A WILD RIDE.

Runaway Horses at St. John Made
Exciting Time for Two St. John
Ladies—Both Injured.

Zigzagging from side to side a coach drawn by a pair of frightened horses and having two ladies inside went tearing down Germain street, St. John last night and was stopped in its mad career only by the horses dashing into the fence at Quinn's blocks, Britain street.

Mrs. H. A. Austin and Miss Jessie Reed were the ladies who underwent the thrilling experience, and both were somewhat injured.

The coach driven by Arthur Hamm called at the Opera House after Dr. Parker's lecture and took four ladies—Miss Stephenson, Mrs. W. E. Vroom, Mrs. Austin and Miss Reed. The first call was made in Pitt St. and Mrs. Vroom was left at her home. The coach was then driven to 9 Wellington row and Miss Stephenson alighted.

Before Mr. Hamm could mount again to his seat to drive the other occupants to Mount Pleasant, the horses turned and started off towards Germain street, evidently bent on regaining their stable without delay. Mr. Hamm managed to retain a grasp of the reins, but the horses' speed quickened and he was dragged sliding and running on the icy road after the now flying team.

Frightened evidently by their unaccustomed freedom the horses began to race. Crossing Union street the rattle of the coach attracted people to the street. King street was crossed in less time than it takes to tell and passers by caught glimpses of two terrified women clinging together and a man still grasping the reins being dragged after the coach, which swayed from side to side.

The pace seemed to grow faster and at length opposite the home of George Robertson, M. P., the driver fell and the horses released from all restraint, tore madly on. A small crowd meanwhile had started running after the flying team and grew in numbers as it went. The horses kept on, miraculously escaping the sidewalks and telephone poles until at last dashing into the fence which bounds the Quinn's blocks they fell. The police were quickly on the spot and helped the bruised and terrified ladies to alight. As there was no conveyance near they walked with assistance to the residence of Dr. P. R. Inches in Germain street, where their injuries were attended to.

Mrs. Austin was the more fortunate of the two and beyond a cut on the forehead and a severe shaking was little the worse. Miss Reed's head was cut her left wrist was broken and she suffered great pain, being at times in a fainting condition. Dr. Inches attended to the injuries and soon after midnight the two ladies were able to leave in one of Watson's coaches for their homes. The escape from more serious injury must be regarded as little short of marvellous when it is considered that the horses raced the whole length of Germain street on an icy surface and entirely beyond control.

Driver Hamm, despite his wild experience and his heavy fall in the street, was able to make his way to the scene where the horses fell and lead them home. His knee and hand were slightly injured. The horses escaped injury but the coach suffered a little.

THE RED BEACH CRIME.

Shooting of Watchman Brown, For
Which Two Desperadoes Have Been
Arrested in St. John.]

Calais Times: James Brown, a watchman employed by the Red Beach Plaster company, Red Beach, was shot and fatally injured, early Tuesday morning, by a burglar who had made an entrance to the Red Beach post office and whose efforts to pillage the safe was discovered and disturbed by Brown.

At 2 o'clock on thereabouts, Tuesday morning, Brown left the company's office and started for the post office, where he was accustomed to change the mails at that hour as an accommodation for post-master Tarbox. As he neared the building he saw three forms at work at the safe. Realizing Brown's approach the men

strang to the door. Brown swung his lantern hard on the leader's head and dashed after him. He had followed but a short distance when another man came from the building and sent a ball from a 32 calibre revolver after him. The bullet entered Brown's back between the shoulders and passed through one of his lungs. The wounded man ran on to the Plaster company's store to secure a revolver but fell to the floor exhausted, where he was found two hours later by little Janie Mingo, who was seeking assistance for her mother, who was ill.

Brown is still alive but it is believed that he cannot recover. His home is in Robinson, where he has a large family. Dr. Deacon was called and this noon stated that "while there's life there's hope." There is, of course a chance that the wound will not prove fatal, although the ball went straight through the right lung and lodged in the front part of the shoulder.

Two men, one a mulatto, named Ashton, the other white, named Phelps, supposed to be the desperadoes who after a series of burglaries at Red Beach, Me., on Tuesday morning, shot and dangerously wounded James Brown, the Red Beach Plaster company's night watchman, were captured in St. John Thursday afternoon by Sergt. Baxter and Officer Wm. H. White. Both men were armed to the teeth, and the mulatto put up a vicious fight for liberty. They will be taken to Calais, and may have to face a charge of murder, as Brown is in a critical condition.)

AGED CITIZEN'S DEATH.

Mr. Richard Williams a former well known resident of Woodstock, who has made his home with his son-in-law, Mr. John Oldham, York St. for the past two years, died this morning after a lingering illness. He was seventy-four years of age and is survived by one son, Mr. Charles Williams of Butte, Montana, and one daughter, Mrs. Oldham of this city. The remains have been prepared for burial by Undertaker R. B. Adams, and will be taken to Woodstock by the Gibson train tomorrow morning for burial. A service will be conducted at the home this evening by Rev. Dr. Rogers at 8.30 o'clock.

EVIDENCES OF THEIR CRIME.

St. John, Jan. 19.—(Special)—Two men arrested here in connection with the Red Beach burglary case, will be taken back to Calais this afternoon.

They were examined by United States officers this morning and the stolen goods found on them.

ROBBED A CHURCH.

Winnipeg, Jan. 19.—(Special)—The first Greek church here for several months has been systematically robbed of offerings deposited in front of the altar by parties who defied detection.

However, yesterday a clue was discovered and 5 young boys, were arrested on the charge of committing the thefts.

ROBBED PEOPLE AT PISTOL POINT.

Desperado Terrorized Business Section of Winnipeg—At Least Six Were Held Up.

Winnipeg, Man., Jan. 19.—About six o'clock last evening, when Main street north was in its most crowded condition with shoppers and pedestrians, the business section was terrorized by a desperado, who held up at least six people at the point of a revolver and relieved them of sums ranging from 25 cents to \$15. Though the police were notified by the victims, the robber was not captured, and the theory of the officers is that he boarded a freight train and left the city.

The man went into the pawn shop run by Ben Zimmerman, near the new C. P. R. hotel, and wanted to purchase a 38-calibre revolver with cartridges. When given the weapon he attempted to load it in the store. He repeated this performance at F. W. Wey's & Co.'s hardware store, but succeeded in getting away with the revolver, refusing to pay for it. He then started out on the street and held up one man on Maple street, who gave him 25 cents. Another who put up his hands had no funds, whereupon the highwayman begged his pardon and let him go. The next victim was a laborer at the Vulcan Iron Works, who had the muzzle of the pistol shoved under his nose and handed over \$15.
