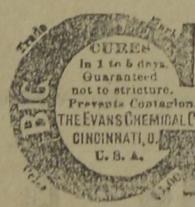

WORLD'S FIRST CORNER IN CORN.

John D. Rockefeller, Junior, says that Joseph was conscious to His Brethren and that the Transaction was a Good Business Deal.

New York, Feb. 27.—John D. Rockefeller, Jr., vigorously defended Joseph's policy in establishing a "corner" in corn in his talk before his Bible class at the Fifth Avenue Baptist church on Sunday. He said that Joseph's conduct in taking advantage of the peoples' pressing need by demanding their lands in exchange for his corn during the seven year's famine was not to be criticized, but, on the contrary, was worthy of high praise.

For the last three Sundays Mr. Rockefeller has been delivering a series of talks on the story of Joseph. Members of the class expressed the opinion that he would skip this "corner" chapter in Joseph's career and take up a less embarrassing subject. "I dread the unseemly newspaper comment that will ensue if Mr. Rockefeller makes even the briefest mention of that chapter in Joseph's life," said one member before the meeting began. "The way some of the newspapers are making fun of everything that good young man says is disgraceful. I and other members of the class sincerely hope that our leader will not talk about Joseph's corn transaction for fear of the unmerited ridicule that would result."

A GOOD BUSINESS DEAL.

When Mr. Rockefeller began his talk, however, he announced that he had chosen for his theme that very subject and said:

"Some people are disposed to criticize Joseph because he would not give the famished people of Egypt his corn unless they gave him their lands in exchange. Now I have studied this part of Joseph's life very carefully and I cannot see anything about his conduct to criticize. Joseph foresaw that seven years of famine were to follow the seven years of plenty. He set about laying up an ample store of corn. In this he showed commendable thrift and business smartness. Most people are not sensible enough to put something by for a rainy day. Then again, many are not able to do so."

"When the famine came those who were without corn went to Joseph the thrifty. He demanded their lands in exchange for the corn. It was a perfectly justifiable business transaction. What would you have expected him to do? You wouldn't have expected him to give away his corn for nothing, would you? No ruler has ever given his people free food in time of famine. Joseph could not be expected to do that."

A member of the class suggested that Joseph was only acting for Pharaoh and that it was his duty to get as good terms as he could for his master.

SURELY THAT WAS GENEROUS.

Mr. Rockefeller shook his head at the suggestion. "I don't think that that fact would make any difference at all," he said. "It was Joseph's policy and he alone must be held responsible."

Continuing he said:

"But look you upon what liberal terms Joseph took the people's land. He did not take it away from them altogether. He allowed them to occupy the lands even after they had traded them for his corn. They simply paid him rent and became tenants instead of landless. Surely that was generous. We find that the people were thoroughly satisfied with the bargain, and had nothing but praise for Joseph after the famine had passed."

Referring to Joseph's magnanimous treatment of his brothers, Mr. Rockefeller said:

"Just think how bitter Joseph might have felt toward his cruel brothers, but how nobly he returned good for evil. There are very few men who could do that. Could you or I forgive a wrong done to us? We ought to think that perhaps some time we will do a wrong to others. Let us, then, forgive those who do us harm, so that others may forgive us when we do them harm."

THE COST TO COLLIER.

He Wouldn't Mind if it Was Twice \$100,000.

New York, March 1.—Robert J. Collier, publisher of Collier's Weekly went on the witness stand to-day as the complainant against Colonel William D. Mann, editor of Town Topics, in a hearing on a charge of perjury. Colonel Mann's counsel then questioned him. In reply to several questions Mr. Collier said that he and his father, Peter F. Collier, founder of Collier's Weekly, expect to pay the expenses of the prosecution of Colonel Mann.

Would it surprise you to know that this proceeding will cost you more than \$100,000?" asked Mr. Littleton.

"No, I would not be surprised. We wouldn't mind if it cost twice that amount."

Mr. Collier said that his paper began its attacks on Colonel Mann in 1901, following the publication in Town Topics of an article reflecting on the private life and social career of his father, P. F. Collier. He said also that ever since that article appeared he and his father had been waiting for the opportunity which was furnished last summer by the arrest of Charles Able on a charge of attempting to blackmail Edwin Post, a broker.

Mr. Collier said that he had been paying Charles Stokes Wayne, former managing editor of Town Topics, and Moses E. Wooster, the agent for Fide and Fancies, salaries of \$100 weekly for their services in connection with the Mann case.
