LIEUT. COL. MAUNSELL DEAD.

Former D. O. C. of New Brunswick
of Fredericton Passed Away.

T. H. A. T.

News of the recent death in England of Lt. Col. Geo. J. Maunsell, for many years D. O. C. of this province, and a prominent and popular citizen of Fredericton, will be heard with sincere regret by his large circle of friends.

Col. Maunsell spent the best years of his life in Fredericton, and took an active interest in all that pertained to its welfare. He was an ardent and efficient military man, a bright genial gentleman who had a host of friends all over the country. After retiring from the military service, Col. Maunsell removed to England, where his wife died a few years ago. He was granted a gratuity for his services by Parliament.

He is survived by three sons, Major Geo. S. Maunsell of the Militia department at Ottawa, F. Maunsell of Toronto, W. D. Maunsell of Saskatchewan, and one of his daughters is Mrs. W. de C. O'Grady, wife of Mr. W. de C. O'Grady, of the Northern Bank, Winnipeg.

SKETCH OF HIS CAREER

From Morgan's volume on Canadian Men and Women, we extract the following:

Lt.-Col. George J. Maunsell, D. O. C., Can. permanent force, is the son of the late Geo. M. Maunsell, J. P., of Ballywilliam House, Co. Limerick, Ireland, by his wife, Mary, daughter of the Rev. J. Stopford, son of the late Bishop of Cloyne and Ross. He was born at Ballywilliam House, Aug. 25, 1836. He was educated by private tutor and at the Royal Mil. Coll., Sandhurst. He entered the army as ensign 15th Foot, May 15, 1855, was promoted lieutenant, May 15, 1861, and came to Canada with his regiment, 1864. He saw active service in the field with the army of the Potomac during the American civil war, being temporarily attached to General Grant's staff from the opening of the spring campaign, 1865,

until the surrender of Richmond. Appointed Adjutant General of Militia, of N. B., Nov. 22, 1865, he organized the local force engaged in the defence of the western frontier of the Province during the Fenian invasion, 1866. After Confederation was adjusted General of Dist. No. 8. In 1881 he was transferred to the command of District No. 4, headquarters at Ottawa; in Dec. 1883, he became commandant of the newly organized Royal School of Infantry at Fredericton. In May, 1884, he was reappointed Deputy Adjutant General for District No. 8; in May 1896, he was appointed Inspector of Infantry; and in September, 1896, he was called to take the command of the Royal Regiment of Canadian Infantry, a force consisting of companies at London, Ont., Toronto, St. John's, P. Q., and Fredericton, N. B. Col. M. possessed a large and varied experience in almost all branches of his profession. While a young officer he attended a course of instruction in military engineering at Aldershot, and was subsequently employed on the staff in connection therewith. In 1858-59 he took a first class certificate in musketry at Hythe, and was appointed Instructor of Musketry to his regiment. In 1883 he was attached to His Majesty's forces at Aldershot for instructional purposes, and on that occasion extended his field of observation to the continent of Europe. On the outbreak of the Riel rebellion, 1885, he organized a temporary battalion, for immediate active service in the North West Territory and received the thanks of the Government therefor. He was the author of "The Militia of New Brunswick, Past and Present," a paper read before the New Brunswick Historical Society, 1897. In religious faith he was an Anglican. He married August, 1862, Anna, eldest daughter of the late F. Co., Ireland, who died in England a few years ago.

Brockville, Ont., Jan. 20.—(Special.)—Mrs. Wm. Bain, a middle aged woman of Algonquin, committed suicide yesterday by drinking a large dose of Paris green.

She was a widow, living with her son, and in the latter's absence at work, she took the fatal dose. The act is supposed to have been committed in a moment of mental derangement. Four sons survive.

FOUND DEAD.

Sydney, N. S., Jan. 20.—(Special.)—W. Grantmire, of this city, was found dead in a field last night at the Northwest Arm, where he had gone yesterday to inspect some quarries of the Dominion Iron and Steel Company. Heart failure was the cause of death. He was sixty-one years of age and leaves a wife and three children.

COLD AT CHATHAM.

Chatham, N. B., Jan. 20.—(Special.)—The government thermometer registered seven and a half degrees below zero last night.

POISONED HIMSELF.

Halifax Merchant Victim of Insomnia put an end to his Life.

Halifax, N. S., Jan. 20.—The sudden death yesterday at his home of Samuel S. Scott, of the wholesale millinery firm of Welner & Scott, was a shock to his friends.

The first intimation the public had of the fact was when persons passing along Granville street noted the drawn blinds of the business house, and on inquiry were told that Mr. Scott was dead. Further inquiry revealed the fact that death was due to poison.

For some time Mr. Scott had been suffering from insomnia and especially so for the past two or three days. Yesterday morning after breakfast went to his room. About fifteen minutes later his wife, hearing the sound of moans, ran up and was shocked to find her husband lying insensible on the bed, and the odor of carbolic acid filling the room. Examination of a bottle nearby revealed the fact that Mr. Scott had taken fully an ounce of the deadly drug.

BURIED \$175,000 LOOT.

