A HORRIBLE DEATH.

Young Man Electrocuted in the I. C. R. Yard at Moncton.

Moncton, March 17.—Harley Cole, aged twenty years, met a horrible death here yesterday afternoon. He was instantly killed while working at the top of an electric light post in the I. C. R. yard. While fixing some wires 2,300 volts passed through his body. For fifteen or twenty minutes the rigid body hung at the top of the post, with hands clutching two live wires in a grip of death, while flames and sparks flashed forth and hundreds of people viewed the gruesome spectacle.

The accident occurred shortly before five o'clock. A gang of men had been sent from the I. C. R. electrical department to straighten a post and deceased went to the top of the pole to fix a guy wire. As he reached the top he clutched two wires to steady himself and instantly emitted a loud groan and sank forward. The body twitched under the influence of the powerful current and then the unfortunate man's body sank slowly forward until his face rested on the wires. The current was shut off as quickly as possible and the body taken down. The hands and face of the deceased man were horribly burned where they had come in contact with the live wires, the hands being burned through to the bone and the face being terribly marked.

Cole belonged to Dorchester and had been in the I. C. R. employ only a couple of weeks. He was about twenty years of age, and was a son of Edward Cole who conducts a ferry at Dorchester Cape. He was a popular young man and much liked by all who knew him. The remains were sent home last night.

ARCHBISHOP O'BRIEN'S WILL.

Many Requests to Halifax Churches and Catholic Institutions.

In the Probate Court at Halifax Thursday afternoon the will of the late Archbishop O'Brien was probated. The Rev. Dr. E. J. McCarthy and Rev. Dr. A. C. Campbell, are named as executors. The will is dated April 13, 1898, and a codicil is dated May 12, 1905.

After a declaration of having no personal right to any property of the Archdiocese, these are the following bequests:

First—To his sister, Hannah O'Brien, life insurance amounting to \$3,000; also a portion of plate and furniture in his residence.

Second—To his sister, Mrs. Ann Hughes, is left a house and lot at Emerald, Prince Edward Island.

Third—Life insurance for \$5,000 and manuscripts, books etc., topaz ring and chain and a portion of the plate and furniture is left to testator's niece, Miss Cornelia T. Hughes.

Fourth—\$3,000 is left to his nephew, Rev. Dr. C. A. Campbell, to be used according to instructions in a letter.

Fifth—The testator also makes gifts to the following, in each case the money having been already advanced:

\$1,200 to St. Mary's Cathedral.

\$1,200 to St. Agnes' church.

\$100 to the Halifax Infirmary.

To the R. C. Episcopal corporation, he leaves land on Windsor street.

The residue of the estate is left equally to the Roman Catholic Orphanage, the Home of Guardian Angel and the Monastery of the Good Shepherd.

GAME LAW VIOLATION.

Chief Game Warden Robinson Makes it Interesting for Violators.

Chief Game Warden John Robinson of Newcastle, is making things interesting for violators of the game laws. On Wednesday James Green of Protectionville, was taken before Police Magistrate Connors, charged with trapping sable in close season. He pleaded guilty and was fined \$20 costs, \$4.50. The amount was promptly paid.

Thursday evening the warden boarded the maritime express as it was leaving Newcastle and arrested Robert Flann of Red Bank, on suspicion of having skins in his possession. It was found that he had one mink skin and three sable skins with him. He was taken before Police Magistrate Davidson and a fine of \$80 and costs—\$13—was imposed. The amount was paid.

WOMAN SAVES A SAILOR.

New York, March 16: While the Hamburg-American liner Bluecher, which reached her pier in Hoboken to-day was tossed about in a terrific

gale which she encountered on Sunday last, a woman in the second cabin effected a daring and plucky rescue of a sailor as the man was being carried toward the rail on top of a gigantic wave. The woman was one of the second cabin passengers and her great height stood her in good stead as she clung to the sailor, assisted by other passengers, who were standing with her in the passage way watching the storm.

Chris Vogel, the sailor, was making his way from the passage underneath the center superstructure of the ship to the passage under the after cabin structure. Wave after wave had been spending their force across the after deck when Vogel essayed the task of crossing the deck. In the second cabin section a crowd of the passengers had been standing watching the tremendous flood dash by almost at their feet when Vogel started across the deck. A big sea that struck the Bluecher squarely amidships sent half its volume across the after deck. It caught Vogel and he would undoubtedly have been washed overboard had not the young giantess, Miss Margarete Wedsted, athletic and pretty, stepped forward and caught the seaman as he swept by. At the same time she called to the others in the passage to take hold of her dress and in like manner a living chain was formed, with Vogel at its end. He was dragged back into the passage not much the worse for his experience, but very grateful to the giantess who had saved his life.

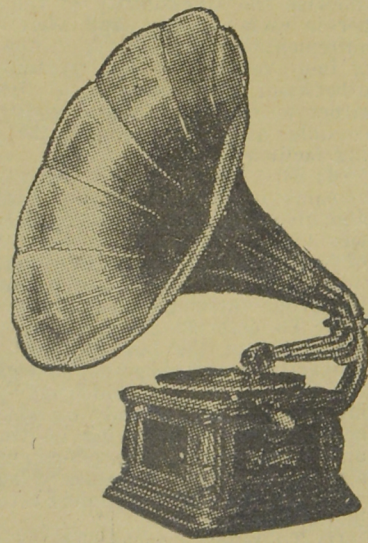
