DIE TOGETHER BY GAS. THE CENTRAL RAILWAY.

Aged Mrs. Rose Hyslip Owned Apartment House Where She Lived. A Correspondent Who Thinks Mr. Hazen's Party Showed the White Feather.

New York, March 16.—A feeble woman of 93 years, and her son, who was 59 years old, and was well known in the Greenpoint section because he was partially blind, were found dead in their apartments at 170 India street, Greenpoint, this morning from illuminating gas. The woman, who had been a resident of the section nearly all her life, was reputed to be quite wealthy and was the owner of the building in which she met her death.

The woman was Mrs. Rosie Hyslip. She was 93 years old and lived on the first floor, in a rear apartment of the three storey double tenement house at 170 India street. Her only companion was her son, Joseph, who had lost the sight of one eye. The sight in the other had been much impaired and it was with difficulty that he made his way about the streets. Shortly before eight o'clock this morning Mrs. Bella Schamp, who occupies an apartment across the hallway, was about to go to a nearby store to make some purchases for the morning meal. When she opened the door leading from her kitchen to the hall she was met with a flow of gas which for a moment stifled her. She went back into her apartment, closing the door. When she recovered from the effects of the gas, she again went into the hall and following the odor, traced it to the Hyslip apartment.

She tried to open the door, but it was locked. It resisted her efforts when she attempted to force it open and she went into the street. Frank Morrette, of 962 Lorimer street, was passing the door and Mrs. Schamp told him that the gas was escaping in the Hyslip apartments. She feared the old woman and her son might be dead, she said. Morrette went into the hallway and worked his way along the passage until he came to the Hyslip rooms. He was unable to force the door, however, and went to the back yard. Climbing on to the sill, he broke open a window in the kitchen. The flow of gas took him unawares and he fell to the yard. He was not hurt, and, picking himself up, he climbed inside the window. The gas so filled the room that he was compelled to wait for it to clear. When, finally he was able to stay in the room, he turned off an open jet which had been used to supply gas to a stove which was standing on a stationary tub. He called for Mrs. Hyslip, but got no answer. Going into the woman's bedroom, which is just off the kitchen, he found the old woman, partially dressed, lying face downward on the bed. He tried to revive her, but failed.

Then he went into an adjoining bedroom and found the son Joseph. He, too, was apparently unconscious, and Morrette's efforts to resuscitate him failed. Morrette then ran to the Greenpoint avenue station, told the police what had happened, and Ambulance Surgeon Precht, from the Eastern District Hospital, was summoned. When he got to the house, he declared that mother and son had been dead for some time.

The old woman was the owner of the big tenement house in which she lived. Persons in the neighborhood said she was the owner of some other property, the income from which, they said, had enabled her and her son to live comfortably. It is not known whether the woman had any relatives in the city. None, it was said, was known to have called on either her or her son.

FASHION NOTES.

The newest embroideries indicate the influence of Japan in the designs while in the more expensive blouse embroideries both the Japanese and Irish are effectively combined.

Some lovely batiste embroideries have an Irish guipure edging, while not a few insertions showing the lotus flower worked on batiste grounds introduce circles of Irish lace.

Irish lace all-overs with inset medallions of batiste are to be much used for dainty blouses, and for trimming purposes there are lovely insertions composed of batiste, Japanese embroidery and Irish crochet. For blouses of New French linen lace is quite a novelty and the linen embroidered materials with Irish lace insertions are in great request for morning shirts and whole costumes.

The revival of watered silks and brooches for dresses has been followed by a display of coats in the Empire style fashioned of black and light colored moires, the latter for theatre wraps, both dark and light being trimmed with beautiful embroideries and buttons.

Of comparatively inexpensive silks, those with an almost invisible colored tiny check and hair-line stripe on a white ground are among the latest novelties but the soft corded silks will be much used both for whole costumes and blouses.

To be the vanguard of fashion this season necessitates the purchase of at least one gown made of Irish lace and hand embroidered linen. The lace forms the fitted princess portion of the gown, at the hem of which is a band of linen finished in scallop design where it meets the lace, while the bodice, front, vest and collar and sleeve bands are also of the embroidered linen.

Tweeds in flecked and spotted effects are fashionable; particularly so are creamy white grounds with dashes of thereon of pale blue golden brown or light shades of purple.

Lace is to be as much worn as ever; and the imitation laces at very low prices are wonderfully fine and in the best old patterns. Linen suits will be accompanied by short, semi-fitting Empire coats made of white or light colored taffetas to match the dress.

Entire loose coats of guipure over thin silk, to be worn just as and instead of blouses with skirts of another material—of fine cloth, muslin, or crepe de chine—are a feature of new fashion.

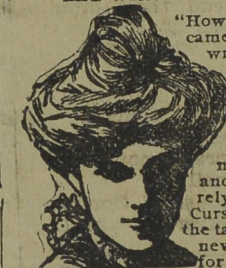
Slip is to be worn, especially in the glaze variety, and in the delightful chene blurred effects of color on lighter grounds.

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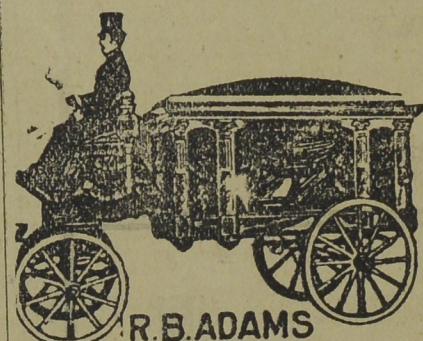

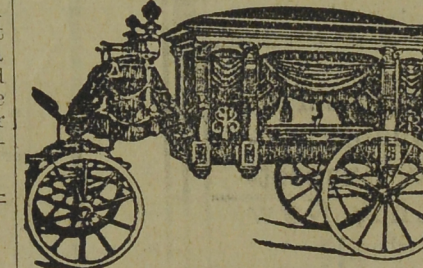
