THE LIBERAL TRIUMPH.

The rural districts as well as the cities of England are voting strongly for the Campbell-Bannerman Liberal government which will probably have two-thirds of the new House of Commons at its back.

Thursday's elections added largely to Balfour's discomfiture, and among his colleagues in the late government who were defeated were A. Bonar Law—formerly parliamentary secretary of the board of trade and Lord Stanley former postmaster general.

Mr. Balfour and nine of his government colleagues have been buried under the merciless fall of the ballots.

New Brunswickers have a special interest in Mr. Law, who is a native of Kent, son of a former Presbyterian clergyman, stationed there, and he was one of Mr. Chamberlain's leading lieutenants in the tariff reform movement. Doubtless Mr. Law will secure a seat in another constituency.

Lord Stanley is another defeated candidate in whom Canadians were interested. When his father, now the Earl of Derby, was governor-general of Canada, the present Lord Stanley was his secretary.

Mr. Chamberlain while able to hold his own city of Birmingham, seems to be exerting but little influence in the east of the country, and will return to parliament with a small following, while Mr. Balfour seems to be even worse discredited.

Mr. Chamberlain holds his seat but Mr. Balfour is without one, and the result in Manchester where the premier was defeated, has had a most discouraging effect on the unionists. "What Manchester says to-day England will say to-morrow" is an old saying the Liberals are now fond of recalling. What Manchester has said seems likely to be the most remarkable feature of the whole contest.

In East Manchester, represented by Mr. Balfour since 1886, with majorities ranging from 398 to 2,153, the leader went down before a lawyer, Mr. Thos. G. Horridge, by 1,980 votes.

In Northwest Manchester, Conservative since '86 by 1,471, Mr. Winston Churchill won by 1,241.

Northeast Manchester changes from 706 of a Conservative majority to a 2,432 Labor majority.

South Manchester, from 4,232 Liberal-Unionist majority changes to 1,272 Liberal majority.

North Manchester increases the Liberal majority from 26 to 2,451.

The great revolution in Manchester is attributed to free trade sentiment, as the cotton trade is therein centred, and the work of Mr. Winston Churchill, who has been organizing for upwards of two years.

It is surprising that a member of the York municipal council could be found to move for a reduction of the small grant which the council annually votes to the Victoria hospital. That institution is rendering splendid service to the people of the county, as well as to those of the city, and is deserving of the practical support of both. Other adjoining counties also make use of the hospital, notably Northumberland and Sunbury and the latter at least should make an annual grant to the institution. The council of Kent freely gives an annual grant to the Moncton hospital.

The remains of the late Hon. Raymond Prefontaine who died in Paris, is nearing the shores of Canada, on the British battleship, Dominion, kindly placed at the disposal of the Canadian government by the British Admiralty. The memory of the late Minister of Marine will be honored by distinguished tributes to be paid by his remains at Halifax, where it will be landed, and at Montreal, where it is to be interred.

The Chatham World, which is cursing over the loss of the Sun to the Tories, is reminded by the Moncton Transcript that the Commodore editor had not a word of regret when another St. John newspaper deserted the Liberals at a critical moment. What has the World to say to this?

Dr. Rankin Dawson, a Canadian, son of the late Sir William Dawson, principal of McGill University, was defeated in East Edinburgh, where he was running as a Unionist and tariff reformer. The majority against him was 4,174.

The Fredericton lady bowlers, having twice vanquished the best team of their sex that St. John could produce, are to have a go at some Fredericton gentlemen who have reached the chloroform age.

If Rev. J. J. Colter does his duty as Scott Act inspector for York county, and he will undoubtedly try to do it, he will not have much left of his \$500 salary after he pays his expenses.

PROSPEROUS PRESBYTERIANS.

Moncton Congregation will also have a Bond Burning Celebration.

Moncton, Jan. 19.—St. John's Presbyterian church, this city, is not to be outdone by other churches in the province. The Moncton church will also have a mortgage burning celebration. The date of the burning of the document has not yet been fixed, but preliminaries, such as providing for the discharge of the mortgage, have been completed.

