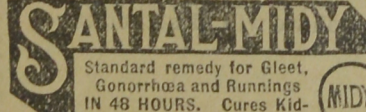

BUDGET SPEECH.

(Continued from second page.)

the Bay of Fundy, which owing to the fog, are much less liable to fires than lands further in the interior. The object of this survey will be to enable us to put a proper upset price upon lands according to their relative value. After this survey is made we will also require a report of the lands on the heads and sources of the different streams which, in the opinion of the government, should be reserved for the purpose of preventing the streams going dry. Trees, together with the carpeting formed by their annual fall of leaf and the mosses, and secondary vegetation which they indirectly produce, cause the detention of much of the rain water that falls. This, instead of running off through the natural water courses, at once gravitates into the earth, and is gradually supplied to the lakes and rivers by springs, keeping them full. We also propose to stop the cutting of hemlock trees for bark unless the operator takes out the entire tree. Trees left in the woods in this way are a menace to our forest wealth. We will also make regulations for the better taking out of the whole tree requiring the tops to be taken out, and the distribution of the branches and debris. Under the present arrangement a great deal of the tree is left in the woods and we desire that this shall be removed. This leads me to a consideration of the pulp wood industry. Many persons in this province are against the exportation of pulp wood on the ground that it will destroy our forests, but I think that there is no good reason to anticipate such a result. It is the policy of the government that no lumber shall be cut on Crown timber lands under the regulation size. It has been said that the government should deal with the question of exporting pulp wood. When the tariff commission was sitting in this province it was suggested that a duty should be placed on the exportation of pulp wood. To this Mr. Fielding replied in his airy way that this was a matter for the province to deal with. That however, is not a correct statement, for we could not deal with the exportation of wood cut on granted lands. We could only affect the cutting of pulp wood on Crown land. It seems to me, however, that there is plenty of room for the pulp industry in this province if it is properly guided.

In 1893 we gave the operators 25 years' leases of lumber lands and these leases have yet twelve years to run. But for the last two or three years the operators have been insisting on perpetual leases such as exist in Quebec. Yet when they bought this land it was for 25 years which is a long time and would then seemed a long time and would be fair that having held these lands for thirteen years they should say we must have them forever without paying any additional price or allowing others to bid for them. That is one way of looking at the matter. There is another way of looking at it. Would it be fair that parties who have for years been carrying on the lumbering industry and giving employment to large numbers of people should be at the mercy of every speculator? The view of the government is to give the lessees of lands some protection. But where a man has a mill and an established business he should have reserve for his use enough land to stock his mill on surrendering the rest and also that he should agree to carry on the industry as before. Some of these lands cost the operators only the upset price which was only \$8 a square mile. Some lumbermen who paid these few prices now demand for their holdings, five hundred to a thousand dollars a mile. Would it be reasonable to give these government lands in perpetuity without the operators paying one cent more? To do so would be giving away the public rights and the public money to men many of whom are wealthy. I may say here that it is not the intention of the government to give the operators these lands without compensation.

Mr. Hazen—Will you introduce a bill on this subject?
Hon. Mr. Tweedie—Yes, legislation will be introduced. We will also from this survey mark out the pulp lines where wood is never likely to grow to a large size. We also propose to deal with rotary mills. They are a great menace to our forests from their liability to cause fires. We must place restrictions upon them. We also propose that the scalers of lumber shall be changed around and that no scaler shall hold a district for more than two years. It is also proposed to hold a forest convention about the beginning of August next in Fredericton, if it can be arranged, where all who are interested in lumber may attend. It is the intention of the government to protect our forest lands and I have no doubt that with proper care they will last for 250 years. Our lumber policy is the most important matter with which this province has to deal. Large numbers of persons are now coming into our province to invest in lands. The Bay Shore Lumber Company has spent about a million dollars in purchasing lands. They are going on lumbering on their own lands very carefully taking out everything the whole of the regulation size tree. It would amaze some people in the United States if they saw the waste of some of our mills. Another large company is that which purchased the Wm. Richards' property, 160,000 acres of freehold, and leases to about the same amount for some \$700,000. They are now cutting on their freehold and they intend to build a mill on what is called the Morrison place to take off the bark and they will send the logs to New York to make into pulp. It is to be regretted that our water powers in New Brunswick suitable for pulp mills are so few. That at Grand Falls, the Nepisiguit and perhaps the Upsalquitch are the most important. The Grand Falls Company I may say have filed their plans with the government and will soon be making progress with their work.

A PROGRESSIVE POLICY.

Now I have gone over these matters and I may say in conclusion that our policy along these lines has been a progressive policy. We have encouraged all industries by the long lease system, we have greatly improved the position of the lumber operator and made his business much more profitable. The lumbermen appreciate our policy and stand by us. We have given to agriculture an impetus and we have the sentiment of the farmers behind us, for it is our policy to continue to assist them. But counties that will not take advantage of the facilities we offer should not complain if other counties that have done better should receive more assistance. Kings is a notable example of a county that has profited by our dairy policy. In that county they have recently developed cold storage facilities along the line of dairying and this has made a difference of two or three cents a pound in favor of the farmer in the price of butter by keeping the market steady. Sussex the chief town in this county, is one of the richest places in Canada and this money has been made by agriculture.

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would bring more money to them. They advocate beginning the open season on the 1st of September, an arrangement which would be very disastrous to our interests. One of them, Mr. Moore, a guide who comes to the meetings and speaks ex cathedra has admitted that he is a poacher and killed a beaver illegally. The government does not want advice from persons who are so disinterested. Some guides even went so far as to write letters to persons abroad asking them to write condemning the laws. I maintain that every man who goes into the woods with a gun should have a license so that our forest rangers may know who are in the woods, which they are guarding against fire.

We have also given our attention to the roads of the province, and have passed a highway act which is a great improvement on its predecessors. It is not true that I have said I will not amend this act. I do not claim that it is perfect and I think it may need amendments in the line of making better provision for winter roads. I am now speaking my own sentiments but I have no doubt that the chief commissioner of public works will agree with me and that he will be prepared to make any amendments that are necessary.

We hear from time to time that the province is going back, but I deny this for our population is increasing, and so is our wealth. There is a great contrast between our present conditions and that which we occupied 30 years ago. In that time we have progressed in regard to education, agriculture and thrift and our people are far more prosperous, yet this has been accomplished in spite of the failure of a great industry, shipbuilding which gave employment to thousands in St. John and on the North Shore, and stimulated every other industry. Our people deserve a great deal of credit for having sought out new avenues of industry to balance this great loss. The population of our province is increasing and while our boys are drifting west, we must remember that the tide ebbs as well as flows and that most of them will come back to us. We need more people, but the people we need are men who will establish and work at new industries in our towns for the time has gone by when people will take up a 100 acre lot of forest lands and settle upon it. Now sir we have great and varied advantages in this province. It is a good place to live in. Our climate is healthy, our children obtain a good education, (Continued on sixth page.)
