AROOSTOOK TRAGEDIES.

Five Children Burned to Death in Fires Which Consumed Their Homes.

Caribou, Me., Feb. 21.—Hardly had the shock occasioned by the terrible fatality which occurred in Caribou Monday evening when three children of Joseph Cyr were burned to death, began to abate before one equally as horrible took place yesterday.

This occurred at the home of Gohasse Brisette, in Northern Caribou, about six miles from this village.

Mr. Brisette was away in the woods at the time and his wife, after doing her noon work, went over to a neighbor's to telephone to her husband, leaving her two children in the house alone. She was absent a short time and upon her return, found the building in flames.

One child was taken from the burning building, but died shortly after being removed. The body of the other was found in the ruins after the fire had burned itself out.

It is expected that the fire originated by the stove or a defective flue.

This is an awful sequel to Mondays sag event and Monday and Tuesday will go down as dark days in Caribou's history.

The entire community expresses its sincerest sympathy for the bereaved parents of both families.

VANCEBORO FIRE.

Maine Central Station and Other Buildings Burned.

Between one and two o'clock this morning word was received of the destruction by fire of the station and other buildings at Vanceboro. Few particulars could be learned, as both the C. P. R. and Western Union wires at Vanceboro were burned.

It appears that about a quarter to eleven a lamp in the American Express Company's office, which is in the station building, exploded, and soon the whole interior of the office was a mass of flames. There were many people about at the time, but in spite of their efforts it was soon seen that the station building was doomed.

From this the flames spread to the car repair shop nearby, and that building was all on fire when the burning of the wires cut off further communication. However, the message received would indicate that no other buildings were in great danger.

The Vanceboro station is owned by the Maine Central. It was quite a large wooden building, containing ticket and dispatchers' offices, two waiting rooms, customs house, express office and telegraph offices.

The car repair shop was only a small wooden building near the station.

The message from Vanceboro added that the customs storehouse was burned, but whether this is a separate building or is included in the station is not known. The C. P. R. has no property at Vanceboro.

THE INTERCOLONIAL.

Hon. Mr. Emerson Looks for Big Surplus in the Future.

Ottawa, Feb. 21.—"I expect," said Hon. H. R. Emerson "that the government system of railways will come out on an even balance on the 30th of June this year, and I venture to predict that within three years the annual surplus on the I. C. R. will run into the million column. That is a good deal to say, but it can be done, and without impairing the service." Our proposed retrenchments are not simply effervescent; they are not for this year alone. They would not be worth troubling about if that were all. What we are aiming at is to put them on a permanent basis.

Mr. Emerson intimated that experts were now at Moncton changing their entire system of bookkeeping by which it would be modernized as well as economized. The minister says the amended passenger rates will go into effect on the 1st of next month.