Brookline, Mass., Jan. 19.—The unearthing of two tin boxes of watches and jewellery in Hammond's Woods and the identification of one of the watches, which was stolen from the residence of Dr. Charles G. Weld, on December 2, 1888, leads to the conviction that burglars' loot amounting to \$175,000, buried there by William Barrett, a notorious burglar, who is now serving a life sentence at Charlestown prison for murder, will yet be uncovered. When told that two men employed by the Grey Cloth Commission in Brookline had recovered two boxes yesterday, Barrett said:

"Yes, there are boxes containing \$175,000 worth of bonds and stocks buried in the woods of Chestnut Hill. About \$20,000 of them are in Union Pacific bonds. I don't care if they are found."

Although the police doubted the existence of the big treasure, when Barrett was arrested in May, 1894, for the murder of Constable James H. Farrer of Lincoln, and although such vain digging has been done since the arrest of Barrett's accomplice, James Chaffee, the finding of the two boxes revives credence in the existence of the immense loot, which was the sensation of twenty years ago.

For twenty years Barrett lived as a gentleman in Boston, Newport and New York, and all the time was looting the residences of prominent persons, until the discovery of his burglaries were almost beyond belief. Not until Barrett's arrest for the murder was his identity established as that of the astute housebreaker, who for seventeen years had his headquarters at Eliot Street, Boston, and who maintained a wife and children, in luxury in New York. Barrett was then connected with the theft of \$17,000 worth of famous pictures from the late Frederick Ames of North Easton, which led to the discovery of thousands of dollars' worth of loot placed in New York storage warehouses by Barrett's partner, Chaffee.

Robert McKee, an old and respected inhabitant of St. Mary's, died suddenly at his home on Friday of cancer of the stomach.

EVANGELISTIC SERVICES.

Mr. Chubbuck, an evangelist, has been holding services in this city during the past week and continued this week at the Free Baptist Church. He preached to a large congregation in the Methodist Church on Sabbath evening, and gives Bible readings in the Free Baptist Church every afternoon.

YORK CIRCUIT COURT.

The York circuit court opened on Tuesday, Mr. Justice Fisher presiding. The important case of Lunt vs. Lloyd was taken up first and is still before the court and judging from the array of learned counsel employed, will occupy the rest of the week. Dr. Tuck, Q. C., A. A. Stockton, and Mr. Burbridge appear for the defendant, and S. R. Thompson, Q. C., and E. L. Wetmore, Q. C., for the plaintiff.

CITY VS. COUNTY.

A copy of the resolution was transmitted to the county council, and at its session on Tuesday a committee was appointed to prepare a petition to the legislature to frustrate the desire of the city council. The latter body also authorized the preparation of a bill giving the city power to collect tolls and fees in the county court house

market. This move will also be combatted before the legislature by a petition from the county council.

DEATH OF JOHN McINNES.

Mr. John McInnes, one of our most respected citizens, passed away on Thursday Jan. 15, after a somewhat protracted illness from heart disease. The deceased gentleman was born in Mull, County of Argyre-shire, Scotland, and immigrated when quite young to Nova Scotia, where he settled for a time. He came to this city in 1850 as manager of the gas company's works, which position he filled until the spring of 1878. He has since 1851 been connected with the society of St. Andrew, of which he was vice-president at the time of his death. He was for a long time an active and useful member of the Fredericton Curling Club, and only during very late years did he retire from the game, however, still retaining a keen interest in the success of the club. As a prominent member of St. Paul's Presbyterian church he was always at his post, and for a term of years held the position of treasurer of the congregational funds. In every walk of life he was courteous, affable and popular with his fellow citizens, and his memory will be revered by a very large circle of acquaintances. The funeral of the deceased gentleman took place from his late residence on Brunswick street at two o'clock Sunday afternoon, and the cortege that followed his remains to the cemetery was the largest that has been seen in this city for many a day, the most prominent citizens uniting in paying the last tribute of respect to a worthy and honored man. The funeral service was conducted by Rev. Mr. Mowatt. (The late Mr. McInnes resided in what is now the Richards' private hospital, and his three sons, who survive him are Messrs. Frank M., and Archie McInnes of Boston, and Mr. William McInnes of the geological survey, Ottawa.)

The complimentary benefit given to Miss Martin at the city hall last Thursday night was a real success both financially and otherwise. The opening chorus by the Messrs. James and John McAdam, Hugh and John O'Brien, John and James Ward, Thomas Nesbitt, W. A. Adams and James Biggs was well received and produced an enthusiastic encore. Mrs. Dr. Currie gave a beautiful solo in her usual style and received a graceful recognition from the house. Mrs. Mauger's reading, and Mr. William Wilson's solo, "The Tar's Farewell," were worthy of the applause they received. Mr. Wilson sang splendidly, quite excelling himself in fact. Miss Robb sang "When the Tide Comes In" sweetly and for an encore gave "Rory O. Moore," to a delighted house. Mrs. E. E. Phair gave two selections in a happy manner and her reappearance on the stage here was hailed with unmistakable signs of pleasure.
