McGahey was taken ill on Saturday night, after having partaken of a late supper at a restaurant, and it was thought at first that he had been poisoned. The attending physician, however, did not authorize any statement of that kind, and he is satisfied that there is nothing in the theory. His diagnosis showed that the boy was suffering from a bad attack of appendicitis.