A little over a year ago St. John's congregation grappled with the church debt. There was then a total debt of about eight thousand dollars including a mortgage for seven thousand. The undertaking was big, but but at the annual meeting of the church last night it was announced that the effort had been eminently successful. A seven thousand dollar mortgage will be discharged Feb. 1st and there will still be left about eight hundred to be applied to a floating debt. Pastor MacOdrum and the congregation in wiping out the indebtedness of eight thousand dollars inside of fifteen months in addition to raising the ordinary revenue have accomplished something that probably stands as a record in that respect.

Rev. Mr. MacOdrum has been most energetic in the movement, and the greatest credit is due him for lifting the load that has rested on St. John's church so many years.

The congregation will now consider making the seats in the church free. A plebiscite on the question is to be taken on Sunday, Jan. 28, and Feb. 4.

BITS OF NEWS.

H. W. Barker of St. John, has been appointed manager of the Canadian Druggists' combine branch in that city, with C. T. Nevins as assistant.

Capt. Newton, A. D. C., left Ottawa for Halifax Thursday to represent his excellency on the occasion of the arrival of the remains of the late Hon. Mr. Prefontaine. Col. Sherwood, honorary A. D. C., accompanies him.

Fire in the residence of Henry Bourgeois at Nelson, B. C., Wednesday evening resulted in the death of Bourgeois' two little boys, aged 15 and 4 months. The mother had stepped out for a moment, leaving the children asleep in bed.

John Watson, an employee at Hyman's tannery at London, Ont., was probably fatally scalded by falling into a hot water tank Thursday evening. Nobody was present when the accident occurred, but the man's shouts attracted helpers from another building.

An explosion of dust in the mines of the Kanawha-Detroit Coal Company, on Paint Creek, west Va., Thursday, entombed a score of miners. Eighteen are reported killed. The explosion could be heard for miles. A rescuing party was sent for and up to the present time six dead bodies have been recovered.

The flooring of the vestibule of the Congregational church in Boyleston Centre, Mass., collapsed Thursday night under the weight of a crowd of people who were there to attend a turkey supper and between sixty and seventy persons were precipitated into the cellar. One man was seriously injured, several others were so badly hurt that they required the attention of physicians, while nearly all suffered from shock and bruises.

The first decisive step toward excluding victims of pulmonary tuberculosis from the public schools was taken by the Chicago Board of Education Wednesday night, when that body instructed all principals and teachers to report the names of "suspects" to Supt. Cooley. The board called upon Supt. Cooley to notify the parents and guardians of children suspected and also to direct the child study department to examine each child.

The Great Northern flyer, due at Vancouver at 10 o'clock Thursday night, struck a fallen tree two miles west of Burnaby Lake, and the engine was smashed to fragments. The tender was thrown about 75 feet ahead on the track. The baggage car piled on top of the engine, and the remaining cars, with the exception of the parlor car, was thrown into the ditch. One or two passengers were bruised. Engineer Jones' body was found under the wreck.

The Massey-Harris Co. through their general agent at Woodstock, W. S. Tompkins, has just closed a contract with B. Frank Smith, M. P. P. for 100,000 feet (10 cars), of birch lumber, to be used for making poles for reapers, binders and other farm machines. It will be shipped during the coming summer to Brantford, Ont. This is a new use for New Brunswick hardwood, and if this trial shipment is satisfactory a large quantity will be used for the same purpose in future years.

Col. Andrew C. P. Haggard, a retired British army officer, author and brother of Elder Haggard, was granted a divorce by the supreme court at Portland, Me., on Thursday. The libel alleges that Mrs. Haggard had gross and confirmed habits of intoxication and that she left him without cause while they were living in London in 1899, and he has not seen her since. They were married at Cairo, Egypt, in 1883. Col. Haggard is now at the Hotel Bellevue, New York.

Notice of Legislation

The City of Fredericton will present for enactment at the next session of the Legislature of New Brunswick Bills to authorize and empower the city council as follows:

To provide for the appointment of a Chief of Police, and to vest the appointment of Police Officers and Police Constables in the city council. To establish and carry on a system of incandescent lighting in said city with the necessary powers incidental thereto. To issue debentures to defray the expense of the proposed improvements to the water supply and to amend the acts relating to water and sewerage. To regulate the numbering of houses and buildings within the city and confirm a bye-law relating to telegraph, telephone and other pole lines within the city. To encourage the establishment of industrial enterprises in said city by granting certain exemptions and other aid and assistance thereto.
