More Light on the Pugsley Charges

The following story from Montreal appeared in the Toronto World: "If there is one man in Montreal more indignant than another, it is David Russell, the object of his wrath being H. C. McLeod, general manager of the Bank of Nova Scotia, and all the trouble is over the statement made by Hon. Dr. Pugsley re the famous \$100,000 Conservative election fund."

"It appears that Hugh Graham's note for \$100,000 was endorsed by Russell and discounted at the Bank of Nova Scotia, the proceeds going to New Brunswick, as described. "When the Minister of Public Works referred to this matter on the stump there was a general belief, owing to the Minister's close personal relations with the latter, that he had peached, although every man personally acquainted with David Russell will believe that he is far above any such action. It is alleged, however, that Mr. McLeod had told Mr. Hunt,

the Montreal manager of the Bank of Nova Scotia, that Russell had given away the snap to Hon. B. F. Pearson of Halifax, and that the proprietor of The Chronicle had passed along the information to Dr. Pugsley. "Mr. Russell, naturally indignant, wrote Pearson a furious letter, demanding an apology. However, the M. L. A. for Colchester wrote back that he had certainly never said that Russell had given him any information. Later on, however, when Pugsley and Pearson were in Montreal, these two gentlemen, when confronted by Russell, declared that Mr. McLeod was the man who had shown to Pearson a copy of Russell's account with the Bank of Nova Scotia, and as a good party man, Pearson had wired information to Hon. Dr. Pugsley."

Asked by a Globe reporter whether the above statements were true, Mr. McLeod replied, "I have absolutely nothing to say."

DEADLY CHRISTMAS BOX.

Infernal Machine Discovered in Erie Post Office.

ERIE, PA., Dec. 25.—While distributing Christmas bundles in the South Erie sub-postoffice this afternoon an employee became suspicious of a package, the end of which had been broken open, and upon making an investigation the package was found to contain an infernal machine so constructed that the opening of the box would cause an explosion that would have undoubtedly killed all persons near it and set fire to everything in the vicinity.

The package was addressed to Archie Carr, 2,208 Cherry street, and had been mailed in this city. The box was turned over to Postmaster Sobel, who called in Chief of Police Wagner and Detective Pinney. The chief cut out the side of the box and exposed a bottle and contrivances so arranged that the openings of the lid would have pulled the cork and ignited several tratches. The following inscription was on the wrapper:

"You may perhaps find the cover will catch a little when you open the box, but pay no attention to it. Merry Christmas."

The above contained a high explosive.

VOICES SEALED AWAY.

Unique Ceremony Under Opera House at Paris.

PARIS, Dec. 25.—There was an unique ceremony yesterday afternoon in the subterranean passage of the Opera house. It consisted of depositing in a specially prepared vault a talking machine and a number of discs bearing records of the voices of the greatest singers of the twentieth century. C. Tamagno, Melba, Caruso, Scotti, Plancon, Delucia, Patti, Calve, and others are reported in the selections. The discs are in double boxes, each separate from the other. Neither light nor air can penetrate the coverings, and it is believed that the voices can thus be preserved for a century. At the end of a hundred years they will be opened, and the people of that age will have the opportunity of hearing the voices of this age and of seeing the machine as manufactured today.

If the stock declined again you would be called on for still more margin. If you did not furnish this your account would be closed and you would be out every dollar that you had put up.

Right here comes one of the greatest evils of this kind of speculating or gambling. The bucket shop operator seldom, if ever, buys the actual security. In the case of the share of New York Central stock quoted, it is safe to say that the operator never once though of actually buying the stock. This is the fact that the player of bucket shops seldom stops to consider. The bucket shop operator, in brief, bets against your chances of winning, and he is so sure that you will lose that, perhaps, he doesn't even buy the stock. A man who once bought a share of stock in a bucket shop astonished the operator by demanding it. He was put off from day to day until the operator could pick one up. Summed up—playing the bucket shops is betting on prices, and there are usually long odds against the public.

If the covers of the kitchen range get red and will not blacken easily, try rubbing on lemon juice first, then blacken in the usual way.

Hang a child's blackboard in the kitchen with a piece of chalk attached. It is more convenient than a pencil and paper, and not so easily lost.

It will be economy to finish your sheets with the same width hem at each end. By so doing they can be used either side up, and gain much wear.

Cold water, a tablespoonful of ammonia, and soap, will remove machine grease when other means will not answer on account of colors running.

WASHINGTON PIE.

Scald one pint of milk in a double boiler. Beat together the yolks of two eggs, a cup of sugar, a piece of butter the size of an egg and a heaping teaspoonful of corn starch made smooth in a little water. Stir these into the scalding milk until thoroughly cooked, then set away to cool. Make a rich crust, roll very thin, line your pie dish and with a fork, prick many holes in it and bake. By the time the crust is done, have the cream cool. Flavor it with a teaspoonful of vanilla, pour it into the crust, beat the eggs to a stiff froth with a little powdered sugar, spread lightly on top of the pie and brown slightly in the oven.

CANNED BEETS.

Boil the beets and peel and slice or cut into quarters as for the table. Have fruit jar rubbers and covers in perfect condition and pack the beets in these, filling them to overflowing with boiling vinegar that has been seasoned with a little sugar, pepper and salt to taste, and seal immediately. Keep the beets in a cool, dark place.

BAKED HASH.

One cup of chopped cold roast beef or chicken, one cup of boiled rice, two cups of stewed tomatoes; salt and pepper to taste. Turn into a greased pudding dish and bake for a half-hour.

A teaspoonful of pulverized alum mixed with the common stove polish will give a wonderful polish. Scalding the milk for a tart pie adds greatly to its flavor. An addition of a teaspoonful of brown sugar or molasses is also helpful.

Too keep your favorite cook book open at the right page use a band of elastic an inch wide. When not in use you may strap it around the closed book.

When pretty silk stockings become worn cut out the feet and buy a pretty tassel to match. Tienately at the bottom and you have a stocking cap for baby.

A useful thing for mothers who have plenty of mending to do for small boys and girls is gum tissue. It can be placed under thin spots in elbows and sleeves, used to patch a rent in a hurry and gives a stiff

background to revers or collars made of soft material that have little stiffness of their own.

Small white spots which often appear on the nails are caused from bruising.

A cracked egg may be safely boiled if wrapped in a piece of greased paper.

To clean a black chip hat, brush out all dust and rub on a little pure olive oil.

To clean a spice mill grind two ounces of rice through the mill and all trace of the spice will be removed.

Never put turpentine on paint or varnish as it will dissolve it as soon as it touches it. Its volatile nature makes it cut grease in the same way.

If your window sills are wide enough to hold flowers, and you wish to protect the wood, then have a glass slab made which will cover the wood, or use tqueues of glass for each plant.

When moths get into your carpet take it up, shake it thoroughly, press with a flatiron as hot as may be safely used without scorching. After cleansing the floor thoroughly, sprinkle it generously with turpentine, pouring the oil into any cracks in the floor.

A good manner of keeping your range clean is wipe it carefully with brown paper. You should be careful to keep your stove free from soot, for if the air passages are clogged your oven will not do its proper duty. You should understand all parts of your range unless your servants are unusually good.

A good mode of cleaning a copper kettle is first to rub it with a cut lemon dipped in powdered bathbrick. When all stains are removed, wash it in warm soapy water, then dry and polish it with powdered bath brick, mixed to a paste with oil, may be used instead of the lemon.
