Hendrie, M. L. A., Hamilton, Lt. Col. Thair, St. Catharines, and Major Hill and W. W. Thompson of Niagara Falls. The object of the enterprise is to give to military forces at once papers instructive and newsy. The publication will be strictly non-political. An examination of the names of the officers above given will show that many of them are interested in the rival political parties.

## CAPT. VINCE TO BLAME.

### Ferry Committee Holds Him Responsible for the Ludlow Disaster.

St. John, Jan. 26.—(Special.)—The common council met this morning and passed a resolution of sympathy on the late Alderman Millidge, referring in eulogistic terms of his record in the council. It was decided to attend the funeral in a body. The report of the ferry committee on the inquiry with the recent disaster to the steamer Ludlow fixed the blame on Captain Vince and recommended that the command be taken from him, but he be retained in the service in view of his long service in some capacity other than captain or mate. It recommended Mate Estabrooks for captain and exonerates Engineer Whelpley from all charges.

This was adopted by the council, but a section recommending that appointments, suspension and dismissal of employees be vested in Supt. Glasgow, was laid over until the meeting when the heads of various departments will be considered in a like manner.

## LAD TO REST.

St. John, Jan. 26.—(Special.)—The funeral of the late Ald. Thomas Millidge, took place this afternoon and was largely attended. The body was taken to St. John's (stone) church at 11.30 this morning. The service was held at 2.30 and was conducted by Rev. G. A. Kurling. The pall bearers were Judge McLeod, Silas Armond, K. C., Herbert E. Wardrop, A. O. Earle, K. C., George Coster and William Murdoch. The deputy mayor and common council attended in a body. Interment was made in the family lot at Fernhill.

Her screams brought her husband, who, in trying to protect her, was shot down and in the scuffle she also received some bullets. It is believed that the men were foreigners.

## AGAIN IN TROUBLE.

Ottawa, Ont., Jan. 26.—(Special.) Reports to the Mounted Police Department indicates that the Doukhobors in Swan River district are breaking again from the communal system and are making individual homestead entries. Realizing the futility of offering any opposition, Peter Veregin, their leader, is allowing them to do this, and returning to them the value of whatever they have put into the common fund during the last three years.

An important real estate transfer has just been concluded at Sydney. The Sydney hotel property, owned by A. C. Ross, has been sold to E. Le-Roi Willis, the present lessee. It is understood that Mr. Willis will make some improvements to the interior of the hotel, which will make it second to none in the lower provinces. The price paid has not been given out.

## FISH AND GAME.

### Matters Discussed at the North American Association.

Boston, Jan. 25.—The sixth annual convention of the North American Fish and Game Association held its first session at the Copley Square Hotel yesterday. Vice President F. S. Hodges of this city, presided, and E. T. D. Chambers of Quebec, secretary of the Sportsmen's Fish and Game Protection Association, was secretary. Mr. Chambers said in his report that during the year there were four resignations and two deaths. Among those present were: L. T. Armstrong, Montreal; Dr. Heber Bishop, Walter Brackett, Boston; General G. Butterfield, Derby Lane, Vt.; Hon. F. J. Sweeney, surveyor general of the province of New Brunswick; A. Kelley Evans, secretary province of Ontario Fish and Game Protective Association; Charles F. Burhades, Harrensburg, N. Y.; Dr. John T. Finnie, Montreal; W. M. Henry, United States consul at Quebec; R. E. Plumb, Brecoit; H. G. Thomas of the Vermont Fish and Game Commission; C. E. E. Usher, Montreal; Mr. D. G. Smith, superintendent of fisheries, of Chatham, N. B., said there has been an increase of game, large and small, in 1905, and this has been the case several years. Dr. Bishop said that he had been to New Brunswick several times, and considered its license law the best in the world. Dr. Finnie of Quebec, spoke of the abuse of cold storage, and characterized the moral effect bad of selling game and fish out of season. At the afternoon session the Hon. L. T. Carleton of Augusta, Me., commissioner of inland fisheries and game, said that game in Maine was more plentiful than ever, with the exception of caribou, which seem to have left entirely for some reason. Former Governor Nelson W. Fisk, Vt., told of the growth of the Vermont Association. Dr. John T. Finnie, the vice president of the province of Quebec, said that there had been a great awakening in connection with the fish and game protection of the province. Much good has been accomplished since his position as minister of forest and fisheries. He has been succeeded by the Hon. Jean Prevost, who has shown marvellous activity and energy in acquiring a complete knowledge of his department. The present game act is to be amended so as to include the tag system as adopted by Ontario, and the licensed guide as in the state of Maine. The present system of deputy wardens will be entirely done away with, and instead a few good wardens will be appointed at a good salary.

## BITS OF NEWS.

The county county of Westmorland has voted Sheriff McQueen a substantial increase in salary. In lieu of the work in attending courts, summoning jurors, etc., for which the sheriff received about \$700 in fees, the council voted him a straight salary of \$1,000 a year. This, together with other fees in connection with the office, will make a respectable salary for the sheriff.

General Joseph Wheeler, the famous confederate cavalry leader and a brigadier general of the United States army since the war in Spain, died at 5.35 o'clock Thursday afternoon at the home of his sister, Mrs. Sterling Smith of Brooklyn, of pneumonia. The veteran of two wars was 69 years old, but in spite of his age there was hope until Thursday of his recovery.

Shortly after the retail stores closed on Thursday night, a vigorous fire burst out in the rear of the millinery store of Miss A. M. Clark, in the heart of the retail district in Main Street. An alarm was quickly turned in, but before the apparatus could arrive the flames had followed an air shaft and had ignited the entire rear part of the three story structure. The total loss will be between \$7,000 and \$8,000.

## BOTH TEAMS LOST.

### Fredericton Defeated at Sackville and the Crescents at Moncton.

Sackville, Jan. 25.—In a closely contested game, but nevertheless poor exhibition of hockey, the Fredericton hockey team met defeat here tonight by the score of 3 to 2. Both teams played poorly on the whole and unnecessary roughness and tripping engaged in to a considerable extent in spite of the indicted penalties. There was some difficulty over the choosing of a referee and it was 8.30 o'clock when B. Russell of Mt. Allison, blew the whistle for play. Unfortunately Russell was a little lax in watching the game and at half time Fredericton protested him, but no change was made. The game was very even throughout, Fredericton having the advantage in the first half and Sackville being slightly superior in the second.

For Fredericton the Staples boys seemed to star; besides playing defence one of them was usually found in every offensive play and their individual rushes were of high order. Very little combination was indulged in and the game was more of each man for himself, slash, bang, trip style. The first goal was shot from a mix up by Morrison about the middle of the first half and was followed shortly afterwards by one from Ayer for Sackville.
