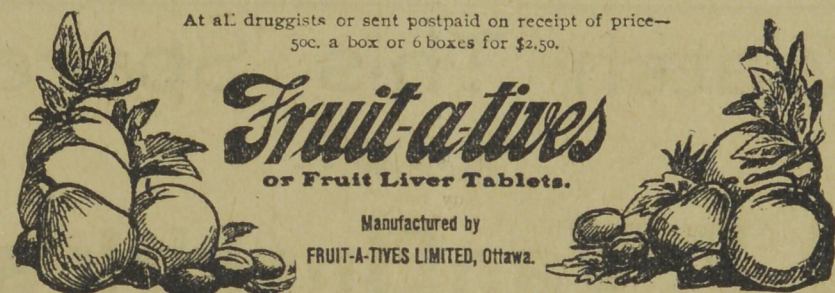

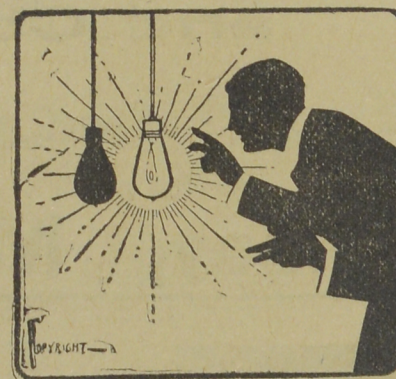
Notice of Legislation

2. The amount paid to each superintendent as remuneration for his services as such, is ten per cent. commission on all expenditures that were made in the county of Sunbury. In the county of Queens all the superintendents were paid ten per cent. commission on their expenditures except four, who acted as foremen on some special work and were paid at the rate of two dollars per day and ten per cent. commission on the balance of their accounts. The superintendents for Kings County are paid at the rate of \$500 per year. The respective salaries were determined on the basis of ten per cent. assessment and grant to be expended in the county, and a small allowance for expenses to cover looking after all bridges and wharves in their respective districts, and with a distinct understanding that they would not be paid for day's work in addition to or in lieu of ten per cent. and said salaries are made up as follows:

N. B.—For the sum of \$127.74 the Supt. attends to and looks after all bridges in his district of spans under 40 feet. Supt. Peatman, in District No. 1 has 56 bridges and 274 miles of road. Gilliland in No. 2, 66 bridges and 282 miles of road. Muir has 112 bridges and 240 miles of road. Mason has 70 bridges and 341 miles of road. Morrison has 146 bridges and 410 miles of road.

3.—No money has been received by the Department from taxes levied in each of such districts under the provisions of the Highway Act, but there exists in the hands of the treasurers of the three counties the following amounts, which are placed in the credit of each road district, to be expended in the highway division in which the taxes were collected.
