

HON. MR. HILL'S ABLE ADDRESS.

Senior Member for Charlotte in a Witty Speech Turns the Tables on the Opposition.

Speaking in the budget debate in the legislature Tuesday afternoon, Hon. Geo. F. Hill said:

It was not my intention to take part in this debate, and I so stated to several members, but circumstances have arisen, especially in relation to our own county, which has caused me to change my mind. One of my colleagues has made a statement that School Inspector Carter had withheld a grant from the government for the purpose of concealing the Bayside school into union with another school district. I was surprised at that statement for I knew Mr. Carter well, and that he was a man of conciliatory disposition. But having no information I was not in position to answer at the time. Mr. Carter, however, saw the report in the newspapers, and wrote to me to contradict it. He also referred to the same member's statement in regard to their being thousands of people in the province that could neither write or read. On this he said: "The school law is about forty years old, and while there may be people native to this county under the age of forty who cannot read or write, I have yet to meet them. In the census before the last Charlotte county ranked first in the Dominion as having the least illiteracy. Mr. Carter gave an emphatic contradiction to the statement in regard to the school grant, the fact being that there had been no recommendation with regard to the union of the district made to the board.

The speeches that have been made against the government have been largely directed against the attorney general. In fact his criticisms on the attorney general were taken out of the speech of the leader of the opposition very little would be left. The leader of the opposition claims, and rightly claims, to be a gentleman, and the descendant of a gentleman, but I think that in criticizing the attorney general he should have remembered the lines of Tennyson:

"And thus he bore without abuse
The grand old name of gentleman,
Defamed by every charlatan
And soiled by all ignoble use."

And also the words of another poet who wrote:

"Born of a long line of gallant gentlemen who only feared a lie,
And thou, thou dark Sir Ralph who lay with broken brand on Marston Moore,

What thinks thou of this son?"

I think that they have done the attorney general great injustice for the purpose of making up a large bill they have taken the sessional indemnity, which we all share, his salary at attorney general which is fixed by law, his traveling expenses, a large sum paid to solicitors in London, \$350 paid to Mr. White, and \$648 paid on account of succession duties to Mr. Emmerson and others. small figure, but the opposition keep this reduces the amount to a very small figure, but the opposition keep on repeating it, their charges get into the newspapers, and the idea is created that this money has been wrongfully taken out of the public chest. If the gentlemen opposite were more honest they would not seek to misrepresent the attorney general, but would give out a reconstructed statement from which would be eliminated those amounts which he received by way of salary and under the operation of the law. I am not here to defend the attorney general. I have not always agreed with him, but I am speaking on behalf of justice, for justice is more than charity, is more than love, it is that quality which never changes and which makes no mistake. The leader of the opposition objects to the ninth commandment "Thou shalt not bear false witness against thy neighbor" and I do not wonder at it. He criticised the attorney general's language, which was certainly strong, and then proceeds to follow suit, and goes on to use the words "foul mouthed slanderer," and to threaten violence and a breach of the peace. Later he characterises one of his actions as an iniquitous transaction. I have been rather astonished at some things that have been said by the opposition in regard to the Central railway. I was one of those who was well pleased at the offer to lease the railway which was announced by the premier. A rental of \$21,000, which is three per cent. on \$700,000, is better than I ever expected, and better than the opposition expected. Some of my friends have received the offer with a great deal of incredulity, but sceptics have always existed, and always will exist. The last skeptic was mother Eve, who could not believe there could be any harm in eating the apple, the last skeptic will be when Gabriel's trumpet sounds a sleep in the Queen hotel or Barker house, and when aroused will refuse to believe that the end of the world has come, and will say that all the racket is due to a delegation from T. T. John or the Miramichi holding a celebration.

I approve of the proposal of the government to turn out the lots of land in our forests and ascertain their value so as to put an upset price on every block. Charges are sometimes made against the scalars which are not borne out by the facts. It was reported that the Pulp Co. on the Bay side, were cutting their lumber too small. The government sent down Wm. Berry, a competent man and a stranger to the party to make an examination. He reported that the charge was unjust and that the scalar was doing his work well. The trees which these men were cutting for pulp wood were of the regulation size, but they were very tall and the company used the

whole of the tree even to the top, which might not be more than three or four inches in diameter. It was in this way that the injurious report was spread, but it certainly is much better to use the top of a tree and pay stumpage on it to the government, than let it rot in the forest. I am also in accord with the views of the Premier, as to the laying out of tracts of land for settlement, contiguous to each other so as to have a sufficient population to sustain churches and schools. The member for St. John has made a strong appeal against any increase in the succession duties and I am in agreement with him on that, and do not think it desirable that the proposed measure should pass the House this session, but when he accuses the attorney general of desiring to increase his own income in this way, I feel certain that he is mistaken. I do not believe that this idea ever entered into the attorney general's mind. I have had some dealings with him in connection with a large estate, and I know that he has not sought to be oppressive, but that his disposition is to be fair and generous.

My senior colleague from Charlotte is opposed to the Highway Act, because he says it tends to centralization of authority. That I think is the best feature for it makes the sums to be expended worth while the attention of a competent man. My colleague also while accusing the government of spending too much money censures them for not spending more on the port of St. John, the ports of Charlotte and in giving bounties to the fishermen, yet I feel certain that if the government went into debt to incur these expenditures which he recommends he would hold up both his hands in holy horror at their extravagance. I do not think that the fishermen of Grand Manan, Campobello, and Deer Island need any bounty or are asking for it. Their life is one of privation, but when the fishing pays it pays well. The fishermen are the most intelligent class of citizens and this has been frequently remarked by political speakers, who have addressed them on the question of the day.

The premier in speaking of Kings, and its dairying seemed to reflect on other counties that had not taken advantage of what the government is doing to advance the dairy interest. He apparently forgot that all other counties are not so well suited for dairying as Kings, and that it takes about four hundred cows to keep up a cheese factory. But the county of Charlotte has fisheries which are more valuable than the dairy product of Kings. In 1901, these fisheries were valued at a million and a quarter dollars, which is three times as much as the value of the butter and cheese made in the factories of the province.

Now in conclusion, I wish to make a gift end of Hill to the opposition and put them in a state of happiness of mind, such as they have never had before, even when their papers prior to a general election were predicting a downfall of the government. An eastern Cal-

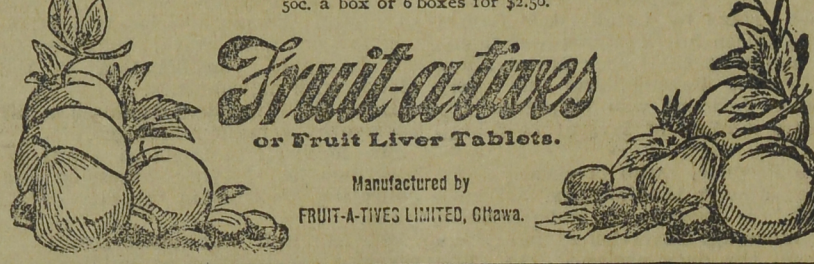

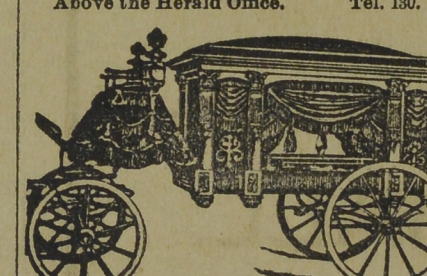
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
