BARRISTERS' SOCIETY.

Officers Elected and Other Business
Transacted at the Annual Meeting.

The annual meeting of the New
Brunswick Barristers' Society was
held last evening.

ter, J. H. Barry, G. W. Allen, H. A.
Powell.

Mr. Baxter, on behalf of the com-
mittee appointed to consult with the
government in the framing of the
judicature act, reported that nothing
yet had been done. He understood
that Mr. Trueman was engaged in
drafting the new act, and that prob-
ably after he got through his work
the committee would be called in.

A number of matters were discuss-
ed at some length by the society. It
was not thought advisable to again
request the judges of the supreme
court to allow themselves to be ad-
dressed as Lordship. Their Honors
had twice refused the title, and as
the court was about the same as
when the former request was made,
there was no reason to suppose that
they had changed their opinion in the
matter.

The well known case of Miss French
came in for some remarks. Several
members expressed the opinion that
it was to be regretted that the news-
papers had seemed inclined to make
light of the judgment delivered by
the court, and though no doubt many
of the paragraphs written were wit-
ty productions, they were not based
on true facts. In consequence a
misconception had arisen in the pub-
lic mind, and it was considered to
be in the interests of all to have a
judgment, likely Judge Barker's, publish-
ed in the papers.

BOARD OF EDUCATION.

Ambitious Chipman Wants the Queens
County Grammar School.

The monthly meeting of the Board
of Education was held here yesterday
afternoon, but little business of im-
portance was transacted.

The trustees of the Chipman
school, who lately completed a fine,
new building, have made application
to have the Grammar school trans-
ferred from Gagetown. The board
decided to take no action in the matter
for one year, but if Chipman contin-
ues to grow and prosper at the pre-
sent time it may eventually get the
Grammar school.

Miss Annie Wetmore and Miss Mar-
garet Ricketson have been granted
licenses to teach manual training on
the recommendation of Mr. Kidner.
Misses Ethel Eadie, Nellie McCul-
ly, Mabel Outerbridge and Bessie A.
Young have been granted licenses to
teach household science on Mr. Kid-
ner's recommendation.

MONTHLY RETURNS.

Imports for January Showed a Sub-
stantial Increase.

The amount deposited in the Do-
minion Government Savings Bank
here during the month of January
was \$9,499 and the withdrawals for
the same period amounted to \$11,-
492. The total amount due deposi-
tors on January 31st was \$1,067,-
363.54.

The value of goods entered for con-
sumption at the port of Fredericton
during January was \$29,082 against
\$8,743 for the corresponding month
last year. The duty collected was
\$2,771.49 against \$1,537.40 for Jan-
uary, 1905.

The amount collected in fines at the
Fredericton police court during Jan-
uary was \$165.

ATTEMPTED MURDER.

Halifax, Feb. 1.—What is believed
to have been an attempt to kill Jas.
Crease of Halifax, the manager and
part owner of a gold mine at Mount
Uniacke, N. S., was made yesterday.

While proceeding from his residence
to the mine, an unknown person, con-
cealed in the thicket, fired at him,
the rifle bullet passing within two
feet of his body and killing his dog,
which was following close to his
heels. Crease being unarmed, did not
venture too near the woods but has-
tened off for assistance. When he re-
turned, no trace of his would-be
slayer could be found. There has
been trouble in that mining district
for some time, and only recently the
crushers and several buildings con-
nected with the mine were destroyed
by an incendiary.

Notice is hereby given that the
Fredericton Boom Company will
cause to be introduced at the next
session of the legislature of New
Brunswick a Bill to amend the Acts
relating to the said Company, and
among other things to provide for an
increase of the Tolls and Charges for
securing and rafting logs and lumber
as follows: Pine Timber, from thirty-
five cents to fifty cents per ton;
Hemlock Timber from sixty cents
to seventy-five cents per ton; Spruce
and Pine logs and other lumber, ex-
cepting Cedar, from eighty-five cents
to one dollar per thousand superficial
feet; Cedar of all kinds, from one
dollar and thirty cents to \$1.30 to
one dollar and forty cents (\$1.40)
per thousand superficial feet; Spruce
and Pine logs belonging to any one
owner averaging less than seventy
en cents each.
