

## A BRAVE GIRL

## Who Was Shot in Defending Aged Father Against Assailant.

Boston, Jan. 11.—Defending himself with a revolver from an alleged assault by William Ward, 23 years old, one of his employees, 75 year old Peter Graham, a West Roxbury produce dealer, fired a shot last evening which passed through the right arm of his daughter, Margaret, 30 years old, who was trying to shield her father from harm, and into the arm of Ward. Ward went to the Emergency hospital, where he was later placed under arrest, by officers of Station 4.

The shooting occurred at Graham's home on Grover street, Roslindale. The 75 year old man, who is paralyzed from his hips down, has been conducting a produce business in West Roxbury several years. About four months ago he hired Ward to drive one of the teams. The old man says that Ward returned from market shortly after 5 o'clock last night and the horse had the appearance of having been driven hard.

Ward refused to be reprimanded for the condition of the animal, and Graham says he answered him back, using filthy language, and then threatened to strike the old man. Mr. Graham says Ward was under the influence of liquor. Several weeks ago Mr. Graham says Ward attempted to assault him, and that when he went toward him in the barn last night to assault him he discharged him and then told him to go to the house for his clothes.

The two men went to the room shared by each, and Ward began talking loud and threatened the old man. Margaret, hearing the noise, went to the room just as her father took his revolver from a drawer. She tried to quiet Ward and asked him to leave the house.

Ward, she claims, moved toward her father, and as he placed his hands on the old man's shoulders she stepped between them, and her father fired. The bullet passed through the fleshy part of her right arm and then lodged in the left arm of Ward.

Mr. Graham fired a second shot to scare him away. A neighbour was sent to inform Lieut. Sullivan at station 13, and he detailed several men to look for Ward. About 8 o'clock Ward went to the Emergency Hospital and asked the doctors to extract the bullet. They then informed him that a man answering his description was wanted, and station 4 was notified.

One of the bones of the upper part of Ward's arm is fractured, and it will be necessary to perform an operation. Officers from station 13 will stay with him until he is able to leave the hospital. Dr. Mahoney of Roslindale dressed the wound of Miss Graham, and it is not serious.

## WHO AM I? CASES.

## Two Remarkable Stories of Loss of Memory.

London, Jan. 12.—Two remarkable cases of loss of memory are reported from Swansea and Falmouth by the Daily Express.

The strange disappearance of one of Swansea's most prominent tradesmen, Mr. Thomas J. Llewellyn, who has been missing since three weeks before Christmas, has been solved by his sudden return to his wife and family, who are residing at Neath, some ten miles from Swansea.

Great excitement was caused in Swansea when Mr. Llewellyn, who is a hostler and mercer owning two shops in Castle street and Wind street, disappeared, and all efforts to trace him proved futile. Mr. Llewellyn's friends gave him up as lost a week ago when a telegram signed "Tom" arrived at Neath, addressed to Mr. E. Roberts, a brother-in-law of Mr. Llewellyn, stating that the latter had been very ill.

Mr. Roberts promptly telegraphed back, asking for particulars, and to the surprise of his friends and relations Mr. Llewellyn arrived at Neath on Christmas morning.

He explained that he had no idea where he had been since he left Swansea, but that he suddenly recovered himself while in Chopsdale, London, and was surprised to find that he had grown a beard.

Mr. David Murray, who disappeared from his home in Falmouth on November 21, was found by his father in the Church Army woodchopping depot at Hackney, on December 23.

On hearing of his son's disappearance Mr. Murray, son, who lives in Lytham, immediately went to Falmouth and made every effort to trace his son, but without success.

On December 17 a Falmouth man in London telegraphed to say that he had seen the missing man selling pamphlets on Westminster Bridge, and Mr. Murray came up to London and eventually found him at the Church Army depot at Hackney.

But the son did not recognize his father, asserted that his name was Martin, and had no knowledge whatever of anything prior to November 21—the day on which he disappeared. He was taken to Derby, where his wife and child were residing, but the sight of them brought back no memories.

It is hoped, however, that under careful nursing he will recover his lost memory.

## ECCENTRIC MAN WILL.

He Did Not Like the Roman Catholic Church.

Vancouver, Jan. 12.—Because Sydney Jacob Towne, who is just 21 years of age, was persuaded by young friends to attend the services of the Roman Catholic Church upon sundry occasions he may lose an allowance of \$600 a year, which runs until he is 35, and a legacy of \$12,000, payable when he attains that age. Mr. Towne is one of the children of the Australian millionaire, who left much of his property to local charities. While, however, almost every local institution, from the Salvation Army Shelter to the city hospital, came in for a share of the estate, the many organizations of the Roman Catholics were conspicuously absent from the list. Among other provisions there was one to the effect that each of his children on coming of age should receive an annual allowance of \$600 until the age of 35, when the capital sum of \$12,000 was to be paid over.

Some time before the testator's death one of his daughters went over to the Roman Catholic faith, a step which presumably distressed the old gentleman very much, and which, being a stout Protestant, he resented to such an extent that he cut her name out of his will and inserted a clause disinheriting any of his children who should depart from the Protestant faith. As already stated, young Sydney Towne paid sundry visits to the Catholic church, although he was a baptised and confirmed member of the Church of England. It is not clear to the trustees whether the terms of the will apply or not before the beneficiary reaches the age of 21, and they have asked the courts for an authoritative pronouncement. There is no opposition to the boy's inheriting, it being felt by the trustees that since he has never formally united himself with the Roman Catholics, and has returned to his own Church, with the avowed intention of remaining therein, it would be too bad for him to lose his share of the estate on account of the trifling dereliction of his immature years.

## ASKS \$40,000 FOR EYES.

Suit Against Lewiston, Me., Contractors Arising out of a Dynamite Explosion.

Lewiston, Me., Jan. 11.—A \$40,000 damage suit has been brought into the Somerset county court and the evidence in the case is similar to that in the famous Carrier vs. Ward Bros. case, which has been tried three times before a jury in Auburn. The last trial resulted in a verdict of \$18,000 for the plaintiff.

Frank Demario, the Italian who was crippled in a dynamite explosion near Bingham, is the plaintiff in the \$40,000 suit, and Mahony & Everett, contractors, are the defendants. The Somerset railroad is made a party, as trustee. The explosion put out both of Demario's eyes, broke an arm and cut his body in several places. He was removed to the Sisters' hospital in Lewiston, for treatment but has recently returned to his home in Boston.

A. L. Kavanagh, of this city, is one of the attorneys in the case. The others are George A. Scigliano, of Boston, and William H. Gulliver, of Portland.

The case will be in order for trial at the next term of the supreme court in Somerset county.

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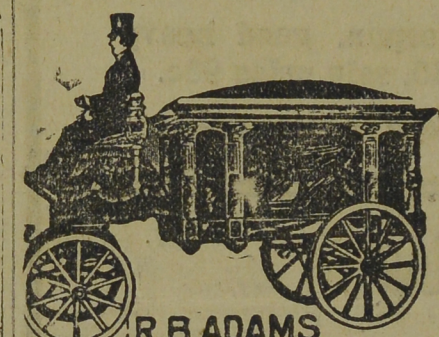
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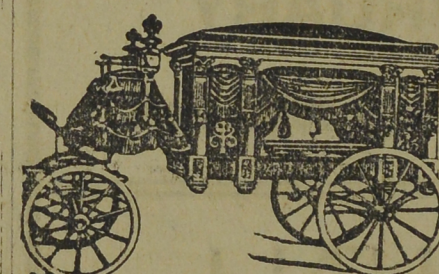
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
