TRANSPORT ON FIRE.

Three Lives Lost, Several Men Injured and Much Property Destruction by San Francisco Conflagration.

ONE OF THE OFFICERS WHO PERISHED A NOVA SCOTIAN.

San Francisco, Feb. 1.—(Special).—Fire broke out last night in the hold of the transport Meade, and raged for several hours, despite the efforts of the fire department.

Fully twenty men were overcome, of whom three are dead and four others missing, supposed to be still in the hold.

The dead are: Third Officer George Wallace of the Meade; B. Hennessy, lineman, of engine company four and Captain Charles Dakin of engine company four.

The missing are: Charles Gill, operator for Chief Fernandez; George Brown of engine No. 12; W. Egan of engine No. 12 and one of the sailors of the Meade, whose name is unknown.

At three o'clock this morning the fire was under control and the ship

was flooded with water by a dozen engines pumping water down the hold.

The Meade was to have sailed today for Manila with 1,000 men on board including the Second Infantry and Eighth and Thirtieth batteries of the light artillery.

The forepart of the ship, where the fire broke out contained the personal effects of the officers and men of the regiments. The vessel also had a cargo of 3000 tons commissary and quartermasters' supplies consigned to the Philippines.

It is impossible to estimate the extent of the damage done to the ship and cargo.

Third Officer Wallace was a native of Sydney, N. S., and was 25 years old.

INTERCOLONIAL SURPLUS.

Assets Show Balance of \$6000 to Credit for December, First Time in History of Road.

Moncton, Feb. 1.—(Special).—Present indications are that the Intercolonial Railway for the month of December last shows a surplus of about six thousand dollars.

This is said to be the first time in the history of the Intercolonial railway that it has shown any surplus

for the month of December. Had it not been that the bills for a special expenditure on reconstruction for a large amount came in at the close of the month of November would have shown a surplus.

Mr. Emmerson's policy of Intercolonial railway reform and retrenchment is evidently a success.

PETTY THEIVING.

Small Boys Making Undesirable Record at Moncton.

Moncton, Feb. 1.—(Special).—Considerable petty theiving has been reported about the town of late, but the boldest and most barefaced work came to light yesterday.

M. J. Steeves, buyer of beef hides in the city market has a warehouse situated a few yards from his place of business.

Yesterday afternoon two young men entered warehouse and stole two or three hides and made way to sell them. The youths were seen coming out of the warehouse, dropped their booty and escaped.

Today Fletcher Ayles was arrested and charged with the theft, confessed, and implicated another young lad for whom the police are searching.

Last evening Undertaker Price had occasion to visit the stock room over his shop and found a boy going through the shop. He escaped through a window.

STARVATION IN JAPAN.

Victoria, B. C., Feb. 1.—(Special).—Advices from Japan via the Empress of Japan say that famine conditions in North Japan are becoming awful, and thousands are suffering from starvation. A large number of deaths have occurred and many others are dying.

The government is organizing relief, and foreign committees are distributing rice in the famine districts. One third of the population of 2,820,000 are in distress.

FATALLY BURNED.

She got up early and was lighting a lamp when her clothing caught fire. Her daughter smothered the flames but not before the old lady, who is eighty, was severely burned.

LAST NIGHT'S HOCKEY GAMES.

Mount Allison Taken Into Camp by U. N. B. and Sussex Defeated by Sackville.

The University hockey team won the first intercollegiate match from Sackville at the Arctic rink last evening, the score standing 3 to 2 in their favor. The soft weather had left the ice in wretched condition, and about five hundred spectators witnessed the game and seemed to greatly enjoy the sport.

The teams were quite evenly matched, and had they not been handicapped by bad ice, would undoubtedly have given a good exhibition of the sport. The Mount Allison boys skated well, but were not up to their opponents in the matter of combination work. The game was rather rough at times, especially during the second half, and several players on both sides were sent to the boards for violating the rules.

Coleman shot the first goal for the U. N. B. shortly after commencement of play in the first half, and Jackman notched for Mount Allison on a pass from Patterson. The U. N. B. boys kept the puck in Mount Allison's territory a good part of the remaining time, but could not get it past goal keeper Murchie, although repeated attempts were made.

