. McCall's death was due to enlargement of the liver, and the end had been peaceful and without pain.

The body was brought to New York this morning and sent to the McCall residence in West Seventy-second street.

Mr. McCall's physical breakdown occurred about the close of the investigation of life insurance affairs in this state by the legislative committee in December last. The report of the committee is expected to be submitted to the legislature at Albany early this week. Mr. McCall's examination before the committee was a severe one and the ordeal he underwent in rehearsing in detail the affairs of the company and in divulging transactions about which the general public was ignorant, worried him greatly, it was said.

About three weeks ago his condition became such that his physicians and family deemed it advisable to remove him to Lakewood, where it was hoped the rest and quiet would mend the patient's shattered nerves and speed the beneficial effects of the treatment of his physical disorders. During all of this time Mr. McCall worried constantly about his business affairs. He was compelled first to mortgage and then to sell his handsome country place at Long Branch (N. J.), in order, it was said, to repay to the New York Life Insurance Company \$235,000 on the Andrew Hamilton account, Mr. Hamilton, the legislative agent of the company, having made no accounting for this sum. Mr. McCall had promised, when the Hamilton disclosures first were made, to repay the amount named if by certain date a satisfactory statement was not forthcoming from Hamilton who is now in Paris. The directors of the New York Life at the expiration of the time set called upon McCall for the payment of the money. He acceded to the demands, paying \$85,000 in cash and giving his notes for \$150,000, the latter being secured by a mortgage on this country place which later he sold subject to the mortgage. Mr. McCall realized in all something over \$300,000 for the property, which was to have cost him just double that amount.

When all hope had been lost Mr. McCall suddenly rallied. It was an effort of the mind and will, however, and not a physical improvement. Mr. McCall's mental effort to shake off his ailments was the result of the report of the former directors of the New York Life, who made public their findings ten days ago. They censured Mr. McCall severely for certain acts of his in connection with the legislative bureau established by him, with Andrew Hamilton at its head.

An effort was made to keep the contents of the report from the sick man, but learning the statement had been filed, he worried so much over the matter that it was decided early last week to permit him to see it. The recommendations in the report demanding of him a fuller accounting of the legislative work than he made, are said to have been a crushing blow to the company's former president.

ANGRY COLORED BISHOP.

Rebukes the Stars and Stripes and the White Trash.

Macon, Ga., Feb. 18.—In an address before 500 delegates at a convention of negroes here to discuss race problems, Bishop H. M. Turner, of the African Episcopal Methodist church, declared the American flag to be a "dirty and contemptible rag," and that "hell was an improvement on the United States when the negro was involved."

In closing he said: "If a little ignorant, stupid white man, who was never heard of and never would be heard of until 10,000 years after the resurrection trumpet, wishes a little notoriety, he begins to belie and slander the negro, and bounds into popularity. And I challenge any one or all of them to meet me in public discussion, and I will show that the

negro is a far better man than they are."

Richard Bradley, jr., of St. John died under exceptionally sad circumstances late Saturday evening last. During the week he was confined to his home because of erysipelas, but on Saturday felt greatly improved and part of the afternoon and evening he spent with friends residing in Portland street. Feeling suddenly weak, he started, in company with Miss Carle, his fiancée, for R. B. Travis' drug store on the corner of Portland and Main streets, but he had scarcely been in the store more than a few minutes before he expired with the young woman to whom he was betrothed at his side. He was twenty-eight years old.
