THE PROFITS OF EVANGELISM.

(From the New York Mail.)

It is to be inferred from some remarks that have lately appeared in the religious journals that the regular ministers, especially those in the country, are becoming somewhat restive under the system of expensive evangelism that is now becoming the ordinary way of propagating religion. As the Christian Register expresses it, "nothing but a sense of delicacy restrains hundreds of ill-paid ministers from making a protest when they see travelling preachers, no better, wiser or more devoted than themselves, carry off, after the work of a few days or a few weeks, as much money as would come to them in a year." The rewards of the successful and popular evangelist are high. Not only does he often receive a large salary, and live somewhat expensively, but he is frequently the recipient of generous donations from those whom his ministrations have benefited.

But if gospelers are commanded to take neither scrip nor staff, they are also commanded to be all things to all men, and he who suits the demand of the men of this generation must have money to spend, and spend it. The proper ground for complaint is not that the evangelists are so well paid, but that the regular minister, who fights the battle in his neighborhood year in and year out, is so miserably paid. The evangelists are in the light of the regular minister in the army of the Lord, and the permanent ministers are in the light of the evangelists in the army of the Lord. There is no justice in paying one arm of the service so much and the other so little. Every dollar that a congregation subscribes for a campaign of evangelism should be balanced by a gift of the same amount to the home-staying all the year round worker.

It is all very different, this business of saving souls, from what it used to be. When the bearer of good tidings goes forth now to preach, he doth indeed provide himself with scrip for the journey, and quite abundantly he taketh more than two coats, and also shoes. The fishers of men are no longer of the class of real fishermen. They are college graduates, verging upon the condition of business men. They are expected to "look prosperous" and do. Their credit would be shorn, and their gospel possibly rejected if they came shabby and travel-stained and dined on the church porch on bread and cheese.

finally a case was submitted to the courts for argument. I was not present but as we all know the judges unanimously refused this lady admission. The barristers' society was not unanimous in its view of the law the members being pretty equally divided on the subject with a minority majority against admission. If the question simply related to this young lady a great deal could be said from the standpoint of justice and equity in her behalf. The barristers' society having admitted her as a student and accepted her fees it was only natural that at the expiration of the term of study she should claim her right to be examined and if qualified, admitted an attorney. But this bill is not limited in its application to this young lady but it provides that women shall be admitted to the study of the law and shall be called and admitted barristers and attorneys upon the same terms and subject to the like conditions and regulations as men.

Women are admitted in Ontario and many states of the American Union, although that right is denied them in the mother country. But I require no precedent to induce me to support the bill, which although introduced as a government measure the supporters of the administration were free to treat according to their individual views. I hope it will pass unanimously for I feel women possess the natural right to admission to one of the noblest callings in the land. (Applause) and I know of no reason if a lady wishes to study law she should not do so. Others may hold that woman's sphere is the domestic circle. That might carry force were all provided with happy comfortable homes, but when we find them driven out by stress of circumstances to earn their livelihood in the busy walks of life and find them doing so with honor and credit to themselves why should a man stand up and say they shall not engage in the practice of the law. They have entered our universities and fought their way to the front ranks against the complete tion of our brightest sons and in the courts have they triumphed in legal combat over stalwart, of the profession. I have in my mind the case of a young lady who starting from a humble home sought employment in a lawyer's office. While there she studied law and to-day is one of the most successful patent lawyers in a large American city with an income of ten thousand dollars a year.

The bill was then read section by section without debate passed the committee stage, was reported to the speaker and stands for its third reading to-day.

The House adjourned at 5.15.