There was a good deal of slashing and tripping done in the second half by members of both teams but fortunately nobody was injured. "Ben" Russell scored the second goal for Mount Allison giving them a lead of one, but Dick Malloy soon made the score stand even. With one minute still to play, Malloy again got the puck and after some skilful manoeuvring shot the winning goal for his team.

The puck landed squarely into the net and bounded out before the Sackville goal judge woke up. He raised quite a howl among the spectators, especially from those who had money staked on the game, by declaring that it was not a goal. Goal Keeper Murchie and several other Mount Allison men failed to agree with him however and after some wrangling the goal was allowed, making the score stand 3 to 2 in favor of the home team.

Mr. C. H. Allen refereed the game in a fair and impartial manner.

SACKVILLE 3; SUSSEX 0.

Sussex, N. B., Feb. 1.—The second home game of the league series took place here last night between Sackville and Sussex, resulting in a victory for the visitors of three goals to nothing. The attendance was not at large as large as the Moncton-Sussex game. But the enthusiasm was well sustained, the game being clean and fairly fast, considering that the ice while hard, was covered with water. For a few minutes after the start Sussex was decidedly on the defensive and Norman shot the first goal for Sackville team.

Sussex made several pretty rushes, but Sackville secured two more goals in the second half and played for the most part a defensive game, a peculiar handiness in throwing the puck over the side being a leading feature. Sussex seemed to lack in combination.

No serious offences were noticed. Laidlaw of Sackville, and Doyle of Sussex each spent a brief period on the fence. The former created a momentary flutter by rather savagely charging a well known Sussex man with using an emergency whistle. No one else, however, had heard any such interruption.

THEY ASK FOR MORE PAY.

Lady Teachers Wait on the Board of School Trustees ---The Music Question.

A delegation of lady teachers stormed the fort in the board room of the school trustees at their monthly meeting yesterday afternoon. The objective point of attack was the matter of salary, which they claim is inadequate compared with that of male teachers, and also with that of teachers of their own sex in other cities in the province. When they assembled before the trustees' meeting Dr. Atherton occupied the chair, surrounded by Sheriff Sterling, J. J. Weddall, J. T. Sharkey, J. W. Spurden, Willard Kitchen, Dr. VanWart and Mrs. Lynch.

The delegation who found the fort defenders ready for a parley, presented their case in a memorial read by Miss Thompson of the Charlotte street school. Associated with her as representatives of the lady teachers were Miss Burtt, Miss Harvey, Miss Vandine, Miss Williamson and Miss Davis. The memorial recorded the advances made in the cost of living since the present salary of \$350, (being \$250 from the trustees plus \$100 from the government) was fixed many years ago. Comparisons were instituted between this amount and the salaries for ladies in other callings, and also with the salaries given to lady teachers in other places. The lady teachers who were as follows: Moncton, \$325; St. John, \$325; St. Stephen, \$320; Sussex, \$300; and Milltown, \$260. They wanted an increase of \$75 each.

An informal discussion ensued in which Sheriff Sterling explained that the trustees had already gone before the city council last spring with a view to obtain an additional grant for this very purpose, but the assessment for the year having been made out nothing could then be done. He thought he could express the sentiment of the board of trustees by saying that the board would again bring up the matter before a committee of the council. Upon this intimation the delegation withdrew.

The report of the audit committee at the Queen.

for the past year showed income \$16,274.29, expenditure \$16,113.84, indicating a balance on the debit side of \$160.45. This was accounted for in the extra outlay for wood-cutting during the last rigorous winter season, the consumption of fuel in the various school buildings being therefore abnormally large.

Upon the question of adopting the subject of musical notation as recommended by the teachers' association, and the employment of one instructor therein, to act for all the departments, it was decided upon resolution to defer the matter until the city council could be heard from with regard to the necessity of increase of the school grant. Meanwhile the trustees, who are convinced of the importance of the subject will confer with the teachers as to the most feasible way to carry out the recommendation, and the text-book association will likewise have reported upon a system before the beginning of next term.

The question of increasing the salaries of one or two teachers in the higher grades was not looked upon with favor at this meeting, and for the present they will have to bide their time.
