SCHEME FAILED HERE.

Canadian Engineering Society Attempting to Make Their Profession a Close Corporation.

Halifax, March 24.—Professor Woodman, of Dalhousie University, at a meeting of the Mining Society of Nova Scotia yesterday told a story of the alleged attempts of the Canadian Society of Civil Engineers to secure the passage through the various local legislatures of Canada of an act providing for close incorporation of the engineering profession. The act, he contended, sought the restriction of the profession to a chosen few and includes every department of engineering work. In one province alone, Quebec, he said, has success crowned efforts of the lobbyist agent of the Canadian Society.

The Canadian Society, Prof Woodman claims, has set apart \$11,000 for obtaining close incorporation legislation, and the policy is to continue the introduction of such legislation until ultimately the society shall have obtained absolute control of every province in the Dominion.

The bills introduced by the society claim the exclusive right by itself, for its membership of the occupations defined under the expression of "civil engineering."

A futile attempt was made in 1899 to secure a bill to this effect through the legislature of Nova Scotia. It failed because of the opposition of the mining society. It is suspected that another effort will be made at the present session.

A bill of this description was presented to the New Brunswick legislature at its recent session but did not get past the corporations committee.

BRIDE JUMPED 6 STORIES

Mrs. Anna Kravacs, Married Two Weeks, Committed Suicide After a Quarrel With Her Husband.

New York, March 24.—Joseph Kravacs, 28 years old a locksmith, of 101 East Fourth street, Manhattan, wept when he was arraigned in Yorkville police court today by Detective Penz, on suspicion of being concerned in the death of his bride of two weeks, 19 years old, from a fall of six stories last night at the home of Bernard Rosen at 104 Second street.

Kravacs and his wife went to visit Rosen last night, and while there the newly married couple had a quarrel. Penz says he learned that Kravacs taunted his bride with alleged infidelity. She burst into tears, ran to the roof and, before her husband could catch her, according to her husband's story, threw herself to the sidewalk. She died in Bellevue Hospital early this morning. Kravacs disappeared, but was arrested in his home a few hours later.

"I loved my wife," declared Kravacs, between his sobs. "I did not kill her. She jumped off the roof herself."

Magistrate Walsh remanded Kravacs to the coroner's office.

LONG LOST BROTHER.

Located After an Absence of Thirty Years.

Calais, Me., March 24.—The Rev. J. F. Carson, of the Roman Catholic parish of St. George (N. B.), passed through here yesterday afternoon on his return from Buffalo (N. Y.), where through a paragraph in the Boston Herald, he met a long-lost brother, who left home thirty-three years ago and had never been heard from by his family until recently.

The man missing for so long a time is Lieut. William Carson (U. S. A.) retired of Youngstown, (O.). There are two other brothers—Patrick, of Amesbury (Mass.), and John, of New York. The two last named had kept in touch through correspondence with Father Carson, but none of the three knew aught of William until the paragraph appeared in The Herald two weeks ago. The four were sons of Mr. and Mrs. William Carson, of St. John (N. B.).

Thirty-three years ago, at the age of seventeen, William left home to seek his fortune in the United States but never informed his parents of his whereabouts, and his parents died firmly convinced that their eldest son

had gone before. William enlisted in the United States army, and was assigned to the department of the west where, in several Indian fights, he sustained a number of wounds. He was promoted from the ranks to a lieutenant. His wounds always proved troublesome, however, and two years ago, at the age of forty-eight, he was retired. With his wife he moved to Youngstown (O.), and purchased a residence.

Recently his injuries became more troublesome, and, as a last resort, he was moved to the Emergency Hospital at Buffalo (N. Y.), where his life was despaired of. He longed to see the surviving members of his family, and it was decided to insert a paragraph in the Boston Herald. This brief appeal was seen by the priest at St. George two weeks ago, and March 10, he left Calais for Buffalo.

There was a joyful reunion, and the clergyman found that the Amesbury brother with his son, had also called, but had been compelled to hasten home. The lieutenant was too weak to tell much of his life, but begged forgiveness for not before telling his relatives what had become of him.

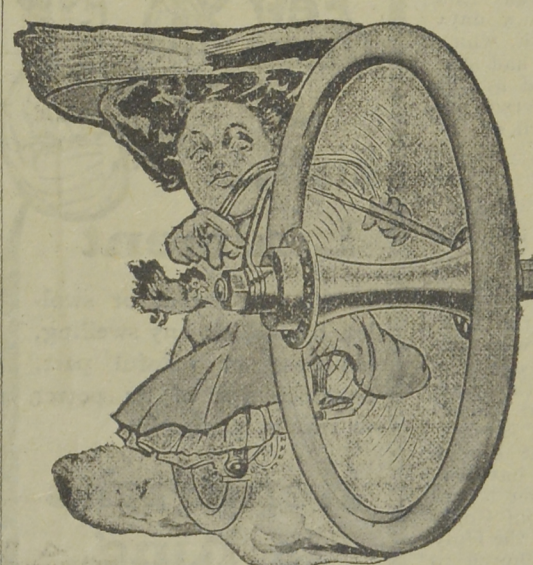
